Hello Oklahoma Lions!

The holiday season is upon us once again! Lions International President AP Singh has designated three weeks of service for this Lions year. The second week of service, from January 3 - 11, 2026, will focus on hunger.

According to

the United Nations, approximately 2 billion people worldwide lack access to safe, nutritious food in sufficient quantities. One in three people struggles with food insecurity, including our neighbors.



In the United States, 13.5% of households experience food insecurity. In Oklahoma, 15% of households are food insecure. People across all demographic groups are affected by food insecurity, including children, older adults, and low-income households. Unfortunately, we are in inflationary times, and food is expensive.

Our own District Governor, Sharyl Pickens, is leading a district service project to package 10,000 meals for distribution in 3NW. Each meal is 45 cents for a total of \$4500. She needs our support in funding this project.

In Oklahoma, two major food banks partner with local community food pantries. Local Lions clubs are encouraged to contact their community food pantries to volunteer time or resources to help alleviate hunger.

December 5, 2025 is International Leo Club Day. The first Lions Leo Club was established in 1957 by a baseball coach, Jim Gaver, a member of the Glenside Lions Club in Pennsylvania. Gaver wanted to establish a service club for high school students at the school where he coached.

The name "Leo" was an acronym for the program's core values: Leadership, Experience, and Opportunity. In 1964, the Lions Club Board of Directors officially adopted the Leo Club Program.



Today, the Lions Leo program has over 7500 clubs, with more than 180,000 members, in more than 150 countries. Happy 67th birthday to the Lions Leo program! Special thanks to the Leo Club of Biyagama North, Sri Lanka, for the information. Our Leos of Oklahoma have designed several of the annual Leo pins that are used worldwide.

In state news, Marie Burns received the Educate Award at the Hough Ear Institute Gala. The

Oklahoma Lions have donated over 250 hearing aids to the Hough Ear Institute to be refurbished. These hearing aids have been donated to help people hear better. Congratulations to Marie Burns (& the Lions of Oklahoma) on receiving this award, and thank you to those who have donated hearing aids.

At the November council meeting, 3E DG Nancy Wood spearheaded a project to give hats and gloves to veterans at the Norman Veterans Center. The meeting had a patriotic theme with red, white, and



blue. Lion veterans who were present, as well as those from across the state, were honored for their service.

After the council meeting, the informal audit for the Lions of Oklahoma was held.

The holiday season is a time for giving. As you are thinking about gifts for your loved ones and charitable organizations, please consider giving to Lions Club International Foundation. We have received many monetary grants from LCIF over the years. LCIF provides various types of grants to Lions of Oklahoma. 
