



DAILY PRAYER For Those Who Mourn

O Lord our God, Father of the Crucified, we pray for all who mourn, for those without those in whom their souls delighted, saddened with memories of vanished faces and loved voices stilled. Give them comfort in hope of that day when heart shall find heart and those torn apart on earth shall reunite in heaven; through the power and mercy of Jesus Christ, our Savior and Good Physician. CONNECTIONS WITH THE LITURGY Praying Across Generations

The prayer of the day is inspired by one in the 1639 Evangeliebok of the Church of Sweden. With Job, we ask God, our redeemer, for the Spirit to live a holy life while awaiting God's judgment and a joyful resurrection through Christ.

CATECHISM CONNECTION Resurrection Now and Forever

Martin Luther regularly talked about two kinds of death and resurrection. One is our resurrection on the last day to eternal life. But another and equally important resurrection is our daily dying to sin and rising to new life through our baptism. Luther concludes his teaching on Third Article of the Creed ("I believe in the Holy Spirit...") in the Small Catechism: "Daily in this Christian church the Holy Spirit abundantly forgives all sins—mine and those of all believers. On the last day the Holy Spirit will raise me and all the dead and will give to me and all believers in Christ eternal life. This is most certainly true."

UPCOMING COMMEMORATIONS

Martin, Bishop of Tours, died 397 Tuesday, November 11, 2025

Martin's pagan father enlisted him in the Roman army. Approached by a beggar, Martin cut his cloak in half and gave part to the man, whom he later understood as representing Christ. He asked to leave the army, but was jailed instead. After his release, he became a preacher, and later a bishop.

Søren Aabye Kierkegaard, teacher, died 1855 Tuesday, November 11, 2025

Kierkegaard was a Danish theologian whose writings also gave rise to the modern philosophy of existentialism. He frequently attacked the complacency of the state church of his day, as well as its desire to be accepted by polite society rather than be a stumbling block.

GOSPEL MESSAGE Something Different

Sometimes the gospels give us the impression that Jesus would make a great lawyer. The Sadducees seem to ask him a pretty straightforward question, but Jesus answers it as though he is deliberately sidestepping the point. Indeed, he answers a lot of questions this way, apparently talking about something totally unrelated to the conversation at hand. If we pay close attention, though, we see that Jesus is directing us to an important point, even if it seems altogether different from the original track.

The Sadducees are challenging the validity of the resurrection with a hyperbolic question about ancient Hebrew marriage customs. But Jesus basically says, "Look, God came to Moses in the burning bush and said, 'I am the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob here and now, in the present. And I am the God of the living, not the dead.' Therefore, God's chosen ones are alive and well after death!"

Jesus knows that the reality of the resurrection is too hard for them to understand. It's too hard for any of us to understand. So instead of responding to their literal question, he offers some comfort. He says, "Listen, Moses already showed us that these saints are alive and well with God. It's okay. Don't worry about what comes next. God's got this."

Death is scary, so Jesus is giving us a word of assurance to help us face it. That word is this: "You will be resurrected. It's okay to be afraid. It's okay to not know what the resurrection will look like or who is going to be sitting where. Just remember that you are a beloved child of God and will be made alive together with all the saints."
