

Hello my name is.... You have probably seen those sticker nametags at some point in your life. They are definitely helpful if you are at a party or event, so that you might know people's names to introduce yourself and to likewise be able to call someone by their name, without asking. A name is personal and just knowing someone's name can really help to break the ice. I happen to like the idea of nametags and often muse to myself, we have such nice nametag holders in the narthex of our church that collect dust.

Certainly, using nametags would help our visitors feel a little less intimidated. Yet that is not the real subject of this month's article. Instead, I figured we could touch on what goes in a name. Not your name, but mine. Let me start off by saying this hasn't been an issue in our church, yet I figured it would be worthy for us to consider.

Some of you might not even know my full name. Did you know my name is actually Douglas Scot Kerns II? Yes, before you even ask, of course I was named after my father. He would be Douglas Scot Kerns (the first, technically). So, truth is, while my first name is Douglas, I have actually never gone by Douglas in my life. Instead, I have always gone by my middle name which is Scot. Yet it strikes me as absolutely foreign and a little bit disrespectful when I go to another congregation and I have some of their members who refer to me as Pastor Scot. While they are no doubt trying to be respectful, they are truly misses a larger and more important point.

The point is I am your pastor! Your pastor who is called by God to preach the Word faithfully and rightly administer the Sacraments. Your pastor who is there for you for baptisms, confirmations, weddings, and even burials. Your pastor who walks with you and guides you through all of life, both the highest highs and the lowest lows. I am your pastor, thus pastor is my first name for you. In Latin, the word for pastor actually means shepherd and emphasizes care for the flock of God and the spiritual guidance that a pastor as a shepherd gives to the sheep.

Pastor is not the exclusive title that could be used for someone in my position. Sometimes in more formal settings, you might use terms like Reverend, Minister, or Cleric. All three of these titles convey roughly the same amount of formality and commonality among clergy yet are used in different circumstances. Speaking of circumstances, as a pastor who frequently wears his clerical collar out in public, the title by which I am most often addressed is Father. I must look very Roman Catholic!

Truth be told, you are more than welcome to call me Father Kerns if old Roman Catholic sensibilities kick in; it is totally acceptable. It is way more appropriate than Pastor Scot or Scot. Paul even refers to himself as Father to the people in Corinth in Christ Jesus through the Gospel. (1 Corinthians 4:15) The idea of Father is similar to that of Pastor in that it embodies care and guidance of the people of God. That is what it is all about. I care about you and I am there for you as indeed your pastor. Please feel free to continue calling me Pastor Kerns or Pastor.

RAMBLINGS FROM THE HEAD ELDER

HOW BUTTER FUELED THE PROTESTANT REFORMATION

Having just finished up the Christmas baking season, I found this story, written by Dave Roos quite interesting.

The story begins in Medieval Europe, where "fast days" were a big deal. According to "Butter, a Rich History" by Elaine Khosrova, the tradition started with monks abstaining from eating any animal products on Wednesdays, Fridays, Saturdays and all during Lent, the 40-day period leading up to Easter. Meat and dairy was believed to fuel lust, writes Khosrova. Eventually the Church extended the fast day rules to all Christians - no meat, milk, eggs, animal fats or butter.

The problem was that the Roman Catholic Church was centered in, you guessed it, Rome. And people in Southern Europe didn't eat a lot of butter back in the 15th and 16th century. Their diet was dominated by fish and olive oil, both of which were totally acceptable on fast days. Up north in dairy-farming countries like France and Germany, cutting butter from the diet was a much bigger deal. After losing meat and cheese, there was pretty much nothing left. And since fast days covered almost half the calendar year, the butter ban was akin to starvation.

For well-connected royalty and other wealthy faithful, the church was known to grant reprieves or "dispensations" on the butter ban. Other powerful petitioners made contributions to Rome - alms for chapel construction and money to fund the crusades - in return for exemptions to eat butter.

Meanwhile, the poor faithful in Luther's parish were stuck with the "no butter" rule. Even worse, enterprising exporters from Southern Europe were selling oil to the northern countries to use on fast days. Not only was the oil much more expensive compared to local butter, but it was low quality.

"In Rome, they make a mockery fasting, while forcing us to eat an oil they themselves would not use to grease their slippers," Luther wrote in "An open letter to the Christian nobility of the German nation" published in 1520.

But the worst offense, according to Luther, was that some clergymen were traveling around Germany selling indulgences for the sin of eating butter on fast days. Indulgences were official church pardons that had been part of Roman Catholic doctrine for centuries, but were only to be given under the condition of contrite confessions. There is that dirty word, INDULGENCES.

"They sell us the right to eat foods forbidden on fast days... but they have stolen that same liberty from us with their ecclesiastical laws," wrote Luther. "Eating butter, they say, is a greater sin than to lie, blaspheme, or indulge in impurity."

"It seems hardly a coincidence," writes butter historian Khosrova, "that most of the dairy-rich countries producing and using butter were the same nations that broke away from the Roman Catholic Church in the sixteenth century."

"That was one of Luther's biggest teachings - nothing about eating, drinking, sleeping, marrying is sin. Not believing in God is sin," says Kirs Stjerna, Professor of Lutheran History and Theology at the Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary. "In other words, everything is cool. Eating butter is cool. One of the reasons why the Reformation was so successful was that Luther radically changed how people thought about what's wrong and what's permissible."

Luther's teachings, which spread rapidly thanks to the new-fangled printing press, forever altered the course of Christian history...and the sweets we eat at Christmas.

4TH ANNUAL FAITH AND FITNESS CLASS

Dear Members of Faith Lutheran Church,

As part of a community outreach program, I would like to offer the 4th Annual Faith and Fitness Class. This would be a 6 week program which would meet on Tuesdays and Fridays for approximately 60-90 minutes. **This 6 week program starts February 10th and end March 20, 2026. The classes will be from 10:30 am to 12 noon in Fellowship Hall.** These classes are intended for those individuals that may answer yes to any of these 3 questions:

- **Do you use a cane or a walker?**
- **Do you feel unsteady on your feet?**
- **Have you fallen in the past year?**

Of course others can join us, but this will not be a high impact exercise class. It will be offered to get people moving and offer some strengthening/balancing exercises to help prevent falls.

Emphasis is placed on flexibility, balance and core strength. Each routine will offer a modification to meet the ability of the participant. The first class will include an overview of terminology, such as the importance of warm up, cool down, sets, reps, etc.. Activity will most likely be 30-45 minutes.

An informal devotion will be offered during this time as well. This devotional time can include a time of thanks, prayer requests, perhaps a reading from Portals of Prayers or a short inspirational story from Guidepost, or a devotion from the Lutheran Hour Ministries. Participants could also reflect on their favorite bible passage and why it means so much to them. Simply, a time of thanks and sharing what makes us faithful.

I believe in having a set start time and end time, so participants can fit other activities into their busy lifestyles. I am willing to offer blood pressure monitoring and educating members on how to monitor their own pulse and certainly remind participants and members of our church on where the AED is located.

About Me:

I have a teaching degree in Health and Physical Education and a Masters degree in Clinical Exercise Physiology. I spent 40 years in the field of Cardiac and Pulmonary rehabilitation and retired in January of 2022 from Lehigh Valley Health Network. I look forward to sharing my skill set to members of Faith Lutheran Church and perhaps friends from the community.






