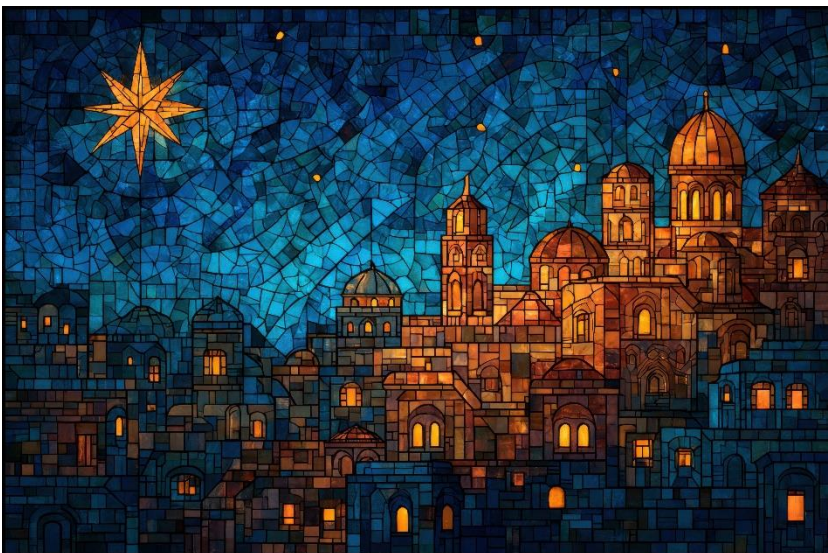
In winter's deepest night, we welcome the light of the Christ child.

CONNECTIONS WITH THE LITURGY
Precious Light

The prayer of the day, based on a seventh-century prayer in a collection known as the Gelasian Sacramentary, has long been appointed for Christmas Eve. Most Christians in history have prayed this prayer by meager candlelight, a precious gift before electricity. Our worship this night prays for Christ's light throughout the world and at the end of time.

CATECHISM CONNECTION
Jesus is the Final Word

In Martin Luther's Small Catechism, Jesus gets the last word regarding our eternal fate. Eternal life awaits us because Jesus "has purchased and freed [us] from all sins, from death, and from the power of the devil, not with gold or silver but with his holy, precious blood and with his innocent suffering and death." Some verses in the Bible may sound like we are condemned to eternal punishment, but Luther emphasizes that the Word of Christ's mercy far outshines words of judgment, even those found in the Bible. Drawing upon the Christmas story, Luther famously said that the Bible is but the swaddling clothes of Christ: "Simple and lowly are these swaddling clothes, but dear is the treasure, Christ, who lies in them."

UPCOMING COMMEMORATIONS

Stephen, Deacon and Martyr - Friday, December 26, 2025

On the second day of Christmas, the church remembers Stephen who was a deacon and the first martyr of the church. He was one of those seven upon whom the apostles laid hands after they had been chosen to serve widows and others in need. Later, Stephen's preaching angered the temple authorities, and they ordered him to be put to death by stoning, with Saul (later Paul) as one of the observers. As he died, he witnessed to his faith and spoke of a vision of heaven.

John, Apostle and Evangelist - Saturday, December 27, 2025

On the third day of Christmas, the church remembers John, the son of Zebedee who was a fisherman and one of the Twelve. John, his brother James, and Peter were the three who witnessed the light of the transfiguration of Jesus. John and James once made known their desire to hold positions of power in the kingdom of God. Jesus' response showed them that service to others was the sign of God's reign in the world. Tradition has attributed authorship of the gospel and the three epistles bearing his name to the apostle John. John is a saint for Christmas through his proclamation that the Word became flesh and lived among us, that the light of God shines in the darkness, and that we are called to love one another as Christ has loved us.

December 28 - The Holy Innocents, Martyrs

On the fourth day of Christmas, the church remembers the infant martyrs who were the children of Bethlehem, two years old and younger. Feeling threatened by the birth of a new "king", King Herod killed these innocent ones shortly after the birth of Jesus (see Matthew 2:16-18). Saint Augustine, a North African church leader, called these innocents "buds, killed by the frost of persecution the moment they showed themselves." Those linked to Jesus through their youth and innocence encounter the same hostility Jesus encounters later in his ministry.

GOSPEL MESSAGE

What Really Matters

“All the world should be registered” (Luke 2:1). This announcement from the emperor was an order for all people to stand up and be counted, to prove their worth by stating their name, their lineage, and the details of their existence, like the stats on the back of a trading card.

But an angel made a different sort of announcement: “This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger” (Luke 2:12). The shepherds would need to look for a baby just lying there, doing nothing but existing in all his God-given glory.

This baby is such good news in a world that tells us every day, in every possible way, that we need to prove our worth, that we need to convince the world and everyone around us that we matter. In what ways do you repeatedly try to prove your worth to the world? To your friends and family and colleagues? To yourself? To God?

What would it feel like—in your body, in your heart, in your gut—to just exist in all your God-given glory? To remember that the Savior of the world came to us as a baby who couldn’t do a single thing besides lie in the straw? And what would it be like for you—for all of us—to live each day in response to this wild grace?

Each of us matters to God, who sent Jesus into the world for us and all creation. God loves us, claims us in baptism, and continues to sustain us in holy communion. This indeed is good news of great joy for all people. Glory to God!
