


Lots of activities at The Port


The Port has brought me to town more frequently for events that they host. We also go to a lot of library events and we love to visit Portland Party Store!




WHAT DO YOU THINK COULD MAKE DOWNTOWN PORTLAND BETTER?





Our go-to for dining in Portland is Confluxcity Brewing. We enjoy their creative food and drinks. A bakery is just empty calories that are too easy to consume quickly! I prefer to make it more of a challenge to get obese. :-O Food trucks are typically very overpriced for what you get and they are weather-dependent (I do not want to stand in the rain to order/pick-up my food). Thank you for asking.

We've stopped frequenting at least one local restaurant due to regular poor service. Our kids, although not terribly picky, struggle with decent and appropriate kid menu options. We don't need more restaurants, we need those that are here, to simply do better.

No more "Sports Bars"

It would be great, if our current restaurants would add/change up items to their menu to incorporate unique options, locally sourced foods, and healthier prepared meals

I think the places we have could attract more people more frequently if they would tweak their offerings. Everyplace has burgers, pizza, salads, mac & cheese, & fries and standard breakfast fare. We have plenty of "bar" type & pizza & fast food places. It would be nice to add a more variety- a true
















*(select up to 5) Which of the following types of new or expanded retail establishments would make you visit and spend in Downtown Portland more often?

Like other seniors with ageing vision and driving restrictions, I rely more and more on on-line shopping. Could a coalition of merchants find a way to jointly offer their wares and services?

There seems to be no space available for a shop.

Unique gifts and decor and food items would be great!!

Retail here is tough but I respect the effort to find what there may be a demand for. I'd hate to see the town become a bunch of glorified Goodwill stores.

You need a store that serves a large cross population (likes Browns pharmacy, Mrs. Brown's card shop.) And not a bunch of small shops that aren't attractive to so many.

Antiques have been popular.

I've been downtown since 1996. What goes is Religious Articles in my store. CRAFTS, and also Health Items. I Will be offering samples in trial packs too.

Finish the opera house block and reopen!!!

This seems to be a no-brainier

More availability and consistency with open hours.

Advertise effectively. Most people have no idea what — if any — shopping options exist downtown. Businesses are exceptionally ineffective in letting people know they are here.

Only shop at Tom's, QFH, Pool and Spa, Auto Parts, gas stations, party stores x2, and restaurants. Go to Ionia or Lansing for other needs.

Finishing the old buildings that make the downtown like awful and unwelcoming get businesses going bring business

Less cluttered - limit items and change them up every couple months. More days, evenings when all businesses open at same time.

If everyone could just have regular hours that reflect the needs of the community (ie either early in the day or later in the evening)

Current 'shift' in business models, I am assuming?

Unique, quality items and services worth the elevated price of doing business in the downtown. (Lower taxes on those old buildings when they have a beneficial business in them, incentivize.) Shoes, clothing, toys, quality health foods, et al. Uniform hours of business.

Quality, value, service - so the proprietor can afford to stay in business, not items that can be purchase online or big box.

Brown's Shoes franchise is a good example.

Start a revolving loan program to assist in the upkeep of the historic two blocks of downtown.

Remove the over-grown trees and grating around them, making the sidewalks more walkable. We all love trees, but trees were not necessarily common in the Italianate 19th-century phase of downtown design. Add charm with unique signage, motifs, window coverings...


