To assist in your tour selection, please note the symbol(s) accompanying each tour description. They represent the following:

	<p>EASY: These excursions include walking for short distances over relatively level terrain, possibly with gravel and/or unpaved walkways or a few steps. Participants should have ambulatory capability in order to move into and out of ground transportation, such as motor coaches or railcars, and into and out of confined spaces, such as small aircrafts and small boats.</p>
	<p>MODERATE: These slightly more active excursions involve an increased amount of physical activity, such as substantial walking over uneven terrain, climbing stairs or extended periods of standing. Comfortable, sturdy shoes are recommended.</p>
	<p>STRENUOUS: These very active excursions involve physical exertion over an extended period of time. Terrain may be uneven or steep. Activities such as canoeing, biking, hiking or kayaking are examples. Participants should be in good physical condition.</p>
	<p>This symbol indicates that the majority of the tour is accessible to guests utilizing wheelchairs. Portions of the tours that don't meet accessibility requirements are defined in the tour descriptions. Many guests using wheelchairs can be accommodated on tours reserved for those with mobility limitations.</p>

Fishing Guidelines



The experience

For many visitors, their Alaska experience would not be complete without a fishing excursion. The information below is provided to help answer questions regarding fishing conditions, regulations and licensing for the State of Alaska.

Conditions and seasonality

Fish runs are dependent on spawning seasons, weather, river levels, commercial fishing pressure and numerous other variables. Your fishing location and/or destination could change depending on these conditions and state regulations at the time of your visit. Please remember that you have purchased an opportunity to catch fish, not a guarantee of doing so.

Regulations

If the Alaska Department of Fish and Game determines that there are not enough salmon entering the river to sustain an adequate regeneration population, the fishing season may be cut back, catch limits decreased or other similar regulatory rules implemented.

In order to conserve salmon and other species, current regulations require you to stop fishing once you have retained the maximum limit by law.

If your tour is not designated as catch and release, your catch can be processed and shipped home for an additional charge. This service can be arranged through the fishing guide or the tour company. Due to Alaska law, the lodges/hotels are not allowed to process or store any sport-caught salmon. Because of its perishable nature and U.S. Customs regulations, your catch may not be sent outside of the United States.

Licensing

Fishing licenses are not included in the excursion pricing listed within this brochure.

It is highly recommended that you purchase the fishing license online at www.adfg.state.ak.us. Prices for a license will vary depending on the number of days you choose to fish. A one-day nonresident sport-fishing license is \$15. King salmon requires an additional \$15 stamp. Fishing licenses are required for anyone 16 years of age or older.

Depart downtown Anchorage and travel along one of America's most scenic routes—the Seward Highway and Turnagain Arm—into the wilderness beyond. Visit the Alaska Wildlife Conservation Center, a 200-acre sanctuary where rescued and orphaned Alaskan animals such as brown bears, muskox, bison,

wolves, and moose roam in naturalistic habitats. Immerse yourself in the grandeur of Alaska's wildlife before continuing to Portage Lake, where you'll board the *MV Ptarmigan* with Portage Glacier Cruises for an unforgettable, narrated hour-long cruise among cascading waterfalls to within a few hundred feet of the towering face of Portage Glacier. You may even hear the thunderous crack of the glacier calving. This combination of wildlife viewing, scenic driving, and glacier cruising creates a compact and unforgettable Alaskan day trip, perfect for nature lovers and first-time visitors alike.

Special note(s): Dress in warm layers. Bring your binoculars and camera. The likelihood of seasickness on this tour is very low due to the calm, enclosed waters of Portage Lake. Food and beverages are available for purchase onboard the *MV Ptarmigan*.

AM Portage Glacier Express includes 3.5 hour tour including round-trip transportation and a narrated glacier cruise. (Does not include stop at Alaska Wildlife Conservation Center).

Prince William Sound Glacier Flightseeing Tour

Approximately 4½ hours



Take off on a float plane from Lake Hood in Anchorage and soar over the Chugach Mountains on the way to Prince William Sound, a region with over 15,000 square miles of fjords and inlets, dozens of tidewater glaciers and rugged mountain peaks. Take in the view and learn about the glaciers that shaped the land, water and lakes.

The Sound's clear waters produce a rich marine life, so make sure you look for humpback whales, killer whales, seals, eagles, otters and black bears. This tour is a pilot's favorite destination due to the varied terrain!

Special note(s): Travel time is approximately 45 minutes each way. Flight time is approximately 3 hours. Dress in warm layers. Bring your camera and sunglasses.

Take off from Lake Hood, the world's largest seaplane base, for an unforgettable adventure! You'll soar over the Chugach Mountain Range surrounding Anchorage and through valleys over Turnagain Arm, named by Captain James Cook. Return to Anchorage and enjoy a bird's-eye view of the skyline and mountains before a thrilling water landing.

Special note(s): Flight time is approximately ½ hour. Dress in warm layers. Bring your camera and sunglasses.

Prince William Sound 26 Glacier Cruise

Approximately 10 hours



Welcome aboard! Travel by coach from Anchorage to Whittier as your experienced driver-guide points out the sights along Turnagain Arm and the scenic Seward Highway. From your catamaran, you'll come face to face with towering masses of ice, so close you can hear glaciers move while gazing upon their brilliant

blue hues and towering spires. You will see different types of glaciers, including Alpine (hanging), Piedmont and Tidewater. It's not uncommon to see a glacier calve where pieces of ice break off into the water. Enjoy sightings of sea otters, harbor seals, Dall's porpoise and Steller sea lions during the cruise. You may also spot whales, bears, mountain goats and bald eagles.

The bar offers Alaska Ales, wine, spirits, light snacks, and a variety of gift shop items for purchase (at your own expense). Restrooms, complimentary hot coffee, tea and ice water at self-serve stations are available throughout the cruise. A complimentary hot meal is provided for every guest. A vegetarian and gluten-free option is also available upon notice 48 hours prior. After your cruise, board your motor coach for your return trip back to Anchorage.

Special note(s): Tour departs from the Hotel Captain Cook. Passengers under the age of 18 must be accompanied by a parent or guardian. Bring a camera, binoculars, and dress in warm layers. The boat is heated and restroom equipped. Wildlife sightings are likely but not guaranteed. Passengers with disabilities must notify our office at least 72 hours prior to the tour departure to ensure arrangements can be made to meet their particular needs. Complimentary hot coffee, tea, and ice water at self-serve stations are available throughout the cruise. A complimentary hot meal is provided for every guest. A vegetarian and gluten-free option is also available upon notice 48 hours prior. Travel time is approximately 2½ each way.

Spencer Glacier Rail & Trail

Leave Anchorage by train and head down along the shore of Turnagain Arm. This area is part of the six-million acres of Chugach National Forest—the second largest National Forest in the United States. Travel through Girdwood and watch for salmon in the streams along the way before you enter the first of

two tunnels to enter Whittier—the gateway to Prince William Sound. You'll continue south to Placer Valley leaving the highway behind and into countryside only accessible by train. You'll stop at Spencer Glacier among wildlife habitat populated by bear, moose, coyotes and wolves. Next, step off the train at the Spencer whistle stop for a two mile hike. The trail leads to Spencer Lake for spectacular glacier viewing. Upon completion of the hike, hop aboard the Alaska Railroad for a short trip back to Portage. You will then board a deluxe motor coach for the transfer back to Anchorage.

Special note(s): Dress in layers. Bring a raincoat. Snacks and beverages available for purchase on board the train. Wildlife sightings are likely but are not guaranteed. Travel time is approximately 1½ hours each way.

Biking the Tony Knowles Coastal Trail

Ocean views, mountains, and moose! Beginning at Kincaid Park, in the forested hills along Cook Inlet, enjoy a leisurely 9.5-mile guided bike ride along the Tony Knowles Coastal Trail. Along the way, your guide will

share Anchorage's natural and human history and the surrounding area. Kincaid Park is one of the largest parks within Anchorage, allowing you to experience the wild side of Alaska's largest city as it is home to snowshoe hares, bald eagles, black bears, moose, and more! There are plenty of opportunities for photos along the way as this bike ride along the coast offers views of five different mountain ranges. In addition to Kincaid Park, we also visit Earthquake Park, where we bike through some of the lasting devastation from the 1964 Earthquake and end at Westchester Lagoon, a waterfowl sanctuary.

Special note(s): Tour begins at the Dena'ina Civic and Convention Center, located at 600 W 7th Avenue in downtown Anchorage. Tour includes round-trip transportation from downtown Anchorage, high-quality bikes, helmets, biking gloves and rain gear. Participants must know how to ride a bike and be comfortable shifting gears and using handbrakes. Tour operates on paved bike trails with gentle grades. Wear closed-toe shoes (mandatory) and comfortable athletic clothing. Minimum age is 10. Minimum height is 5'0". Maximum weight is 275 lbs. Wildlife sightings are likely but are not guaranteed.

With stops at prime photo spots and expert coaching, guests can capture stunning images of this pristine landscape.

Explore Chugach National & State Park and the Alaska Wildlife Conservation Center, where animals are rehabilitated. Visit the "Ring of Glaciers" that surrounds the largest glacier lake in the area. Experience the allure of adventure and the art of photography in one remarkable journey. The tour is suitable for all experience levels.

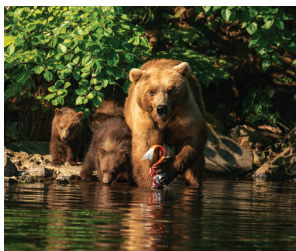

Must be able to walk on uneven terrain. Wear comfortable walking shoes and suitable clothing for different weather conditions.



Redoubt Bay Flightseeing & Bear Viewing

Approximately 8 hours



Join a naturalist guided tour and embark on an opportunity to view Alaska's black and brown bears in their natural habitat. You will board a seaplane for a scenic flight to the entrance of Lake Clark Wilderness Preserve—site of the Redoubt Bay Lodge—a small rustic hand made lodge situated in a 171,000-acre critical habitat area. Your guide will

lead you to the bears as you spend time exploring the Redoubt Bay area from a covered pontoon boat. View the bears as they feast on salmon traveling up six interconnected lakes. You will receive a Redoubt Bay Field Guide that provides interesting facts about bears and a checklist of flora and fauna specific to this region. Relax and enjoy a homemade lunch in the cozy lodge complete with spectacular views of the mountains and bay before you return to Anchorage.

Special note(s): Dress in warm layers. Bring your camera, sunglasses and insect repellent. The bear viewing takes place on a boat. A life jacket will be provided. Bear sightings are likely but are not guaranteed. Travel time is approximately 1 hour each way. Flight time is approximately 50 minutes.



Chugach State Park Nature Walk

Approximately 3 hours



This is the perfect tour if you are looking to go on an easy hike, learn about Alaska's vegetation and animal populations, and see the Chugach State Park's most photogenic locations. Depending on the season, we'll either visit the Eagle River Nature Center, or the alpine wonderland of the Glen Alps. Wild

geraniums, bluebells, and forget-me-nots pop up in June and blissful blueberries, funky fungi, and changing colors tell us when summer is ending. Moose and bears give birth to their young in spring and mate during the fall months. They travel through the mountains and valleys in search of their favorite browse, providing ample opportunity for wildlife viewing and photography. The flora and fauna of the Chugach State Park tell us a story of various ecosystems living in harmony just outside of Anchorage. Experience in-depth education about the salmon life cycle and impacts on our environment by rapidly changing climate and societal challenges. It's a one-of-a-kind, comprehensive tour awaiting your intrigue.

Special note(s): Minimum age is 4. Wear comfortable walking shoes. Dress in warm layers. Bring a camera. Not recommended for those with cardiac or respiratory issues/illness. May be difficult for those with joint issues. No experience required, but you should be able to walk at least 3 miles on flat pavement, or 2 miles of uneven rolling terrain over the course of 2 hours. You should also be able to balance well and feel comfortable walking in muddy and slippery conditions.
