ELMORE COUNTY FAIR GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS



Throughout the Rules and Regulations, the word "exhibitor" refers to, but is not limited to 4H, FFA, and Open Class participants.

- 1. The Elmore County Fair and Rodeo will not be responsible in any way for any loss, damage or injury of any character to any property, article, animal or person while the same is on the Fairgrounds.
- 2. NO DOGS ALLOWED ON THE FAIRGROUNDS UNLESS ENTERED IN A COMPETITION OR SERVICE DOGS.
- 3. ATV/GOLF CARTS are not allowed on or about the Fairgrounds, with the exception of security and fair officials (unless prior approval by Fair Manager.)
- 4. Driving through the campground will not be permitted starting Tuesday @ 11:59 pm of fair week and will not open back up for vehicles and/or camp trailer removal till Sunday @ 5am. All vehicles must be parked in the general parking area or by the mini horse arena.
- If you are handicapped and need assistance, please let the fair manager know
- Campsites will be assigned in the following order: Fair Board Members, 4H/FFA, and vendors until all campsites are filled.
- 7. Only dogs being shown in 4-H are allowed on fairgrounds and must be on a leash at all times. Campers will be held financially responsible for any damages or trash left behind that occurs at the assigned campsite during the week of fair.

- 8. Children are not to be left unattended at the fairground's campsites overnight and/or extended periods of time during fair week. Parent/guardians must sign a waiver stating they will be at the fairgrounds with their child/children at all times.
- 9. Unruly behavior or disturbing the peace during the week of fair will result in the campers leaving the premises for the remainder of the fair and not allowed to reserve a campsite the following year for fair week.
- 10. NO ALCOHOL from camping area in fair midway, vendor area or grandstand events.
 - 11. No glass bottles on fairgrounds premises.

YOUTH / OPEN EXHIBITORS

- 1. The Elmore County Fair and Rodeo will not be responsible in any way for any loss, damage or injury of any character to any property, article, animal or person while the same is on the Fairgrounds. Presentation of animals for exhibition shall be deemed acceptance of this
- 2. Unless otherwise noted, livestock must remain on the grounds throughout the Fair and will not be released until Sunday after 9:00 am.
- 3. Exhibitors will give personal attention to such displays that require close personal attention. Exhibits not properly attended to will have to be removed from the premises.
- Exhibitors must prepare and decorate their area.
 The Fair does not furnish materials or labor for preparing or decorating.











CONCESSIONS AND SPECIAL EXHIBITS

- 1. The Elmore County Fair and Rodeo will not be responsible in any way for any loss, damage or injury of any character to any property, article, animal, or person while the same is on the Fairgrounds. Presentation of said property shall be deemed acceptance of this rule.
- 2. All concessions and special exhibits must remain on grounds throughout the Fair, leaving Sunday morning unless other arrangements have been approved by Fair Manager.
- All concession and special exhibits having displays require close personal attention. Concessions and exhibits not properly attended to will be removed from the premises.
- 4. All concessions and special exhibits must be secure under contract from the Fair Manager and must occupy such spaces as are assigned to them and must be removed within two (2) days after fair or it becomes property of the County unless arrangements have been provided.

- 5. Concession stands are required to be neat and substantial and must comply with local and state Health Department regulations.
- 6. No contract will be issued to any exhibitor or concessionaire presenting any exhibit deemed to be unethical or objectionable. Any holder of concession who violates any law of the State or regulation of the Fair, shall forfeit his/her space. All fees for exhibit space, parking and admission shall be forfeited
- 7. Posting or distribution of posters, handbills, and other advertising material is prohibited except from the booth of licensed exhibitors and concessionaires.
- 8. Food & Drinks in designated areas of Expo Building.





ANIMAL HEALTH

These guidelines have been established by the <u>Fair Management</u> for all animal exhibitors to include 4H/ FFA, and Open Class.

- 1. Each exhibitor is responsible to see his or her entry is in good health when received at the Fair.
- 2. The Department Superintendent or the Fair Manager may determine if veterinary assistance is needed for each entry.
- 3. The exhibitor will be responsible for any expense incurred for the treatment of any livestock entry.
- 4. To enter the Fairgrounds, all livestock and poultry, of any age or class, must be sound, of good health and show no sign or communicable disease. Any animal or fowl developing clinical evidence of disease after entering the Fairgrounds may not show and shall be subject to expulsion, depending upon the nature and seriousness of the disease.
- 5. Should the veterinarian concur with the Superintendent or Fair Manager that any entry is unfit for participation in the Fair, the entry must be removed from the Fairgrounds.

RULES OF THE ARENA AND SHOW RINGS

GOVERNING LIVESTOCK DEPARTMENTS AND OPEN CLASS See rules governing youth Fair participants exhibiting livestock on page 47.







EXHIBIT INFORMATION FOR OPEN CLASS

- 1. Any rule/regulation in this book (unless it is a printing or typographical error) stands as printed unless changed by the Fair Board.
- Refer to Department for additional show rules.
- 3. In all cases, the decision of the judge is FINAL.
- 4. No animal or article may compete in more than one Class except in Champion Classes.
- 5. All exhibits must be in place as specified in the Special Rules of the Department. All Open Class Home Arts, and 4-H will be released Sunday, July 20, 9:00 am to noon. Premiums will be paid out during that time ONLY. To receive exhibit or premium, you must have your property claim check.
- 6. Where there is but one exhibit in a Class, the award shall be made on merit alone.
- 7. Judges will be selected and approved by the Open Class Manager/Supervisor prior to the Fair.
- 8. The owner or custodian of property of any kind brought to the Fairgrounds, either for exhibit or for other purposes, assumes responsibility for its loss, damage, or injury to any person or the property of any person by any animal owned or exhibited by him and shall indemnify the said Elmore County Fair against all claims and any injuries or damage arising from actions or negligence of exhibitors.

- No entries prior to or after these hours will be accepted without prior approval of the Open Class Chairman
- 12. All entries will be classified as professional, amateur, or novice, as defined below:

Professional: Teaches these services or receives income from sales of material to be exhibited. **Advanced Amateur:** Someone who has had some training or uses special equipment to create exhibits.

Novice/Amateur: A person with no training and producing for their own pleasure.

- 13. Exhibits not claimed within one week of the Fair will be considered abandoned and will be disposed of as the Fair Manager sees fit.
- 14. Age divisions for Open Class are determined by each Department. Please refer to Department rules for specific age categories.

GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR OPEN CLASS DEPARTMENTS (entry example)

- 1. Open Class exhibits are open to the world. Division heads are authorized to accept entries not listed in the Fair Premium Book if there is space and if they judge the entry to be worthy.
- 2. Entry dates are listed in each specific department.
- 3. All exhibitors must be of Amateur or Novice standing except where special categories are listed at the Elmore County Fair for Professionals. See definition of Amateur/Novice, Advanced Amateur and Professional in Exhibit Information. Page 7.
- 4. Exhibitors are asked to complete their own entry blanks prior to entry time. All entries must be listed on entry blanks provided by the Elmore County Fair. Separate entry blanks must be used for each department.
- 5. Exhibits previously shown at the Elmore County Fair will not be judged.
- 6. All exhibits, when assigned space, become subject to the control of the Department Superintendent.

- 7. All exhibits must bear the entry tag given by the clerk at the time of entry and that of the stub held by the exhibitor.
- 8. Where there is one exhibit in a Class, the award shall be made on merit alone.
- 9. Exhibitors must present their claim check to Superintendents or clerks in charge of various Departments before exhibits will be released.

 <u>Exhibitors are NOT allowed to remove their own displays.</u> (For exceptions, see Department Superintendent.)
- 10. Exhibitors may make only one entry in each Class, except as specified in the Class rules of each Department.
- 11. The owner or custodian of property of any kind brought to the Fairgrounds, either for exhibit or for other purposes, assumes as a condition of its admission to the grounds all risk of and responsibility for its loss, damage, or theft.
- 12. The decisions of the judges are final. Exhibits not claimed within one week of the Fair will be considered abandoned.

<u>Fair Theme</u>: This year's theme is BEES. Any items relating to BEES are entered automatically into this contest. Items related to the fair theme will be automatically judged per department. DEPARTMENT 4: PHOTOGRAPHY

Superintendent: Charlotte Moody-Emerson

See General Rules and Regulations. Read carefully. When submitting your photograph, please ensure it is entered in the class that best aligns with its subject matter. For example, if you have a photograph of a rose, ask yourself: are you focusing on the rose itself or the scenery behind it? This will help determine which class best suits your image. If you submit the photo in the "Scenic" class but your focus is on the rose, it will be judged according to the criteria for that class and may not perform as well as it could in a different category.

The choice of which class to enter is entirely yours. While the Superintendent can guide you by providing more information about the classes, they cannot make the final decision for you. The ultimate choice of which class to submit your work in rests with you.

Please submit your work in the location that best reflects your original intention for the piece. We wish you the best of luck in your submission!

Photography Entry Rules

- A. All photographs must have been taken within the last 2 years by the exhibitor.
- B. All entries (both professional and amateur) may be color or black and white.
- C. More than one entry within the same class is permitted, but take note: you will be competing against yourself!
- D. No photographs entered in the Elmore County Fair in previous years may be entered again. However, photos previously entered in other competitions or fairs will be permitted.
- E. All entries must be mounted on foam core board (a lightweight material consisting of two sheets of cardboard with a thin layer of styrofoam in between) or mount board (a super-durable, extremely strong cardboard). Entries should be no more than 3/16" thick.
- F. No other mounting materials will be accepted. "Mounted" means the photograph must be affixed,

glued, or adhered to the board and trimmed to the exact size of the photograph.

- G. Framed and/or matted photographs will not be accepted. Plastic sleeves or other protective coverings will not be accepted.
 - a. TIP: Ensure your photograph is firmly attached to the mount board or foam core to prevent separation due to summer heat and humidity.
- H. Photo size requirements:
 - a. The smallest permitted size: 8" x 10"
 - b. The largest permitted size: 16" x 20" (trimmed to the edge of the photograph, with no borders).
 - c. On the back of each entry, in the upper left corner, plainly print the following information:
 - d. Exhibitor's Name, Address, Phone Number, Dept, Div, Sect, and Class.
- I. Any photo deemed inappropriate for public display by the Fair Board and/or Superintendent will not be accepted into the Open Class.

- Exhibitors should come with specimens in glass containers ready for entry. Be certain you enter in proper category with exact number of specimens as listed!
- If only exhibit in Section and Class, awards will be issued on merit only. The decision of the judge is final.
- All entries must be the work of the exhibitor only. No artificial flowers or foliage permitted!
- No design may be made on the premises. A table will be available for making minor adjustments ONLY before entry.
- All containers should be marked underneath with owner's name. The Show Committee shall not be responsible for containers lost or broken.
- Boxes and containers used to transport specimens must be removed from the building upon completion of entry.
- To improve the appearance of the Flower Show, the Show Committee shall have the right to remove any exhibit, or any part of exhibit, or replenish exhibit which has become unsightly only after the judging is complete. ELMORE COUNTY FAIR YOUTH EXHIBITORS GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

- 1. The Fair Board reserves the right to refuse admittance or demand removal of any animal from the grounds which may endanger the public safety, health or standards and qualifications set forth by the Fair as determined by *Fair Management*.
- 2. The <u>animal care/welfare committee</u>, consisting of the Livestock Superintendent from each youth group, the Fair Manager, and a Fair Board Member, shall inspect each livestock barn on a daily basis to ensure that all animals have proper feed, water and clean surroundings.
- 3. The Fair Manager will assign stalls and pens. Stalls and pens will be assigned in the following order: 4-H/FFA and Open Class Show.
- 4. Youth must be eight (8) years of age by January 1st, *of the current fair year*, to be assigned a stall or pen.
- 5. Youth not of age, (8) years of age by January 1st, *of the current fair year*, are to arrive on the Fairgrounds the morning of their class and depart the same day.
- 6. No diseased stock will be assigned space on the Fairgrounds.

- 7. Classes can be changed or combined at the discretion of the *Fair Management*.
- 8. Exhibitors shall not attach evidence of previous awards to any animal or article prior to being judged.
- 9. Exhibitors shall furnish bedding and other feeds at his or her own expense.
- 10. Every Exhibitor of livestock is expected to keep his or her pens and stalls clean and sanitary. Stalls and pens must be cleaned by 10:00 am each day.
- 11. Exhibitors are responsible for knowing the hours of judging, parades, etc. Stock must be in the Show Ring for judging or for stock judging contest at the request of the Superintendent.
- 12. No animal is eligible for entry in both market and breeding classes.
- 13. 4-H/FFA members may sell only one livestock animal.
- 14. 4-H members may sell more then one livestock animal if each livestock project has been awarded with Grand or Reserve Grand Champion in their respective divisions.

NATIONAL CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

IAFE (INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF FAIRS AND EXPOSITIONS)

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

- 1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
- Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
- Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
- 4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of drugs. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event, which culminates with the animal entering the food chain, shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statues, regulations

and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event. If the laboratory report on the chemical analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested (by the approved laboratory to which it is sent) is the one taken from the animal in question. Its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise at any hearing in regard to the matter conducted by the fair or livestock show.

At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

- 5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
- The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
- 7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair, or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation, and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.

- 8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
- 9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
- 10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have any disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show against such individuals published in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notices to members.
- 11. The act of entering an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

Any violation of "The National Show Ring Code Of Ethics" or specific rules as designated by individual fairs and livestock shows will result in forfeiture of premiums and awards, disqualification, and may result in probationary status and/or loss of eligibility for future participation in organized livestock competition.

Possible civil penalties may be imposed by the proper authorities, based on evidence provided by the livestock show, of exhibitors in violation of the Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act or the animal mistreatment, neglect, and abandonment laws that apply on the local, state, and national levels.

The decision of the livestock show management will be final. Other cooperating shows (The International Association of Fairs and Expositions, The American Livestock Show & Rodeo Managers Association, and Western Fairs Assn.) will be notified of the action taken by the show management, which may affect

the eligibility of the individual, group, or sponsoring organization for participation at other shows who are also members of these organizations.

By making entry in a livestock show or event you are verifying you have read "The National Show Ring Code of Ethics" and understand the consequences of the penalties involved for illegal, unethical, inhumane, and unfair practices of competition. You also verify that you and your family may be prohibited from future participation in organized fairs and livestock shows in the united States, and could face possible criminal prosecution and/ or civil penalties if implicated in any of the aforementioned acts.

Pam particularly cherished the Elmore County Fair during her tenure as a 4-H leader, creating fond memories of camping during fair week and watching the children excel in their projects. Many of their former club members have grown up and continued the 4-H tradition, becoming leaders and active citizens within the Glenns Ferry community.

Rusty and Pam's dedication to Glenns Ferry extends beyond farming and 4-H. In 2022, they purchased and donated land situated between Campbell Tractor Company and the Glenns Ferry Pool to the Eastern Elmore County Recreation District. This donation catalyzed the development of the Billie Dee No-



ble Sports Park—a new little league and softball field, complete with a walking path and trees—which was completed in November 2024. Glenns Ferry has already experienced positive impacts from this project, including increased participation in youth sports, improved facilities, and enhanced local business support due to hosting more little league games and softball tournaments than ever before.

The community is deeply grateful to the Johnson family for recognizing and addressing the need for better opportunities for our youth, families, and businesses. Their contribution will resonate for generations to come.
