Did you know, as we celebrated Memorial Day this past weekend, there are two formidable plaques on the back wall of the Church, to the left and right of the main door, commemorating those Redeemer members who served in The World War and World War II? Both plaques are "Honor Rolls" of the men and women of The Redeemer who served their country, are made of bronze, have Eagles at the top and have golden stars for those who made the ultimate sacrifice. The World War plaque is vertical, more ornate, lists about 100 men, has a quote from Abraham Lincoln and recognizes the attending minister. The World War II commemorative is horizontal, has approximately 250 names of men and women and has two crosses. We are grateful for the service of so many from The Redeemer.

Redeemer Youth Trip To Navajoland Approaches

As RYG prepares for our trip to Utah and Arizona to work with the Navajo people June 17–23, we consider how the life of Christ and the Christian tradition can appeal to a people who have felt—and feel—occupied, suppressed, cheated and ignored. Christianity may offer hope to the Navajo people, as Christ offered hope to the first century Jews (who were similarly occupied, suppressed, cheated and ignored), but it is a relationship inherently complicated by the role that the Church has played for the last three centuries in the lives of Indigenous peoples across this nation.

This trip will allow us to better understand that complicated relationship, and to learn more deeply about both the Navajo, and ourselves. We may find that the Navajo people are more comfortable living into the Easter season of surrender and faith, while we linger in a Good Friday, Holy Saturday uncertainty. Or we may not. We may find more answers to the riddles of our own faith through living with those whose faith has been deeply influenced by a life and culture that has a different relationship with control.

We talk about metanoia in theology: a conversion or change of heart, that Christians often experience. This metanoia can be, and I argue should be, an ongoing process throughout our lives; every Lent, and every Easter, every week and sometimes, on a small scale, every day. It is a turning to God.

I believe it is in experiencing other people's hospitality that we learn true hospitality. It is in experiencing other people's grace that we understand the profound impact of grace, and it is in witnessing other peoples transformation that often we are transformed. My hope for this trip to Navajo Land is that the kids, and the leaders, experience metanoia. My hope is that their hearts are transformed and that they find love in the stranger and hope in surrender. Because it is when we let go of ourselves as the very center, that we are truly liberated and can turn ultimately to God as the Alpha and the Omega. This is what Easter is all about!
