Message from Pastor Nathan

Baptism is about Community by Pastor Nathan Baker-Trinity

This article is the fourth of twelve in a monthly series on baptism. Each article focuses upon a particular theme of baptism and includes questions for reflection. The church council is using these articles for their opening devotions, and you are invited to do the same within your family or small group.

Baptism is about community. We are born into God's family, and we are connected in spiritual friendship with others. Gail Ramshaw begins her children's book, Every Day and Sunday, Too, with the following lines:

Snails live in shells one by one, but we people are creatures who like being together.

We want to see our friends often, every day, or at least once a week.

The very first promise that parents make when their children are baptized is "to live with them among God's faithful people." The primary way of doing this is by bringing them to Sunday worship. A sense of belonging and community is the primary obligation and gift of baptism. The church is not a collection of solitary snails but a school of fish swimming together.

One of the earliest descriptions of baptism in Bible comes from First Peter 2:9:
But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people, in order that you may proclaim the mighty acts of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light. This description is remarkable because it reverses the usual order of things. Before we believe certain stuff about God or learn to behave as Christians, the most important thing is that first we belong.

Many assume that becoming a Christian goes like this: First you believe, then you behave, and then you belong. That is, first you must put on your religious "game face" and say all the right stuff about God. Then you work toward self-improvement and learn all the "rules and regs"

of living a religious life. And then, once you've reached a certain bar, then you finally belong.

But nothing could be further from the truth. Our Lutheran churches, in fact, came about nearly 500 years ago as a response against precisely this assumption. It's exactly the opposite that is true: First you belong and assured you are God's child through baptism. Then you learn to behave (like an apprenticeship) by committing to a life of following Christ. And then, as you grow in grace, you come to believe that God's pure acceptance and love of you (and not your good works!) is what saves you.

From the beginning, baptism places us into a community of care and forgiveness. Such a community of forgiveness is a necessary gift, for the world outside our doors can be a very unforgiving place. Here in the church, we cling to God's caring and forgiving presence among us. Weekly proclaiming the forgiveness of sins and eating the Lord's Supper together assures us that this is so.

Questions for Reflection:

- 1. How does switching the order from Believe, Behave, Belong to Belong, Behave, Believe change things for you? Which order do those outside the church assume is the usual one?
- 2. When has the church been a community of caring and forgiveness for you? When has it not?
- 3. Consider this statement by a recent church leader: "There are two ways of thinking and having faith: we can fear to lose the saved or we can love to save the lost. We stand at the crossroads of these two ways of thinking." What's your reaction to this?

Pastor Nathan to serve as Chaplain to the Lutheran Summer Music Community

For a fifth summer, Pastor Nathan has been offered the position of Chaplain to the LSM Community June 22-July 20, 2025. The council at their February meeting enthusiastically granted Pastor Nathan leave to take this temporary call that supports the larger mission of the church.

Lutheran Summer Music (LSM) is the nation's premier faith-based music academy for high school students. In addition to musical instruction and numerous performance opportunities, LSM students form an intentional community, living together for four weeks on a Lutheran college campus. Since 1981, this unique and immersive program has guided the lives of young musicians, who credit LSM as the starting place for their future careers and vocations.

This opportunity is both an enrichment for Pastor Nathan's call as a rostered leader to the whole church, as well as a mission of the congregation. In the way other congregations may "lend out" their pastors to serve as military chaplains for a set period (such as for National Guard trainings), it is an honor for the congregation to support and for Pastor Nathan to give back to this important, life-changing experience for youth.

Pastor Nathan's primary responsibilities include: Be the spiritual leader to a community of about 160 students grades 8-12, plus over 50 faculty and staff; Lead worship, preach, and work with a worship planning team of several musicians; Supervise a worship associate (often a seminary intern) who serves as the LSM Sacristan; Plan daily worship services that incorporate students, faculty, and staff; Work collaboratively with a worship team that includes several nationally renown church musicians; Work with students of different faith backgrounds (1/3 are non-Lutheran); Gain ministry experience with youth.

How would the congregation financially steward this? Pastor Nathan plans to use one of his two weeks of continuing education for the year, as well as one week of his vacation time. In addition, Pastor Nathan will take two additional

weeks of unpaid leave. During Pastor Nathan's absence in July, Pastor Laurel is prepared to be the full-time pastor and plans to preach and lead worship for three of the four Sundays. We will welcome back Pastor Jonathan Zielske (who was with us in February) to preach and lead worship on July 13. He will also be available as extra support for Pastor Laurel should the need arise. CYF/Outreach Director Jenny will also be present to support Pastor Laurel's work.

While he is away, Pastor Nathan looks forward to staying in touch during his time at LSM. Many of their events are livestreamed, including the final two Sunday worship services, so we'll be sure to include a permanent link on our website and weekly email blasts. Pastor Nathan and LSM are very grateful to you, the people of St. Paul's, and look forward to sharing more about this ministry beginning in late April.

Simpon Housing Services



We were one of the first Minnesota organizations to use the nationally recognized Housing First model. Individuals and families are placed into housing immediately and then supported with identified services to help address barriers. We work across the metro area, partnering with property owners and developers to connect families and individuals to affordable, sustainable housing. The majority of our program participants live in scattered-site housing or individual apartments in market-rate apartment buildings, with the largest number of participants living in Hennepin County. Last year, we provided supportive services to over 1,600 people across all our programs.

Simpson Housing Services is proud to announce that it has reached the final phase of its \$47 million fundraising goal—the largest fundraising campaign in the agency's 41 years of service. Simpson has raised \$42 million to date with \$5 million remaining.

Pastor Laurel Update

Praise God! Pastor Laurel had two important tests this past week, and we're thrilled to share the results! Both the PET (bone scan) and CT scans showed no signs of cancer! She'll begin radiation treatment next week and will also start a targeted infusion therapy every three weeks. In her own words, "While the journey is still long, I shouldn't be as sick and hopefully will smile more."

To date, we have raised \$7,505 for her on the GoFundMe site and donations sent to SPLC in her name. She has also had many contributions sent directly to her. THANK YOU, MEMBERS AND FRIENDS! You have significantly improved her ability to manage her financial obligations! Any contribution, no matter the size, is deeply appreciated. Property & Grounds Update

In August 2023 a Lighting System Analysis was completed by Xcel Energy. The recommendation was to change the lighting to LED. The estimated

installation cost was \$13,583 after rebate with an estimated annual savings of \$3,000. It was cost-prohibitive at the time. Since December 2024, Jeff Thomsen has been upgrading to LED, throughout the entire building and for the most part, he has completed this task.

The cost of the project, including the bulbs, misc. supplies, and Jeff's labor is \$2,895. With his discounts at Lowe's, he initially saved the church an estimated \$450 at the time of purchase.

The church will be receiving a rebate from Xcel in the amount of \$1,320 which makes the final project cost to be \$1,575.

We extend a big thank you, to Jeff for his dedication to St. Paul Lutheran! We are blessed to have him. We also want to thank Barb Dietrich and her husband, who lent a hand to Jeff at times.

Synod Assembly Voting Members



The Saint Paul Area Synod Assembly annually gathers leaders from our area congregations in the springtime. This year's assembly will be held at St. Andrew's Lutheran in Mahtomedi, Friday evening through Saturday afternoon, May 16th and-17th.
