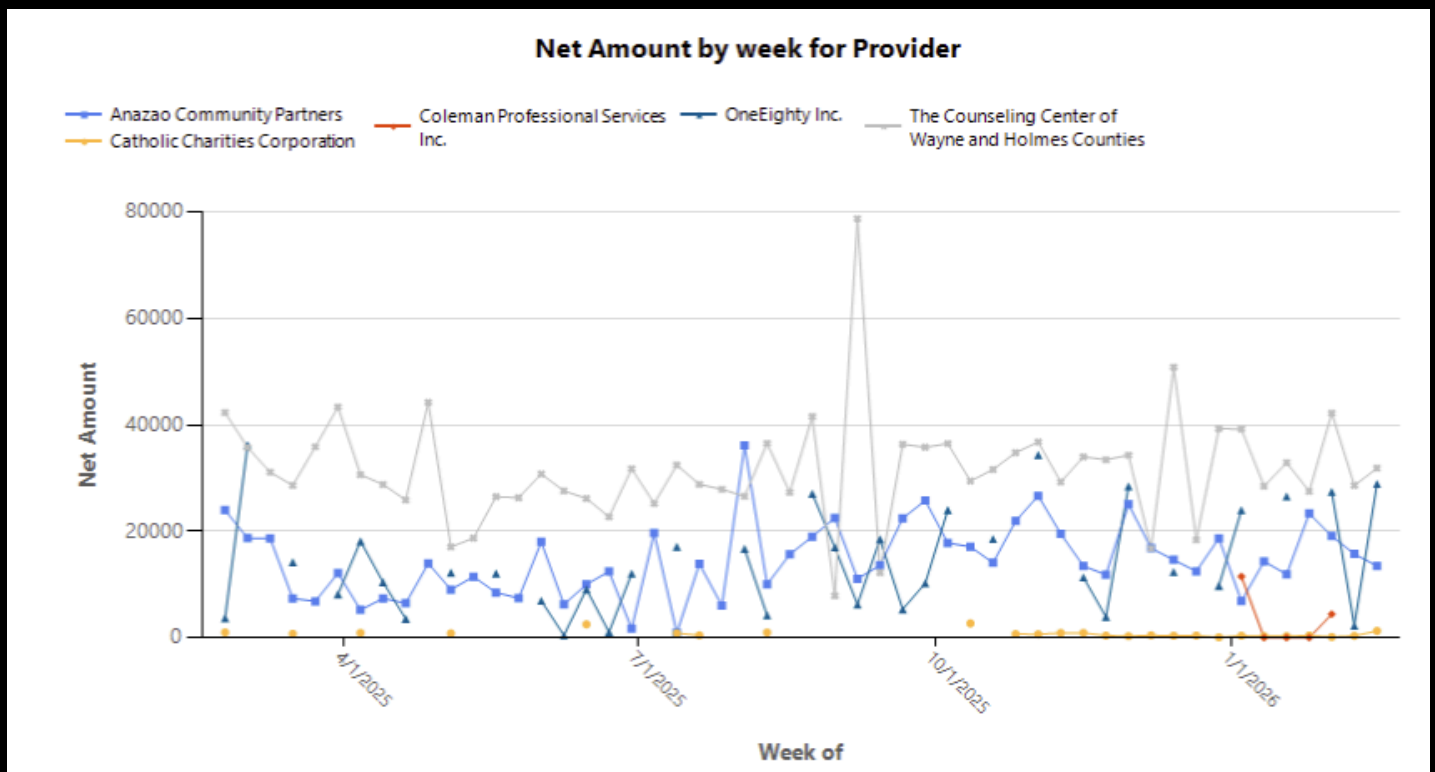

CATHOLIC CHARITIES, WISE PROGRAM:

This quarter has been especially meaningful for clients, their families or caregivers, and involved professionals, as wraparound services have supported greater consistency and follow-through on needed supports. Through WISE case management, clients have been assisted both with initiating services and with practicing skill sets that help them function more successfully in their communities. These services have been impactful with higher-complexity needs in the WISE program, where coordinated support is essential. Families are not left to navigate multiple systems on their own; instead, they have had a consistent, trusted professional to help them prioritize goals, monitor progress, and adjust plans as circumstances change. This collaborative network of providers and community partners has increased stability for clients, reduced duplication of services, and has created a unified team around the family, which has led to more positive outcomes.

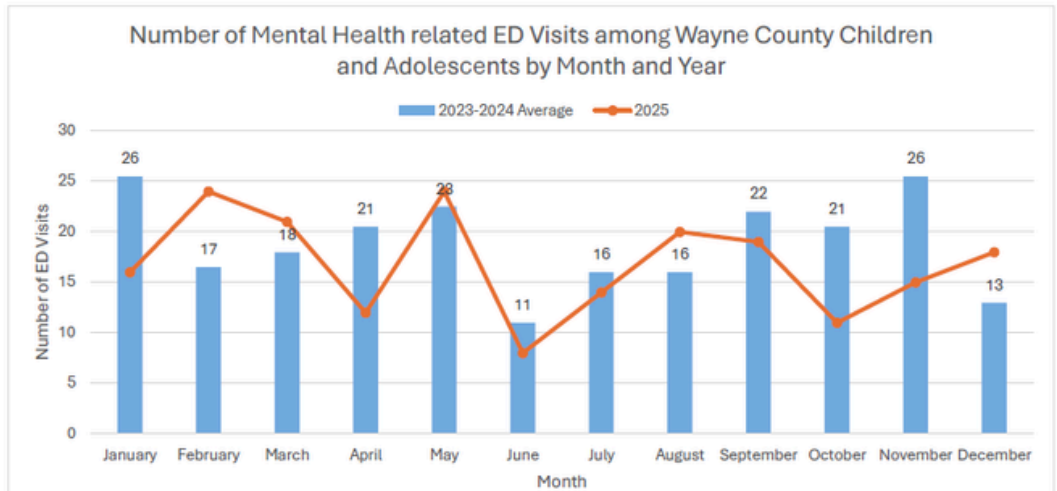

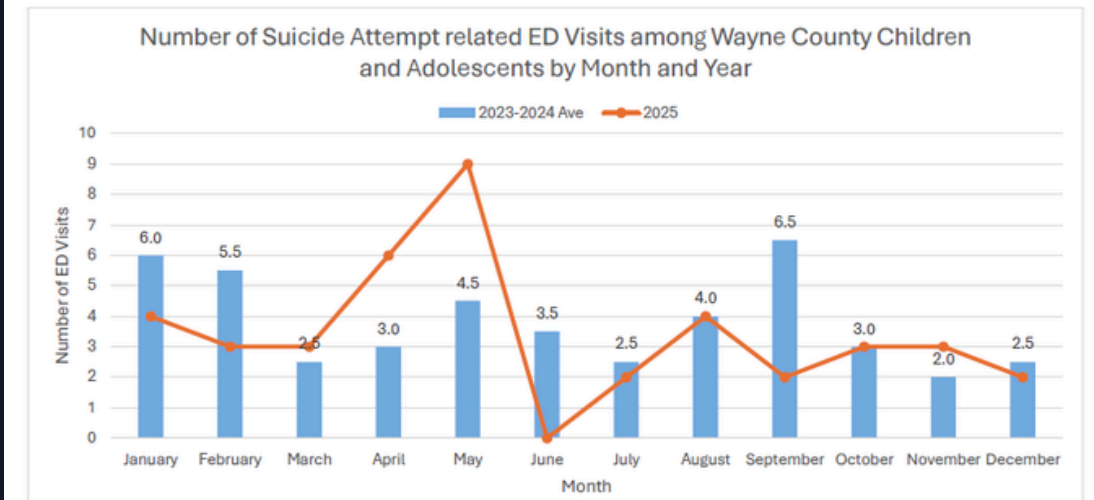

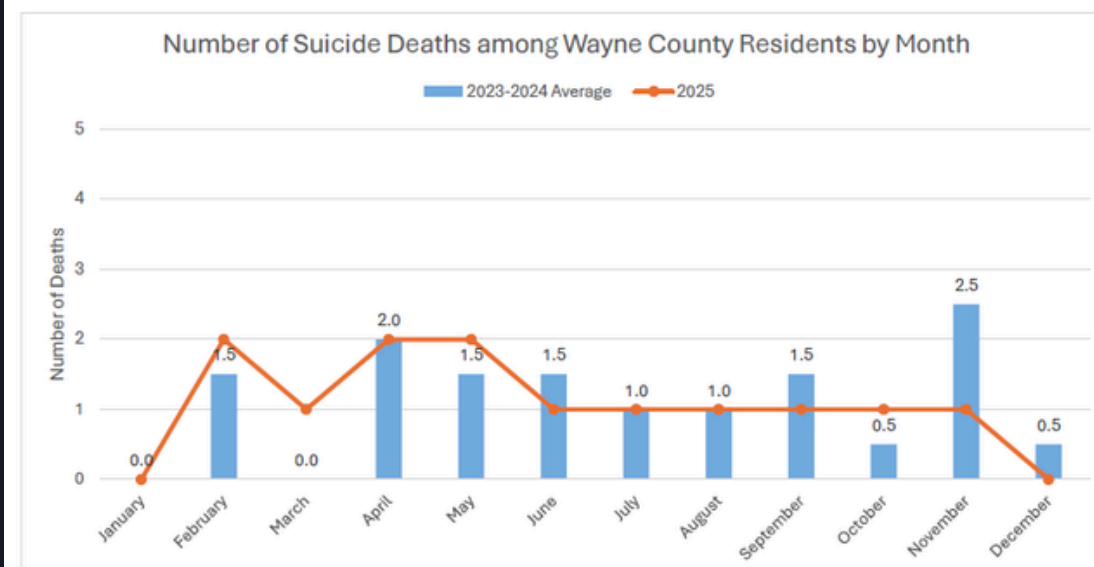
Mental Health related ED Visits: Children and Adolescents



Suicide Attempt related ED Visits: Children and Adolescents

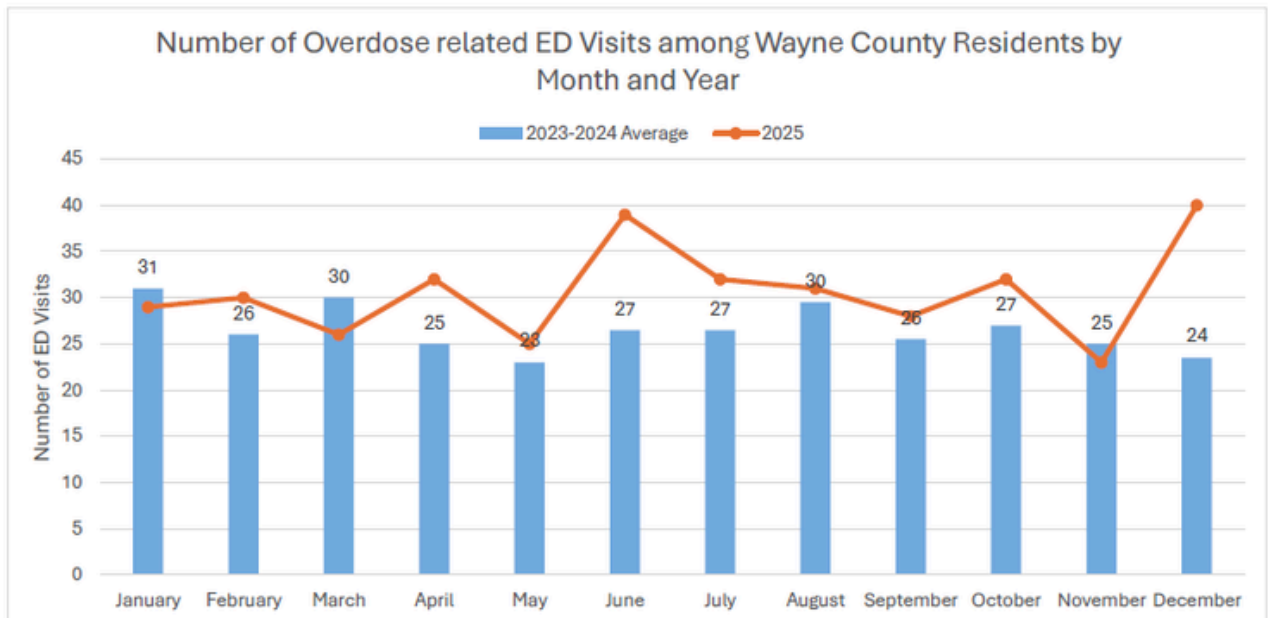


Suicide Deaths: All Ages

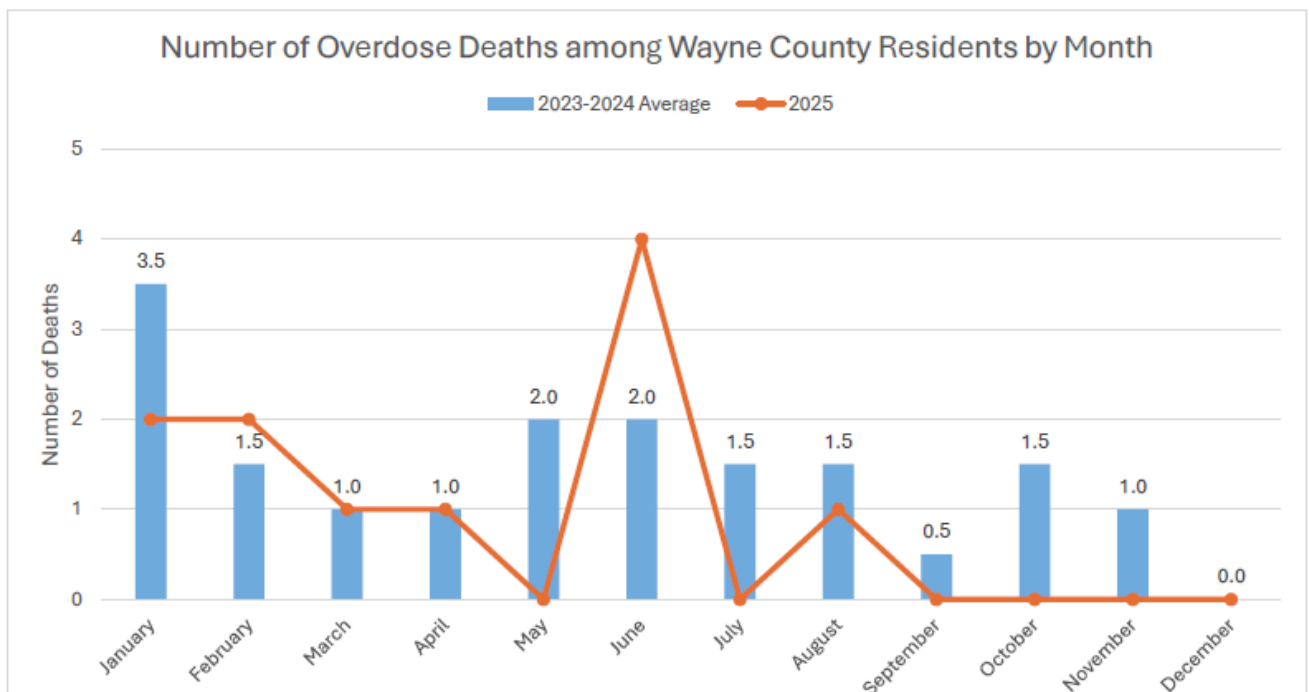


OVERDOSE DATA - WAYNE

QUICK RESPONSE TEAM

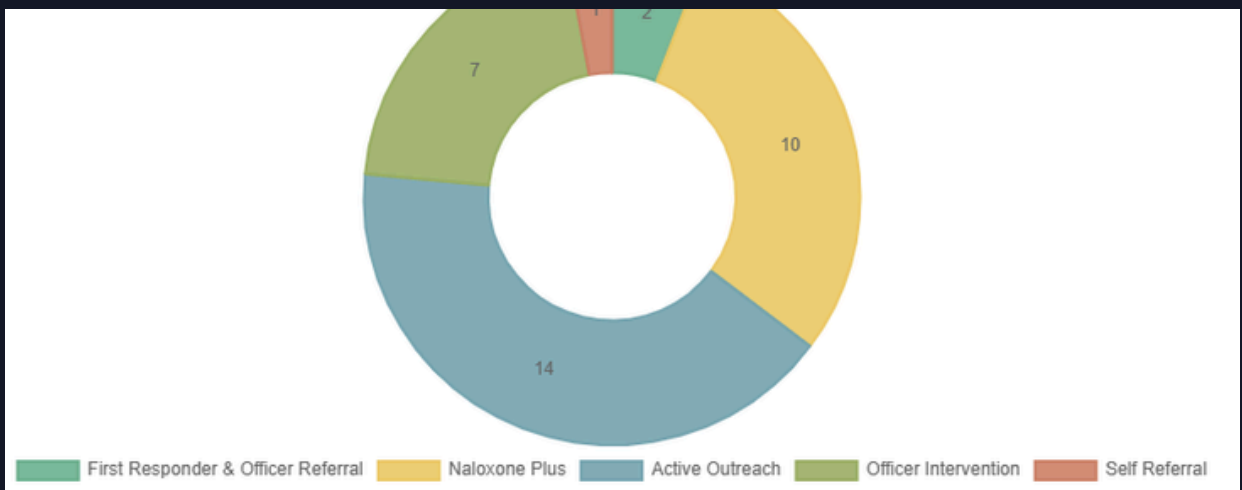
WHMHRB ASSOCIATE DIRECTOR, HEATHER DEAN RECEIVED A CALL FROM DEPUTY HANKINS (QRT LEAD), WHO WAS ON SCENE WITH AN INDIVIDUAL IN THAT WAS STRUGGLING WITH LONG STANDING ADDICTION AND MENTAL HEALTH. WHILE DEAN WAS ON HOLD, SHE OVERHEARD HANKINS SPEAKING DIRECTLY TO THE PERSON. HIS WORDS WERE SIMPLE BUT POWERFUL: "I WANT TO BE SURE THAT WE ARE LEAVING YOU BETTER THAN WE FOUND YOU."

THAT MOMENT CAPTURED THE VERY HEART OF THE WAYNE COUNTY QRT MISSION IT'S NOT ABOUT PAPERWORK, PROCEDURES, OR STATISTICS- IT'S ABOUT PEOPLE. IT'S ABOUT ENSURING THAT EVERY ENCOUNTER LEAVES SOMEONE STRONGER, SAFER, AND MORE SUPPORTED THAN BEFORE. LEAVING PEOPLE BETTER THAN WE FOUND THEM IS THE GUIDING PRINCIPLE.



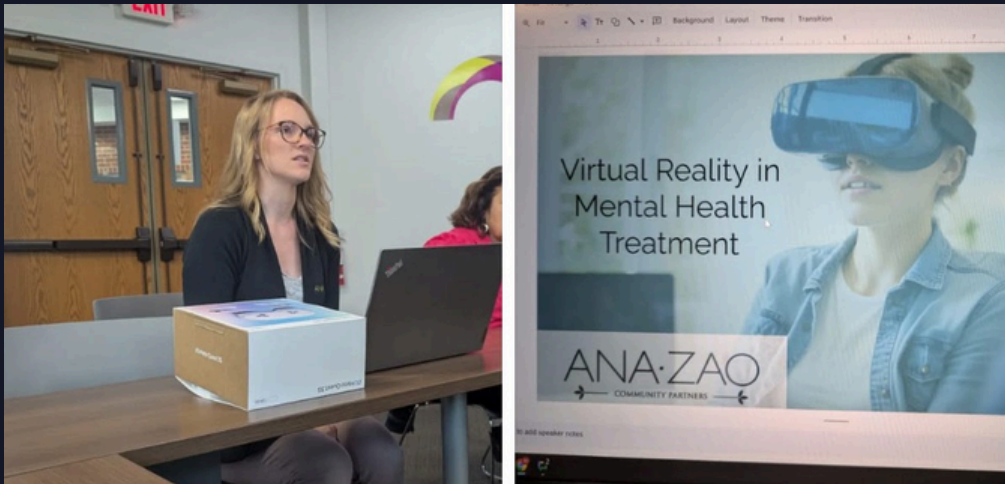

HIGHLIGHTS

SARAH DOOHAN, ANAZAO'S CLINICAL DIRECTOR LED A PRESENTATION REGARDING THE USE OF VIRTUAL REALITY AS A TOOL IN CLINICAL SETTINGS, A BOARD FUNDED INITIATIVE.



OF THE 136 CHILDREN SCREENED THIS QUARTER, THE ANAZAO TEAM IDENTIFIED 44 CHILDREN AS DRUG ENDANGERED, REFLECTING THE ONGOING IMPACT OF SUBSTANCE USE ON FAMILY STABILITY AND CHILD WELLBEING. WITH SUPPORT FROM THE BOARD, ANAZAO DELIVERS THE CLINICAL INTERVENTIONS REQUIRED FOR DEC CASES, INCLUDING TRAUMA-RESPONSIVE ASSESSMENT, SAFETY PLANNING, THERAPEUTIC SERVICES, AND COORDINATION WITH SCHOOLS, COURTS, AND CHILD-SERVING PARTNERS. THESE INTERVENTIONS ENSURE THAT CHILDREN EXPERIENCING INSTABILITY OR EXPOSURE TO SUBSTANCE USE RECEIVE CONSISTENT, DEVELOPMENTALLY APPROPRIATE SUPPORT THAT STRENGTHENS SAFETY, RESILIENCE, AND LONG-TERM STABILITY.

CATHOLIC CHARITIES SERVED 5 FAMILIES IN THEIR RISE ABOVE GROUP THIS QUARTER. RISE ABOVE PROGRAMMING SERVES TEENS/FAMILIES IMPACTED BY CAREGIVER SUBSTANCE USE.

CRISIS INTERVENTION TEAM TRAINING

LAW ENFORCEMENT FREQUENTLY SERVES AS FIRST RESPONDERS IN MOST CRISES. CRISIS INTERVENTION TEAMS (CIT) PROGRAMS ARE AN INNOVATIVE, COMMUNITY-BASED APPROACH TO IMPROVE THE OUTCOMES OF THESE ENCOUNTERS.

CIT PROGRAMS CREATE CONNECTIONS BETWEEN LAW ENFORCEMENT, MENTAL HEALTH PROVIDERS, HOSPITAL EMERGENCY SERVICES AND INDIVIDUALS WITH MENTAL ILLNESS AND THEIR FAMILIES.

THROUGH COLLABORATIVE COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS AND INTENSIVE TRAINING, CIT IMPROVES COMMUNICATION, IDENTIFIES MENTAL HEALTH RESOURCES FOR THOSE IN CRISIS AND ENSURES OFFICER AND COMMUNITY SAFETY.

COMMUNITY SUPPORTS

THROUGH COMMUNITY SUPPORTS PROGRAMMING, WHMHRB SPENT \$42,383.39 TO SUPPORT 24 INDIVIDUALS FROM WAYNE & HOLMES COUNTIES WITH HOUSING, BASIC NEEDS AND OTHER NECESSARY SUPPORTS SUCH AS TRANSPORTATION, MEDICATION AND BIRTH CERTIFICATE/IDS.

COMMUNITY SUPPORT FUNDING WAS USED TO SUPPORT A TERMINALLY ILL INDIVIDUAL WHO HAD A LIFELONG STUGGLE WITH SUBSTANCE USE AND MENTAL HEALTH. COMMUNITY SUPPORT FUNDING ENSURED STABLE HOUSING AND TRANSPORTATION TO MEDICAL AND PSYCH APPOINTMENTS,

ADDITIONALLY, IT WAS USED TO SUPPORT HER BASIC NEEDS SUCH AS GROCERIES AND CLOTHING. SHE WAS ABLE TO ACHEIVE STABILITY THROUGH THIS PROCESS, ULTIMATELY ABLE TO RECONNECT WITH HER DAUGHTER, AND MEET AND FORM A RELATIONSHIP WITH HER GRANDDAUGHTER- WHICH WAS HER DYING WISH.

COMMUNITY ACTION OUTREACH



COMMUNITY ACTION'S OUTREACH TEAM IS A VITAL RESOURCE TO THE UNHOUSED POPULATION IN WAYNE COUNTY. THIS WINTER MARKED A 15% INCREASE IN INDIVIDUALS EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS AND A 40% INCREASE IN INDIVIDUALS WITH DUAL DX.

THE TEAM HAS INCREASED THEIR SERVICE CONNECTION BY 10%.
OUTSTANDING WORK COMMUNITY ACTION.

VIOLA STARTZMAN CLINIC

BETWEEN CALENDAR YEARS 2024 AND 2025, VIOLA STARTZMAN CLINIC EXPERIENCED SIGNIFICANT GROWTH ACROSS ALL SERVICE LINES. PRIMARY CARE VISITS INCREASED BY 41.6%, WHILE MENTAL HEALTH VISITS INCREASED BY AN EXTRAORDINARY 215.8%, MORE THAN TRIPLING IN VOLUME. DURING THE SAME PERIOD, CHARITABLE CARE IN MENTAL HEALTH ROSE BY 220.6%, REFLECTING THE CLINIC'S MISSION-DRIVEN FOCUS ON ENSURING ACCESS TO CARE REGARDLESS OF A PATIENT'S ABILITY TO PAY. THESE FIGURES DEMONSTRATE NOT ONLY INCREASING DEMAND FOR SERVICES, BUT ALSO THE CLINIC'S PROACTIVE RESPONSE TO UNMET COMMUNITY NEEDS, PARTICULARLY IN BEHAVIORAL HEALTH.

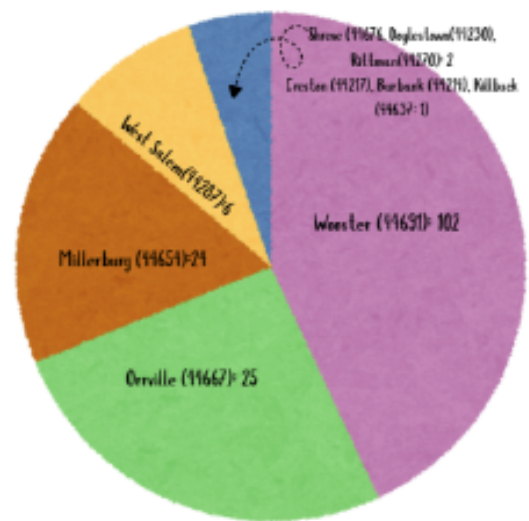

SEQUENTIAL INTERCEPT MAPPING

INDIVIDUALS WITH MENTAL ILLNESS ARE OVERREPRESENTED IN JAILS AND PRISONS. CORRECTIONAL SETTINGS ARE NOT INTENDED TO BE MENTAL HEALTH TREATMENT FACILITIES AND ARE NOT ABLE TO PROVIDE OPTIMAL CARE. THIS PHENOMENON HAS RESULTED IN OVERBURDENED PRISON STAFF, INTERRUPTION OF MENTAL HEALTH TREATMENT, AND OFTEN A WORSENING OF MENTAL HEALTH SYMPTOMS DUE TO ENVIRONMENTAL STRESSORS ASSOCIATED WITH INCARCERATION.

THE SEQUENTIAL INTERCEPT MODEL WORKING WITH SAMHSA'S NATIONAL GAINS CENTER, THE CJCOCOE DEVELOPED A CONCEPTUAL MODEL TO APPROACH THE OVER-REPRESENTATION OF PEOPLE WITH MENTAL ILLNESS. THE MODEL OUTLINES SEQUENTIAL POINTS AT WHICH A PERSON WITH MENTAL ILLNESS CAN BE "INTERCEPTED" AND KEPT FROM GOING FURTHER INTO THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM. OVER TIME, AS SYSTEMS MATURE, IT IS EXPECTED THAT PEOPLE WILL BE INTERCEPTED EARLIER IN THE PROCESS, LEADING TO FEWER PEOPLE ENTERING THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM.

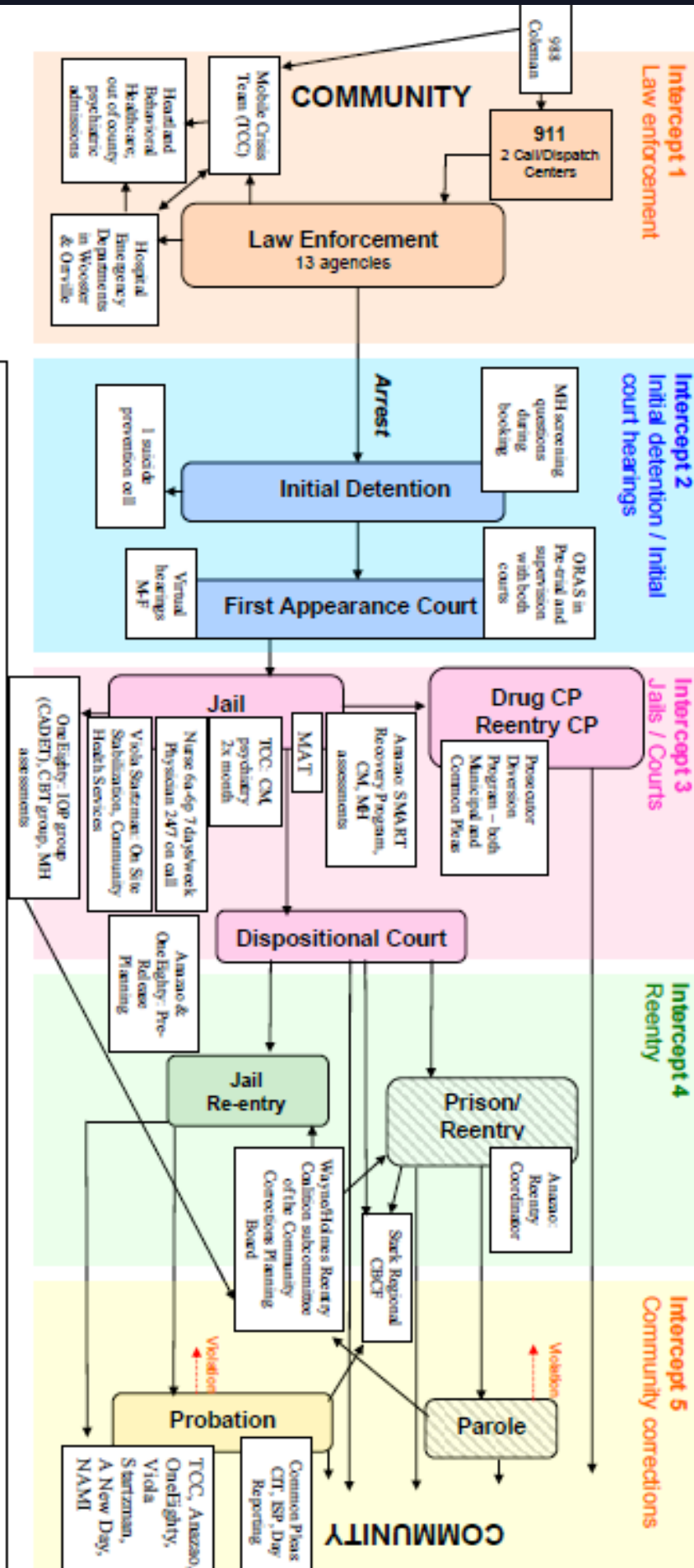
