





Praise to you, O Christ.









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DAILY PRAYER For Our Divided Nation

Sovereign God, your Son Jesus lived within a divisive society even as he spoke truth to those in power on all sides. Empower us to be of good courage and hold fast to all that is good. Grant that our lives be grounded in love for our neighbors, care for the most vulnerable in our midst, and respect for the common life we share, following the example of Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. Amen.

CONNECTIONS WITH THE LITURGY

The Timothy reading speaks of the "laying on of hands." Christians continue the ancient practice of the laying on of hands, first described in the Bible when the dying Isaac blesses his sons (Gen. 48:14). Lutheran worship practices suggest the laying on of hands in Baptism, the Affirmation of Baptism (Confirmation), Individual Confession and Forgiveness (pp. 241, 244), and Marriage, as well as in several of the occasional services, such as ordination. The gesture evolved from the natural human sign of affection and usually symbolizes a prayer for God to bless the recipient, such as when parents bless their children each morning when they leave for school. Historically especially in ordination, it came also to denote a transfer of power.

CATECHISM CONNECTION

Jesus appears to take a harsh tone toward his disciples in today's gospel by calling them "worthless slaves" and implying that they are owed nothing whenever they do God's will. The inverse and larger truth, however, is that all of our life is a gift from a gracious God. Martin Luther speaks positively of our acceptance by God when teaching about the First Article of the Apostles' Creed: God creates, provides, protects and preserves us "out of pure, fatherly, and divine goodness and mercy, without any merit or worthiness of mine at all! For all this I owe it to God to thank and praise, serve and obey him. This is most certainly true."

GOSPEL MESSAGE Faith beyond Measure

Matters of faith are sometimes tricky to comprehend. Faith is a relationship of trust in God. But how do we measure it? It is, by definition, unquantifiable. Of course, that does not stop us from trying. We want to grade our faith, and we look on the outside for signs of a high faith score.

How often do we mistake material success for God's blessing? It is tempting to look at other people and think they must be more faithful than we are because they have or do more than we do. But there is a flaw in that logic. Quite often, looks can be deceiving. We have all suffered disappointment a time or two (or ten!). Life sometimes deals us more than we can handle. We could have faith the size of a bowling ball, but sometimes things just don't work out.

Jesus' understanding of faith seems different from his disciples' or our own. He teaches the apostles that even the tiniest amount of faith possesses transformative power capable of altering entire realities. The "size" of faith is irrelevant.

God gives every one of us a seed of faith. It is a gift freely given, nurtured through baptism and communion. We build confidence in that faith through worship, prayer, and community. While we struggle to measure our faith, we can increase our confidence and willingness to act on it. When that confidence is low, we can lean on those around us. When it is high, we can strive to build up others, encouraging them in their own relationship with God.

God is calling all of us to be willing and confident servants, sending us out into the world to act on our faith. Like a giant, wild bush that grows from the tiniest seed, our faith can grow, spread, and thrive beyond measure.

Upcoming Commemorations

William Tyndale, translator, martyr, died 1536 Monday, October 6, 2025

Tyndale was ordained a priest in England, and wished to translate the Bible into English. He was opposed in this by King Henry VIII, causing him to flee to Germany. He completed the New Testament in 1525, but before he could finish the Old Testament, he was tried for heresy and burned at the stake.

Henry Melchior Muhlenberg, pastor in North America, died 1787 Tuesday, October 7, 2025

Divided Lutherans in America asked leaders in Europe to send someone who could take charge and unite their work.

Muhlenberg was sent, and was effective in organizing the American Lutherans. Among other accomplishments, his liturgical principles became the basis for the Common Service of 1888.

Massie L. Kennard, renewer of the church, died 1986 (TFF) Friday, October 10, 2025

A native of Chicago, Kennard was a major figure in supporting and working toward ethnic and racial inclusiveness in the former Lutheran Church in America. Ordained in 1958, he served in positions including Director for Minority Concerns of the Division for Mission in North America.
