

## Message from Pastor Nathan

For most Christians throughout time, Christmas has been a 12-day celebration. As I write this, we are a few days away from the 12th Day of Christmas, otherwise known as Epiphany on January 6. Epiphany is the climax of the Christmas story, the day the magi from the east humbly kneel before Jesus. Through their humble adoration, they point to Christ as the source of mercy for all people.

One of the few Epiphany-specific carols we still sing is "As with Gladness Men of Old." (ELW hymn 302). Here is the second stanza:

As with joyful steps they sped,  
Savior, to thy lowly bed,  
there to bend the knee before  
thee, whom heav'n and earth adore;  
so may we with willing feet  
ever seek thy mercy seat.

"One dollar and eighty seven cents." That is how O. Henry's classic story, The Gift of the Magi, begins. "One dollar and eighty seven cents. That was all. And sixty of it was in pennies. Pennies saved one and two at a time by bulldozing the grocer and the vegetable man and the butcher until one's cheeks burned. . . Three times Della counted it. One dollar and eighty seven cents. And the next day would be Christmas."

There are days where it might feel like the treasury of God's mercy is in short supply. As if the Christ child is too humble, hidden and weak to melt the hearts of many. Yet trusting that even a small treasury of mercy can make a big difference is one of the marks of faith.

Della is held by such faith. Her husband too, Jim. Both of them rise up the day before Christmas to face the trials of life together—she with her one dollar and eighty seven cents, he with his job that pays too little. They desperately want to give each other a Christmas gift. But she with just her pocket change and he with a paycheck still days away, they have no idea how they will celebrate Christmas.

For we who have struggled, or intimately known the stories of parents and grandparents who

struggled, we know how much our survival depends upon the generosity of others. It's the professor who opens up his home on Christmas break to a college student who can't afford to travel home. It's the mayor of a small town who buys him a bus ticket home after his motorcycle breaks down. It's the friend who listens sympathetically to the couple struggling to find a house they can afford, with three kids 5 and under and a fourth on the way, and only days to move.

Della loves Jim more than anything else in the world. And Jim loves Della more than anything else in the world. Jim loves Della's long hair, "rippling and shining like a cascade of brown waters." And Della loves Jim's decorum and inner pride, manifested by his only prized possession: his grandfather's pocket watch, even though it is barely attached to an old, fraying leather strap.

Eventually Jim finds the perfect gift: a beautiful set of combs that Della has been eyeing for weeks in the shop window, perfect for her hair. Della too finds the perfect gift: a platinum chain fob, simple and elegant, perfect for Jim's pocket watch. But how are they to pay for it? The money to their name is no more than a dry shrub in the desert, their tiny apartment but a parched place in the wilderness. What can they possibly hope for with Christmas only a day away?

Trusting in their small reserve of mercy, Della does the unthinkable: she cuts and sells all her hair, making just enough money buy Jim the platinum chain fob for his watch. Jim too does the unthinkable: he sells his treasured watch, making just enough money to buy Della a beautiful set of combs for her hair.

When they present to each other gifts on Christmas Eve, they see how foolish and useless are their gifts: combs for Della's hair that is now gone and a chain fob for a watch no longer in Jim's pocket. But in that moment, they discover they see how wise they are: They are each other's greatest gift, living in hope through their love and sacrifice for each other.

Friends in Christ, may the hope and humble wisdom of Epiphany inspire you to show mercy as God's people.


## Children, Youth, and Family



As Valley Outreach looks back on the past year, one thing is abundantly clear: the generosity of donors and volunteers has made an incredible difference.

Because of people like you, Valley Outreach has been able to provide food, clothing, and personalized assistance to more than 31,000 people in the community. That's 31,000 moments of relief, dignity, and hope. Each one made possible through your compassion.

Recently, they have heard growing concerns from community members about increased ICE enforcement activities in the Twin Cities. Moments like this can create real fear for many people. Fear that can keep people from accessing the essential services they need to care for themselves and their families. All are welcome here, and we strive to make it easy to access food because everyone's circumstances are unique.

At Valley Outreach, wants to be absolutely clear: They strive to be a safe, welcoming, and stable place for everyone. No matter what is happening around us, their commitment to inclusivity, dignity, and ease of access is always a priority. No personal information is required to receive food. We collect minimal data, but it is not required for anyone to receive support. Proxy pick-ups are welcome. If someone does not feel comfortable coming in person, they may send a trusted friend or family member to shop on their behalf. Deliveries are available within the Stillwater Area School District for individuals who cannot leave their homes.
