Is Light a Positive or Negative Experience?

I recently participated in a conversation around the positive and negative effects of light. The conversation went from the extremes of sunlight and skin cancer to the negative effects of an atomic blast to the light that is required to grow healthy fruits, plants, and vegetables. It was an interesting conversation, and one I continue to reflect upon.

I also recall several conversations about the introduction of electric lights into homes and about what lighting some neighborhoods accomplished. Crime decreased in some areas, and light improved the household's overall well-being. Another person commented on the change that took place once a neighborhood ballfield was illuminated. All of a sudden, the evening, which was typically "family time," was replaced by additional playtime on the ballfield. These conversations have made me reflect on the power of light.

The Christian mission is built upon the truth that the light of Christ came into the world, bringing hope, salvation, and healing. The presence of Christ and this light is always good. While it highlights the selfish ways of men

and women, it also points to a solution to this reality. Our problem is clearly described in the opening passage of the Gospel of John:

He was in the world, and though the world was made through him, the world did not recognize him. He came to that which was his own, but his own did not receive him. Yet to all who did receive him, to those who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God. (NIV)

The "He" in this passage is the person of Jesus Christ, very God of very God, who stepped into the world to save the world. This passage also states our situation: we do not always recognize the light and presence of God.

However, our response does not control God, who desires that we step into this light. The only way I have been able to grow in this light and reflect the hope of God is by being involved in worship, prayer, and giving of my time, talent, and resources. Just as playing on that lit ballfield was exciting, living in the light of Christ is exciting and life-changing. This year, I hope and pray you will join me and my family in taking another step closer to what God offers and hopes for us. The light of God encourages spiritual growth and is built upon the gifts of salvation and transformation.

Through February 15 in Room 309

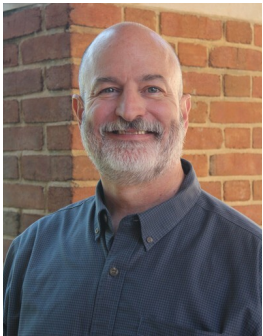

Adult Forum Lectures

Randolph Memorial Hall

February 15: Dr. Jeff Leonard, Professor of Biblical Studies at Samford University, joins us to discuss two themes: “The Bible’s Elusive God” (February 1) and “Seeking an Elusive God” (February 15). Both are explored in his latest book *Seekers in the Hands of Elusive God: Embracing Hope in Seasons of Darkness*. This book explains the scriptural dynamic of an omnipresent but elusive God. It is when we fail to search for God that our view of who God truly is becomes distorted and our own spiritual health diminishes. So how, then, are we called to seek God? Dr. Leonard considers a variety of avenues-Scripture, nature, humanity, worship, silence, doubt, suffering, death, and joy- through which even those of us who wrestle with spiritual loneliness can pursue the face of God.
At Samford, Dr. Leonard teaches courses in Hebrew, the Hebrew Bible, and ancient Near Eastern literature and religion. He earned his doctorate at Brandeis University. He is the author of *Creation Rediscovered: Finding New Meaning in an Ancient Story* (2020), and a two-volume commentary on the book of Exodus, *The Preacher’s Hebrew Companion to Exodus* (2023).
- February 8: Bevelle Worthen will lead us through the concept of "Radical Grace." Huey mentioned Radical Grace in a sermon last fall, and it sparked a great conversation with Bevelle. Her passion for this growing theology seeking to understand the fullness of God's grace is inspiring. She has found many helpful resources, where she follows preachers and thinkers who can help us all continue this conversation beyond the class itself.

From Our GED Program

Celebrating Shannon



Shannon entered the St. Mary's GED program in 2009, 17 years ago, when her oldest child was 8 months old. Shannon is now the mother of 5 beautiful children, all of whom have spent time in the loving care of St. Mary's.

In December, Shannon took the final section of her GED for the 7th time. The day before the test, she asked the St. Mary's GED staff for prayers, so we held hands and stood in the parking lot, each prayer leading into another. Shannon's tearful prayer was one of thanksgiving for all the gifts she has been given and the request that God's will be done – not hers, but HIS. I walked away from that moment revealing in the beauty of Shannon's prayer. She became a child, full of love and thanksgiving for her father in heaven, despite wanting a gift for herself. I felt the beauty and power of her prayer in that moment.

When we celebrated that she passed that test and obtained her GED, Shannon and I discussed those moments of prayer during which we each received a gift. I learned to be more thankful like the youngest children, and Shannon learned to trust God again. While we were praying, Shannon said she was looking at the angels in the stained-glass windows of the church, and through our prayer, she gave her trust back to God.

Life for Shannon has not been easy, and she had given up on prayer and lost faith in God's promise that anything is possible with Him. She was discouraged and felt her work was all for nothing. But the prayer with the GED staff gave her new hope, new belief that she could pass the test which had held her back for so long. **AND SHE DID!** The very next morning, with renewed hope in God and confidence in her abilities, SHE PASSED!

Through each other, we strengthened our faith. God brought us together to remind us of His great love for us, the power of prayer, and the gift of Christian community.

Shannon will graduate with the class of 2026, the same year her daughter will graduate, and will go on to nursing school as her daughter goes to college. What a win for Shannon, thanks be to God!

Thank you for supporting all of our GED students with time and love and encouragement-all things are possible!
