Valerie and I have just returned from the [USA-Canada Lions Leadership Forum](#) in Atlantic City, New Jersey. The central theme was Superman is not coming, therefore we should all

become Servant Heros. There were over 60 different training seminars to meet the needs of everyone. Our very own Kathy Donahue taught a class on creative adult learning styles.

Sixteen hundred delegates attended the forum and top districts and clubs were recognized for increasing membership and adding new clubs. Of course, membership was emphasized as Lions Clubs are determined to reach 1.5 million members worldwide by July 1, 2027.

Lion President AP Singh and his Partner-in-Service, PID Sangeeta Jatia gave a tag team keynote presentation on Saturday. He discussed how leaders develop leaders by exhibiting assertiveness, grace, and compassion. Leadership is getting the work done so the world becomes a better place.

They discussed Lions and how they relate to gambling in a casino. The Lions play together and share the hand. Every bet is good. Our currency is kindness and compassion and our jackpot is service. Trust your heart and bet on service with chips of kindness and cards of compassion. We need more members and clubs for service, so the jackpot of service is worth every deal!

Some may not appreciate the connection between the Lions Club and gambling. This was one of the most clever and creative talks given by an LCI President that I have heard.

The Saturday night talk was given by BJ Blahnik. BJ was diagnosed with Retinitis Pigmentosa at the age of 10. He spoke about his life and how it all changed after he received his first leader dog in 2008. After his first leader dog, he went from being depressed and feeling lost to having a new outlook on life. Today, Lion BJ has



a business called Reach Forward to assist special needs individuals. He is married, has three children, and is on his fifth leader dog, Jackson. BJ's message was truly inspirational. He told the audience that he had strived to speak at the USA-Canada Lions Forum for 10 years, and it was a dream of his. Now, it had finally come true! BJ also reminded us why Lions accepted the challenge from Helen Keller to become "Knights of the Blind" over 100 years ago. Our own Lion Patty Bryant was privileged to meet BJ on her visit to Leader Dog earlier this year. She said he was not to be missed, and she was right!

The Oklahoma delegation met at Margaritaville on the Atlantic City Boardwalk on Friday night. Twelve of us got together for food and fellowship. There was live music by a loud reggae band. Fun was had by all!

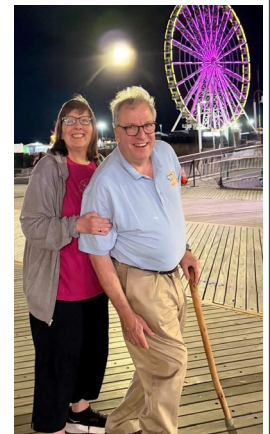

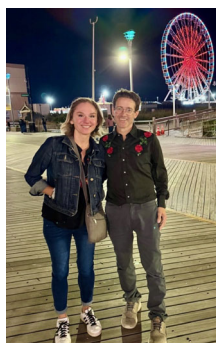

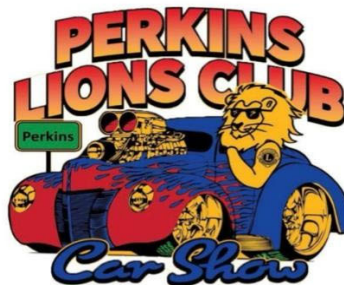

Club and inducting 5 of their new members. I moved on to the **Duncan Lions** to visit



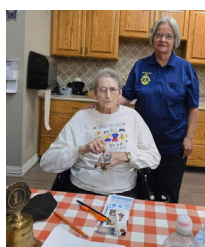
with them and got to see two of their students of the month recognized.

Oklahoma Lions Carry on the Unstoppable Spirit !

A Little over two years ago, **Lions of Oklahoma** had a problem! We had received many donated hearing aids and didn't know what to do with them. We began asking around and then found a team of hearing specialists at **Hough Ear Institute** to help solve this problem.

Around the same time Hough Ear Institute had received several calls from individuals needing hearing aids but could not afford to buy them.

Oklahoma Lions stepped up to help solve the problem. What if we could find another non-for-profit to help restore them so we could meet this need?

Through our team efforts, **Hough was able to find Sertoma** (another non-for-profit) in Kansas who were willing to help restore the hearing aids. The Team then worked to find Ok audiologists to prescribe and fit hearing aids, all while providing care for one year.

Lion **Pam Timmons** worked tirelessly to visit clubs, ask for help to get the program started and to provide hearing screening to those that desired it. Pam's leadership helped Lions of Oklahoma combine our vision programs (eye sight conservation and restoration) with Hough's Hearing Aid program to truly fulfil a dream of Helen Keller.

Oklahoma Lions have always strived to serve those in need and especially those with vision and hearing impairments. Lions International published the following from an article in February 2025 that summarized the work of **Helen Keller and Lions International**.

Helen lost her hearing and vision at the age of 18 months to an unknown illness. At that time there was limited care or treatment for vision and hearing loss. At age seven she met her teacher Anne



Sullivan who helped her navigate through her disabilities and overcome insurmountable odds.

Helen later learned how to read and write braille and eventually to speak. She went on to become the first deafblind graduate of Radcliffe College in Cambridge, Massachusetts.



water over her other hand, symbolized the idea of "water". Writing in her autobiography, *The Story of My Life*, Keller recalled the moment:

"I stood still, my whole attention fixed upon the motions of her fingers. Suddenly I felt a misty consciousness as of something forgotten—a thrill of returning thought; and somehow the mystery of language was revealed to me. I knew then that w-a-t-e-r meant the wonderful cool something that was flowing over my hand. The living word awakened my soul, gave it light, hope, set it free!"

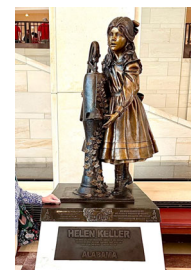
Helen appealed to Lions at the Lions Clubs International Convention June 30th, 2025 when she was 45 years of age.

"Try to imagine how you would feel if you lost your sight tomorrow. Picture yourself stumbling and groping at noonday as in the night, your work, your independence gone! In that dark hour, wouldn't your heart cry out for a friend to teach you how to live in the dark?"

*"I appeal to you, Lions — you who have your sight, your hearing, you who are strong and brave and kind — will you not constitute yourselves **Knights of the Blind** in my crusade against darkness?"*

Keller's breakthrough came when she realized that the motions her teacher was making on the palm of her hand, while running cool

Valerie Adair posted on Facebook a beautiful message about Helen Keller. She talked about wanting to go to Washington, DC and see the memorial. Helen Keller also has a beautiful statue in the capital (Alabama) and her remains are with Anne Sullivan Macy in the National Cathedral. For those planning on attending the Lions International Convention in Washington, DC in 2027, this is something you might want to see.



Lions all over the world took Helen's challenge and have continued to do great things including Oklahoma Lions!

Lions in the U.S. were attributed to the introduction of the white cane in 1930, by a Lion, George A. Bonham, President of the Peoria Lions Club (Illinois). He introduced the idea of using the white cane with a red band as a means of assisting the blind in independent mobility. In 1931, the Lion's Club International began a national program promoting the use of white canes for persons who are blind.



Oklahoma Lions recycle eyeglasses, hearing aids, and help people with vision correcting procedures. **Last year, Lions recycled over 54K glasses and OLSF helped over 20 receive glasses. Ok Lions have helped 244 individuals with hearing aids** alongside our team at Hough.

Oklahoma Lions are one of the oldest Multiple Districts and have been active in this endeavor since its inception. **Please think about giving to White Cane this year!** We have matching grants to help people with vision loss receive glasses and also for Hough Aid, but we need your matching gift. We can not do this without you!
