Josef Gabriel Rheinberger

About Rheinberger and his Requiem in D-minor

Josef Gabriel Rheinberger (1839-1901) was born in Liechtenstein, a German speaking micro state situated between between Austria and Switzerland. Rheinberger was known as a first-rate organist, as well as pianist and composer. Some of his students included Englebert Humperdinck and American composer



Horatio Parker. Rheinberger's style reflects the beautiful counterpoint of the Baroque period, the elegant sophistication of the Classical period and the rich harmonic language of the Romantic period. Because of his diverse compositional offerings, equally grounded in sacred and the secular forms, he became one of the most successful composers of his time.

The work sung this evening represents Rheinberger's third and last setting of a Requiem. Written in 1901, the work stands as one of the final compositions of his life. Though only twenty minutes in length, the simplicity of this work does not belie the musical integrity or intentionality behind it. This Requiem reflects Rheinberger's own view on music for the church, particularly regarding the need for music to be recognizable in its own time, not composed in an exhumed style of a bygone era.

Conversely, Rheinberger's setting offers frequent reminders of the older, more traditional church music from the Catholic liturgy. At various points within the work a plainsong melody is sung by the basses and then repeated by the rest of the choir. This call and response type of antiphonal writing is an echo of a congregation's response to the words of a priest. Regarding his philosophy of music, in general, Rheinberger is quoted to have said "Music is basically an outpouring of joy and, even in pain, knows no pessimism." Rheinberger's own words remind us that, as Christians, we remember that even at the grave we make our song 'Alleluia'.
