- o RTAP Rural Transportation Advocacy 101
 - SKCMC Project funded by RTAP
 - Goal to get rural areas equipped to advocate for transit solutions in their areas
 - Networking and educational events
 - 1 in North Bend and 1 in South King
 - Modeled off the earlier Duvall Event
 - Online resource on the KC Mobility site
 - Outreach materials and swag for distribution
- Coalition Compensation Plan
 - Intention to bring more voices with lived experience
 - Issue that federal funds cannot be used to compensate community members
 - Work with WSDOT to receive mini-grant to carry out this plan instead
 - Office of Equity provided guidance and we will implement and share lessons learned.
- Access to Health and Wellbeing Story Mapping
 - Staff transition delays but carrying on the work
 - Inspired by Disability Mobility Initiative work on their advocacy tool
 - Focus on those seeking access to and from medical care in King County

 - Joy in transportation is important as we always hear about the negative. As a
 Metro user, often it is the one connection to community. There are barriers
 and it creates anxiety and fear.

• Sound Transit Updates - Arthur Bachus, System Engagement Specialist

- System Expansion
 - Federal Way Extension Opens Dec 6th
 - 3 new stations: Kent Des Moines, Star Lake, Federal Way Downtown
 - Trains every 8-10 min
 - Transfer to 2 Line at Intl District Station
 - Federal Way to Seatac airport in 16 min
 - Federal Way to Intl District in 45 min
- Crosslake Connection
 - Early 2026, far along in the testing process
 - 34 total miles
 - 23 stations
 - New ones at Mercer Island and Judkins Park
 - Combined service with 1 line from Intl Station to Lynnwood City Center
 - Transfer to 1 Line at Intl Station
- Voter-approved system
 - Link light rail lines (1-4 +T)
 - Five lines
 - 116 miles
 - 83 stations
 - Sounder Trains (N S)
- Kent Des Moine Station
- Star Lake Station
 - 1,100 space garage
 - Rebuilt and enhanced pedestrian/bicycle path
- Federal Way Downtown station
 - Integrated bus and rail service
 - Increased parking capacity
 - New street grid to enhance access and provide opportunity for development
- Transit Oriented Development
 - Kent Des Moines Station
 - Mercy Housing will deliver 233 units
 - Federal Way Downtown
 - Development on four parcels

- Multiple Ways to Pay
 - Ticket Machines
 - One your phone
 - Apple wallet coming soon
 - Cash
 - ST express accepts
- Adult Fares
 - Link 1 & 2 are \$3 as are ST Express
 - T Line is \$2
 - Sounder Service are distance based
- Tap your ORCA card (once except on Sounder)
- How to reload your ORCA Card
 - MyORCA.com or app
 - Ticket machines
 - By phone (888) 988-6722
 - Customer Service office
- Transfer to/from Link light rail with ORCA
 - 2 hour window
- Free youth transit pass
 - Technically not required to ride but if they are near 18 it helps make it easier to travel
- o Reduced fare options for seniors
 - RRFP
- o Free and reduced fare options based on income
 - LIFT and Subsidized annual pass

- o 2026 Service Plan
- What is the service plan
 - Expanded service to new areas by Link to areas now served by ST Express
 - Sound transit is updating express routes to reflect this
 - Service plan considers community input
 - ST Express Service changes begin fall 2026




- Engagement Timeline
 - Full year, began in April with rider preferences survey in Phase 1, completed in April
 - Now between phase 3 and 4 to refine the proposals and once we hit phase 4 we will present the final 2026 service proposals before review and approval
- ST Express Survey
 - Oct 6 Nov 11th
 - Shared proposals, over 4300 survey responses
 - Hopelink and others helped with open houses
 - Collected rider feedback
 - 3 open houses
 - 75 ST staff ambassadors

- o Experience at Disability Rights WA and worked on the Disability Mobility Initiative project
 - Lots of frustration that transit leaders had little or no experience as transit riders
 - Public transit benefit areas determine who is on the boards of transit agencies, usually local elected officials
 - Some exceptions, Intercity Transit and Mason Transit examples
 - Suburban city geography makes it hard for transit users to rise to local office in many cases
 - 3-year legislative campaign that passed HB 1418 to create the option to add two voting members who are transit users to the governing body of Public Transportation Benefit Areas (PTBA's)
 - Map of PTBA's

 - O Why is King County not red on the map?
 - Not organized in Public Transportation Benefit Area (PTBA), King County Council members are the main deciders, Sound Transit, Everett Transit also not covered by PTBA structured. Additional advocacy would be required to get positions added to their boards.

 - Zoom and Teams have opened engagement avenues for non-driver advocacy, can you touch on relationship building?
 - Yes, during COVID it actually became a new norm and this helped
 - Knowing people and building relationships critical as a skill to get results.
