

Message from Pastor Nathan

There are five Sundays in the season of Lent. (The word "Lent" derives from the Latin word for spring and simply refers to the lengthening days. Yet it evokes the promise of new growth and life out of the old.) The gospel reading for the First Sunday in Lent always tells the story of Jesus' temptation in the wilderness. We heard this story from Matthew's gospel from which most of our gospel readings are proclaimed this year.

On the Second through Fifth Sundays in Lent, however, we take a detour into John's gospel. His stories about Jesus are largely unique from the other three gospels of Matthew, Mark and Luke (all of which are similar to each other). John likes to take his time and describe long, meandering encounters that Jesus has with some pretty memorable people.

The first is Nicodemus who comes to Jesus by night (John 3:1-17). By day Nicodemus is a prominent religious leader and confident rabbi. But by night he is as doubtful and fearful as you and me, nervous about following Jesus. What's more, Jesus is confusing! Jesus talks to him about the need to be "born again" or "born from above", but this makes no sense to Nicodemus. The story ends with Nicodemus as doubtful by ever. But by the end of John's gospel, he is the one who anoints the body of Jesus for burial and helps Joseph of Arimathea place it in a tomb (John 20:38-42). Nicodemus is example of having faith—not by trying to control faith with your mind, but having faith by opening your heart and moving your feet.

The second is the anonymous Samaritan Woman at the Well (John 4:5-42). She is a strong, independent, and confident woman who is not afraid to engage Jesus in deep conversation. She is skeptical of Jesus because he is an outsider: "How is that you, a Jew, ask a drink of me, a woman of Samaria?" (4:9) Yet despite their many differences, late into their conversation she comes to trust in Jesus as he makes himself vulnerable to her. Not long after, extraordinarily, she becomes the first in John's gospel to share the good news of Jesus to the people of her village. She is an example of


having faith by encountering the thirsty, vulnerable, and patient Jesus.

The third is the anonymous Man Born Blind (John 9:1-41). No doubt he has felt miserable his whole life, and not just because he can't see. It was a common understanding at the time that the reason this man was blind was because he was a sinner (or his parents were sinners). This means he had spent his whole life ostracized from the community and treated as a loser. Yet Jesus says there is nothing wrong with this man. As soon as Jesus heals him, this "blind" one starts outsmarting the most powerful religious leaders who had banished him. He is example of the gift of receiving faith, the perfect embodiment of Mary's song to Jesus in her womb: "[God] has brought down the powerful from their thrones and lifted up the lowly." (Luke 1:52)

The fourth and final ones are the two sisters of Lazarus whom Jesus raises from the dead (John 11:1-44). Lazarus usually gets all the attention which, of course, makes sense. But it's really his two sisters, Mary and Martha, who engage Jesus with some of the toughest accusations and questions we know. Neither of them beats around the bush in their grief but instead point their fingers at Jesus and say, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died." (11:21, 32) In their own unique ways, each of them demands that

Jesus make sense of their brother's untimely death. Though not all their questions are answered nor are all their doubts assuaged, just by his loving, compassionate presence Jesus assures them, "I am the resurrection and life. Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live." (11:25) Both of them give us permission to grieve and ask hard questions, and are prime examples of how to trust in Jesus even when we don't know where we're going.

This is your preview to the next four Sundays in Lent!

Making More Space

With increased activity in our sanctuary over the past couple of years, many of our leaders have noticed some challenges in negotiating the open space below the chancel, particularly during funerals and weddings, special programs, and holiday worship services, which often bring extra decorations. Following discussion at the February 17th Church Council meeting, members passed a motion to temporarily remove a single row of pews up front in order to feel how a bit of extra space could work. In addition to creating more space, bread line communion distribution will work a little differently beginning March 8th, with the goal of better accommodating those with mobility challenges. (First Sunday of the month communion at the altar rail will continue as usual.) The council wishes to stress that these changes are tentative and that they welcome everyone's feedback, including how we might better utilize other spaces in the sanctuary.

National Quilting Day 2026



March 21, 2026, is National Quilting Day and this is always celebrated on the 3rd Saturday in March.

“Those who sleep under a quilt, sleep under a blanket of love.”

The tradition of quilting is deeply rooted, dating back as far as 3400 B.C., and it carries with it stories of generations and cultures from across the globe. Thanks to the Kentucky Heritage Quilt Society, where it first appeared on our calendars in 1989. This was the beginning of National Quilting Day, which they initiated a Quilters' Day Out. By 1991, this local event transformed into National Quilting Day. Thanks to the National Quilting Association as they made it official in Lincoln, Nebraska. Since then, this event has become a special day for quilters.

Lutheran World Relief have a lot to celebrate too! For more than 77 years, compassionate people just like the people at St. Paul Lutheran Church of Stillwater have put their faith into action and made quilts for people in need around the world. Not just a few quilts – nearly 29 million quilts! These gifts of love make life brighter, softer and a bit more comfortable for our neighbors around the world struggling with chronic poverty, illness, natural disaster and conflict.

If you would like to join the quilters at St. Paul Lutheran, we quilt every Thursday between 9am-3pm. Come whenever you can fit a Thursday into your schedule. Holy Week

Conference Assembly Update

More than 400 people attended the Conference Assemblies of the Saint Paul Area Synod on Saturday, February 14 at Christ the King Lutheran Church in New Brighton. This included nearly 80 members of our own East Central Conference. We gathered for worship and preaching by Bishop Patricia Lull before splitting off into six conferences for synod business, including nominations of pre-identified candidates for a new bishop to be elected in May at the annual Synod Assembly. Thank you to members Mugs DeFore, Shelley Jokinen and Jenny Brelje for attending with Pastor Nathan. The Greek word "synod" means "to walk together" and refers to the 106 congregations and mission starts on the eastern side of the Twin Cities. Our synod unites the work of congregations in our area, provides support to pastors and congregations, creates mutually transformative partnerships, and emboldens witness for justice.

2026 Summer Internships

Applications are beginning to come in for the Saint Paul Area Synod's summer internship program, which offers young adults the opportunity to learn, serve and reflect. Up to 10 interns ages 17-21 will work 20-24 hours per week from June 1 through Aug. 7 (with flexible scheduling). They will be paid a generous \$4,000 stipend for their work, thanks to funding from the synod's Planting Hope Campaign! Most of their hours will be at individual internship sites, working closely with a site supervisor. Some sites will have multiple interns. The 10 interns will also gather weekly as a cohort for connection, support, worship, field trips and more. Each intern is matched with a specific site, which may be a congregation or a non-profit such as Lutheran Social Service, Shobi's Table Food Truck, Daily Work, Lyngblomsten or Community Partners with Youth. Bells Across America

Bells began ringing out across Minnesota on Saturday, February 7th, and now bells across the United States are invited to join in bell ringing for 10 minutes every Saturday at noon until April 4th. An Invitation to Attend Lenten Programs

Have you realized that Easter is early this year? Determining when Easter will be celebrated each year is based on a calculation between the lunar months and the solar year. Too complicated for the average person to figure. In 2026, Easter will be observed on April 5th. Just to keep you following the timeline, the Mission Outreach committee is inviting you to participate in the observance of Lent by attending the Wednesday worship services at 11:30 AM, followed by our traditional soup lunch. The first will be on Ash Wednesday, February 18th, and every Wednesday following, including Maundy Thursday.

We offer food, fellowship, and socializing along with a variety of soups and chili made especially for us by the chef from the Lowell Inn. All soups and chili are salt-free, and of course, there are plenty of tasty desserts. We request a free will donation to cover the costs of food. In previous years, we have always sponsored a project. These projects have been those associated with our partnership in Tanzania or local non-profits that strive to improve the lives of others. This year, we are supporting the new Washington Co. Services building, which recently opened in 2025. Living space, as well as many services to improve lives, is provided for individuals with no permanent living arrangement. An organization called Stepping Stone oversees and provides services with temporary housing and assistance for individuals to become employed and live in regular housing.

A Stepping Stone staff member, Shvonne Johnson, recently delivered a presentation to the Mission Outreach Committee. The committee decided to have a material collection for residents of this program as a part of our Lenten outreach. We are asking for donations of cleaning supplies, personal care products, towels, pillows, etc. **We have copies of the list of needed items in the Gathering Area for you to take***. Men's and women's boots are in high demand. We welcome the congregation members who don't attend the

noon programs to also participate by adding items to the collection box located in the Gathering Area. This project will run during the weeks of Lent. If you would rather give money to have the Mission Outreach Committee purchase items, please provide that information with your donation.

The Mission Outreach Committee sincerely appreciates the support of St. Paul Lutheran members as we reach out to better the lives of others in our community.
