




At the conclusion:



Remembering, therefore, his salutary command . . .


To you, O God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, be all honor and glory in your holy church, now and forever.

When giving the bread and cup, the communion ministers say: The body of Christ, given for you. The blood of Christ, shed for you. and each person may respond:



## CONNECTIONS WITH THE LITURGY Singing about Nature

Many hymns that thank God for nature are marked by nineteenth-century Romanticism that describes an earth of beautiful sunsets and singing birds. Yet the truth of nature is also like the apocalyptic visions of earthquakes and famines in to day's gospel. Indeed, Charles Darwin's discoveries were most unsettling to him because he could not imagine how an earth so reliant on nature's violence could have come from a beneficent Creator. In view of the natural disasters mentioned in today's gospel, we meditate on the mystery of God and beg for divine protection.

## CATECHISM CONNECTION Valley of Tears

Modern life in a stable nation largely insulates us from the afflictions of nature once very common to daily life. These include high infant mortality rates, far more deaths by disease and infection, lack of timely weather forecasts, and little or no mitigation from natural disasters. That we live in a fragile world that is full of tragedy was foremost in the minds of our ancestors in the faith, including Martin Luther. In his teaching about the final petition of the Lord's Prayer, "deliver us from evil," Luther describes this earthly life as a "valley of tears" for which the comfort of heaven is deeply sought: "We ask in this prayer . . . that our Father in heaven may deliver us from all kinds of evil—affecting body or soul, property or reputation—and at last, when our final hour comes, may grant us a blessed end and take us by grace from this

# Elizabeth of Hungary, renewer of society, died 1231 Monday, November 17, 2025

This Hungarian princess lived her entire life in east-central Germany, and is often called Elizabeth of Thuringia. Married to a duke, she gave large sums of money, including her dowry, for relief of the poor and sick. She founded hospitals, cared for orphans, and used the royal food supplies to feed the hungry. Though she had the support of her husband, her generosity and charity did not earn her friends within the royal court. At the death of her husband, she was driven out. She joined a Franciscan order and continued her charitable work, though she suffered abuse at the hands of her confessor and spiritual guide. Her lifetime of charity is particularly remarkable when one remembers that she died at the age of twenty-four. She founded two hospitals, and many more are named for her.

## GOSPEL MESSAGE Honoring Creators of Justice

This week's gospel reading is a part of an apocalyptic speech Jesus gives in the temple. Jesus' talk of war can be alarming to our ears. We want to hear him speak about peace and love and mercy. However, there is much in this world that is scary and violent. Jesus would not be doing his pastoral due diligence if he did not talk about these things. Jesus reminds us that, yes, things are going to get bad. But he calls us to cling to our faith and respond to God's charge that we love and serve our neighbor. And by this, he assures us, we bring about the kingdom.

November 11 is honored as Veterans Day in the United States and Remembrance Day in Canada. Originally it was called Armistice Day to commemorate the ending of World War I and the signing of a ceasefire. It signaled the end of the violence.

An "armistice" is an agreement to stop fighting, to bring about peace. But as Martin Luther King Jr. famously observed, "Peace is not the absence of conflict but the presence of justice." Jesus tells us that violence will happen, but our calling as baptized Christians is to live in the promise of his grace and to go out into the world to be creators of justice and peace.

This week, as we honor and remember those who have served and experienced the violence Jesus speaks of, we must heed Jesus' pastoral words of hope: "Do not be afraid." In the midst of chaos and fear, Jesus gives us his strength and the wisdom to follow him. Blessed are all who work toward armistice in service of peace and justice.
