

Message from Pastor Nathan

The power of a good story is the delight of hearing it over and over again. The story of Christmas, of God coming into this world, never fails to delight. But as I've grown and heard this story so many times, I've come to see how this story is as much about us as it is about Christ.

Take Mary, for example. Mary is the first to prepare us to receive Jesus. At the end of the angel Gabriel's announcement that she will bear in her womb God's incarnate presence, she announces to Gabriel: "Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word."

This is a bold and self-affirming statement. We usually think of Mary as humble, quiet, receiving. But here, the tone is opposite. Mary is announcing to Gabriel (and ultimately to God) her proud and self-important role in spreading God's love for the world. A literal rendering of Greek demands attention: "Behold!" or "Look!" or "See!" or "Listen" is Mary's first word (($\iota\delta\sigma\upsilon$) is the Greek word). "Hey there! Look at me!" is tone here rather than the more tepid sounding "Here am I." Mary is prompting and demanding our attention, no less than when the angels from heaven announce to the shepherds the birth of Christ.

Many of us (perhaps, at times, rightly so) are taught from an early age to be humble about our faith. We are generally skeptical of those who wear their faith on their sleeves. True, it makes good sense not to push our faith on others (a gracious and time-appropriate invitation is always much better). By the same token, however, we have an important role to play in God's will for the world! We are God's messengers, God's hands and feet in this world!

Mary recognizes that her role in God's love for the world is a pivotal and important one. She is proud to affirm and embrace her role as God's servant. It reminds of a prayer I once heard from a pastor: "Lord, make humble, for you know that I am a very important person."

Outside of the Bible, I love gleaning wisdom from our forebears in the faith from generations

past. One such person I go to from time to time is Oswald Chambers, a Scottish Baptist chaplain, evangelist, and teacher. He died in 1917 while serving as a chaplain to British troops during World War I. Almost twenty years after his death in 1935, his wife published a collection of his messages in a daily devotional called, "My Utmost for His Highest."

Chambers' style can be jarring at times, but he also cuts to the heart in some remarkable ways. His devotion for November 30 (which this year is the First Sunday of Advent) sanctions a tepid faith and boldly affirms a faith like Mary's.

"The way we continually talk about our own inability is an insult to the Creator. The deploring of our own incompetence is a slander against God for having overlooked us." Does that get your attention?!? Chambers goes on to describe humbling ways of praying to God that might sound genuine before others but are really an "attitude of defiance" toward God.

Instead, like Mary, he affirms a bold faith in God. Faith that cries out to God by saying, "Thank God, I know that I am saved and made holy!" is what Chambers calls the "peak" or "pinnacle" of faith because it means "you have so completely abandoned yourself to God that you know God is true." (In a similar way, during moments of doubt, Martin Luther liked to cry out to God, "But I am baptized! I am God's child in my baptism!") Chambers concludes by saying, "One individual life may be of priceless value to God's purposes, and yours may be that life."

So as you prepare for Christmas, may the faith of Mary inspire your own. Your life matters! You are singularly loved by God! Your place in the universe and blessing upon others is of utmost importance to God! And like Mary, you are called to bear God's incarnate presence to others who need it. This Christmas, be proud of your faith and in all the ways that you can love your neighbor as yourself.

Dear Hope for the Journey Home Partners:

In the spring of 2024, Home for the Journey Home lost our partnership with the Community Resource Center at St. Andrews Church. In the months that followed, Guardian Angels Catholic Church made plans to use their parish house for another program. Thus, the decision was made to end Hope for the Journey Home.

Hope for the Journey Home served families for 12 years because of you, a collaboration of faith communities in Washington County. Parents and their children found a warm and welcoming environment to move forward. We gave families a much-needed respite to gather the support and financial resources they needed to find a home. There is much to be deeply grateful for over the years: amazing volunteers, generous donors, and committed staff.

Our Advisory Board has worked together to distribute the furniture, household items, gift cards, and cash reserves to organizations that were serving families who are temporarily homeless in Washington and Ramsey Counties. These organizations are: Solid Ground, Emma Norton, Theresa Living Center, and Catholic Charities Family Service Center in Maplewood. Bridging also took furniture that will be given to families setting up their household. Lots of toys were donated to Joseph's Coat.

As we say a profound "thank you" and final goodbye, it is with a heartfelt prayer that we all work to advocate for families without a home until homelessness ends. If you have any questions, please do not hesitate to contact us.



Simpson Housing Services

SIMPSON HOUSING SERVICES

Passage Community, a Simpson-owned building that provides transitional housing for 17 families, received a special gift — a new playground! The idea came from long-time volunteer Jill King. Her employer, Bright Horizons, offers a Bright Space program to their employees to work with non-profit agencies to create warm, safe spaces for children to play and experience the joy of childhood.

After collaborating on the design with Landscape Structures, Jill, her family, and 36 Bright Horizons employees broke ground and began to assemble the playground in May. Within four days, the dirt lot was transformed into a playground. Her favorite memory of the weekend was when two boys who live at Passage offered to help and asked if there could be a bench on the playground so their parents would have a place to sit when they played.

The children at Passage have enjoyed their summer days at the new playground, their parents often happily observing from the bench. "We have over 50 kids at Passage, and now, because of the playground, we are seeing the kids and families outside more, playing, connecting, and building friendships," says Janelle Leppa, Director of Family Housing Programs.

Simpson Housing Services thanks Jill and Jonathan King, Bright Horizons Foundation for Children, Landscape Structures, and all of the volunteers for creating a bright space for families living at Passage Community.

This is just another way that Simpson Housing Shelter is involved in the community.
