Using AI (Artificial Intelligence)

For many the use of artificial intelligence, or AI as it is known, is a foreign sounding concept. A concept that sounds like it is out of some sort of science fiction author's brain or something akin to flying cars or giving life to the artificial Frankenstein monster. Yet AI is most definitely real and used in a whole host of different ways right now and will be further developed into the future. From internet search engines to Amazon product suggestions to automated telephone systems, AI has been growing into something that is hard to get away from.

Sometimes, it is not even perceptible that AI has been used. In fact, did you notice something different about last month's newsletter? You probably did not notice that both the cover image and the contents of my Pastoral newsletter article were created using AI. To be clear, this was done on purpose and, at least for my Pastoral newsletter article, will not be used again. While the contents of the newsletter article were definitely read and scrutinized by me, it was not me. It is the expectation that the articles in the newsletter are written by the people to whom they are attributed. Anything not attributed to the person who wrote it is plagiarism. Thus, last month's article will be corrected with proper attribution now that the point has been made. A related point was also to show both an AI generated image and an AI generated article can serve a valid purpose as well.

The article last month detailed the early history of the Lutheran church from 1517 to 1580. (Still worth a read if you have not read it yet!) At the same time as AI grows in prevalence and sophistication, it is important to consider what effective use of AI might look like in the church and also what uses of AI should be out of boundaries for our church. This is something not just our local church is grappling with, but also our church body at large. In fact, at the Eastern District Convention held in June of this year in North Tonawanda, NY, a resolution was brought forward and adopted to propose that the Synod form "a task force to further study the use of artificial intelligence (AI) technology in ministry and the general life of God's people, requesting a joint document from the LCMS Council of Presidents, the Office of the President and the Commission on Theology and Church Relations for practical guidance for individuals and congregation in the use of AI".

While we wait to hear if the Synod will adopt our Eastern District resolution in July 2026, further study and consideration should be given. As I was preparing to write this article, I found a very interesting article in Lutheran Witness (https://witness.lcms.org/2020/artificial-intelligence) centered on artificial intelligence. While this article is dated as it relates to new and emerging technologies, ie, it is five years old, still some of the principles remain true for us to consider. One of the facets of the article that I found particularly interesting and applicable was their proposed "neighbor test". The neighbor test asks of AI technology and how it affects our neighbor. The article outlines the questions as: "Does our use of AI benefit or hurt our neighbors? Is this technology being deployed to the health, well-being and flourishing of all our neighbors or just a few of them? Will this technology help our neighbors in the short term and then harm them in the long term?"

Ultimately, the question must be asked, will these tools be used to help or harm our neighbors? Or a related question, will these tools cause us to rely more on our own knowledge or understanding rather than looking to God and what He has done and said to us. Especially as we hear Him in Job 28:28, "And he said to man, 'Behold, the fear of the Lord, that is wisdom, and to turn away from evil is understanding." May we always look to God for all comfort and assurance that He along can bring. With repentance and humility we are called from our evil ways back to God. It is in God that He then indeed works in us to care for and help our neighbor. The omniscience of God (God's wisdom) is most clearly expressed in that He sent His only begotten Son to save us. May we always trust in this knowledge for it leads to eternal life. Amen.

RAMBLINGS FROM THE HEAD ELDER

his month's rambling is partially authored by two people that are not me. For those of you that have not sat in on the weekly "Coffee and Catechism" that follows Sunday worship at Faith, this might be new information for you. The following is just one of many topics that we have very lively discussions about each Sunday. The comments below by Dr. Alvin Schmidt came across my Facebook feed the other morning and after reading it I thought to myself that it could have been a conversation that might have taken place in Fellowship Hall. And Jason Nota's comments makes a great follow-up to Dr. Schmidt's since Jason's Blog is written in a manner that even I can understand.

So, I thought I would share it with you all. The next time you find yourself wondering about what makes Lutheranism different, here is one piece of the matrix.

"In Lutheran parlance, Word and Sacrament are readily understood and, at times, have become a cliché. It is not a phrase you hear outside of Lutheran theological circles. Word and Sacrament basically sum up the Lutheran conviction, belief that we are converted through the Word and strengthened in faith in Christ through the Word and Sacraments, basically baptism, which not only makes us a member of Christ's Church, but also a daily repentance and forgiveness as we drown the old Adam. Likewise, with the Sacrament of the Altar, we receive the body and blood of Christ for the forgiveness of sins, strengthening, and for the perseverance of our faith in Christ.

There are two Sacraments. Luther, in his early writings, spoke of three (confession

and absolution), but later of only two, and not seven, because the Lord did not institute things like confirmation, or the other four added by the Catholic Church. Luther was influenced by St. Augustine, who defined a Sacrament as having a visible element connected to God's Word. Obviously, Luther, being once an Augustinian monk, picked up on that. It's a good definition."

The term "Sacrament of the Altar" is unique to Lutheranism. According to Dr. Schmidt, it had basically replaced the word "Mass" in referring to the Lord's Supper after 1580. Most Protestants refer to the Lord's Supper as an "ordinance," and they receive the meal in their pews. Many Protestant churches don't even have an altar, let alone an altar rail; instead, they have a raised platform with a pulpit.

Dr. Schmidt doesn't like having the name "Lutheran" subsumed under "Protestantism," and for good reason, but that's how our society operates -Protestant, Catholic, and Jew are the three categories often spoken about. The word "Protestant" was taken by the people who departed from the Lutherans, particularly on the Sacraments. Most Protestants don't accept the means of grace as we teach them in our churches. Right there, we have two major reasons Lutherans are not the same as other Protestants, and why they shouldn't be subsumed under that name. Jason Nota

KIDS' CORNER




Welcome to the "Kids' Corner," where families and congregant members can stay up to date with Sunday School material and Children's Ministry offerings!




