





For All Young Families Parent Tips Week Three

Tip of the week:

Explain what is going on at the Altlar

Today we move to the final two

parts: the Liturgy of the Eucharist and the Concluding Rites. There is a lot going on during the Liturgy of the Eucharist and it may be helpful to sit where your children are able to see the altar if that is comfortable for your family. Point out to your child that as we move into this part of the Mass the "action" will shifts from the ambo to the altar, so our attention should focus on the altar. It can be helpful to quietly talk children through this part of the Mass.

Ask your child to watch to see the gifts being brought to, or placed by the priest, on the altar. What do they see? Sometimes it may be difficult to see, but the chalice (which will receive the wine) as well as the paten (which holds the host) will be placed on the altar. They may also see the vessels for the water and wine. The priest will then pray the Eucharistic Prayer. Older children may be able to follow along in the missal, but this may be a longer prayer for little ones. However, even young children will become familiar and will be able to join in the prayers as they learn (more on this next week). If you are at a Mass where the bells are rung as the priest elevates the host and chalice, this is a wonderful auditory cue for children to focus their attention on the altar during this time of Consecration. It is at this time, using Jesus' own words that the bread and wine are miraculously changed into the Body and Blood of Christ Jesus! It is here that we reach the high point of the Mass. By reading Matthew 26:17-30 at home, your child will be familiar with the story of the Last Supper and the words of Consecration. You can ask them to listen for those same words during Mass. We are soon brought to Communion. This is obviously an opportunity for our children to get out of the pew and walk toward the altar. Many don't understand why their parents "get" something when they cannot. Assure them that they too will be able to receive the gift of Jesus in this way when they are a little older and learn more! In the meantime, we can help them learn to approach the altar reverently and although they may not receive Communion yet, they can cross their arms over their chest "like a pretzel" and receive a special blessing from the priest (or the Eucharistic Minister will ask God's blessing for them). After Communion we have the final part of the Mass, the Concluding Rites. It is at this time that we receive the final blessing and dismissal.

Feel free to borrow any of the Missals for Children or other books at the back of the Church to help your children learn more about the Mass!
