

MUSIC MINISTRY

The Bible Tells Me So by Fredric DeVries

Let me tell you a little secret about myself. At the times when I really need a “spiritual hug” I sing to myself “Jesus Loves Me, This I Know.”

If any of you reading this has done the same thing, then I say God Bless You, because then I know I am not alone in this. And it soothes my soul when I sing, taking me back to a simpler spiritual time, helping me to feel the presence of God in tough times.

Jesus Loves Me is the most well-known children’s hymn in the world. When I taught piano class in schools, the book I used contained that song. And while I usually tried to skip over that song because the school represented a wide diversity of children, most kids specially asked if they could learn that song.

Ask people in a nursing home if they would like to hear Jesus Loves Me and the answer is a resounding YES.

The origin for Jesus Loves Me is quite interesting. Do you remember the Panic of 1837? Me neither. Suffice it to say, thanks to President Andrew Jackson, the banks failed and the United States experienced something like the Great Depression of the 1930’s.

At that time there was a prosperous lawyer, Henry Whiting Warner, living in New York City with two daughters Anna (b.1827-1915) and Susan (b. 1819-1885). The Panic wiped out Henry, and as a result he and his daughters moved up the Hudson River to live in a ramshackle Revolutionary War cottage on Constitution Island, just across the river from West Point Army Academy.

To earn some income for the Warner’s household, the daughters began writing stories. Anna’s first novel was called “Robinson Crusoe’s Garden” and Susan’s was called “The Wide, Wide World.” They actually became quite well known, publishing 106 books, some of them in collaboration.

In 1860, the opening year of the American Civil War, together they wrote “Say and Seal.” It was a best seller at the time, second only to “Uncle Tom’s Cabin.” And like “Uncle Tom” and other novels of the time it was quite melodramatic and saccharine, evoking tearful reactions from the reader but as well, being influential in currying the abolitionist cause.

In “Say and Seal” a 6 year old boy, Johnny Fox, is very sick unto death. His Sunday School teacher, John Linden, comes to visit him and comfort him as death approaches. The teacher holds the boy in his arms and makes up this song for him.

**Jesus Loves Me, This I Know,
For the Bible Tells Me So,
Little Ones to Him Belong.
They are weak but He is Strong.**

I have no doubt that this episode left all its readers in tears.

In 1862, in the dark days of the Civil War this song caught the attention of none other than William Bradbury (Hymn writer of “He Leadeth Me” and “Just as I Am”).

With Anna’s permission, he wrote a tune of child-like simplicity, adding the refrain: “Yes, Jesus Loves Me, The Bible tells Me so.”

With Bradbury’s helpful reputation, in the decades that followed, “Jesus Loves Me” became known the world over, on the lips and in the hearts of millions.

In spite of writing successes, Anna and Susan never really overcame their Panic of 1837 poverty. But their quiet steadfast ministry of love and comfort was noted by their neighbours. And by that, I mean their neighbours across the Hudson River at West Point.

Following the Civil War, for four decades, cadets from West Point would paddle across the river each week to receive lemonade and Bible lessons from Anna and Susan.

When Anna and Susan died, they were buried on the grounds of West Point with full military honours.

They were the only civilians to receive such an honour. West Point to this day maintains their cottage on Constitution Island as a historical landmark.





AFFIRMING COMMITTEE

Over the past decade, through prayer, reflection, art, listening, and community building, the church has engaged in **intentional listening processes** to understand the experiences of 2S and LGBTQIA+ people within The United Church of Canada.

On August 8, 2025, it acknowledged and apologized for the many shortcomings and the harm the church has caused to the 2S and LGBTQIA+ communities, and commits to radical love and affirming people of all identities, strengthening its witness to justice and love in action.


Tangible commitments, such as revising policies, providing reparative support, and ensuring 2S and LGBTQIA+ voices are centered in decision-making would help dismantle systemic barriers and foster a church culture where equity is actively pursued.

"We, The United Church of Canada, express our deepest apologies to all those who have experienced homophobia, transphobia, and biphobia within The United Church of Canada," the apology reads in part. "This has at times looked like overt actions such as loss of income, harassment, being denied access to church leadership, and threats to personal safety. The church should be a place of sanctuary and belonging for all people. You deserve a church that reflects God's unconditional and abiding love." St. Paul's Financial Update

Here's a quick update on where we are financially, as of July 31, 2025. At the end of July, St. Paul's had an operating deficit of \$11,500. This is significantly below our budgeted operating deficit for the first seven months of \$82,000. In addition, we recorded an investment gain of \$20,000 over the same period.

Our revenues, at \$243,000, are on track at 56% of the total annual budget. However, givings for local church operations are about 5% below budget. M&S givings are about 10% below budget. Outreach givings are on budget, and rental income is slightly above budget.

Most committee expenses are well below annual budget amounts. Our personnel costs are below budget, and property costs are on budget. The costs of our utilities (hydro, natural gas, water and sewage) have increased to about 82% of their annual budget, so may exceed budget by year-end. Approximately \$26,000 of the \$100,000 Bertram Foundation grant has been spent on the gym renovations.

In sum, St. Paul's financial position at the seven-month mark is fairly positive, especially compared to the budget. The Finance Committee will monitor the monthly surplus or deficit going forward for the remainder of the year.

OUTREACH COMMITTEE

St. Paul's Outreach committee promotes awareness of societal needs and concerns and encourages the congregation to seek a Christian response to such concerns. The duties of the committee include developing and/or promoting the study of contemporary moral, social and political issues and developing strategies and/or action plans for responding to pressing needs. We work with other committees to strengthen and advance the church's links to broader community issues. We have a strong team with a solid history of action on a number of social issues including poverty, homelessness, and lack of safe, affordable housing.

We meet from 4:30 to 6:00 pm on the first Wednesday of each month. Congregants who are drawn to our mandate are welcome to join our group. If the date and time do not work for you, please let us know of your interest. We have some flexibility with times and dates, and if these do not work, we will happily add your name to our list of individuals we can call upon to help with current and special projects. We can use help with coffee hour when we have engaged a guest speaker and can use help to develop posters or leaflets to draw attention to the issues that concern us.

We are interested particularly on ways and means to address climate and environmental issues. Significant work has been carried out by the church property committee to ensure a 'greener' church. Our interest is in actions individuals can take in their personal lives and collectively to ensure that climate issues are at the forefront of political agendas.

Committee members met this September to discuss and affirm our plans for another active church year. Action on food insecurity and social isolation will continue with Café 55+ which meets every Thursday morning. Dave Davis reports on Café 55+ elsewhere in this newsletter. Every second Monday of the month, St. Paul's provides a free supper for those facing food insecurity, as well as those seeking good company in a welcoming place. Our church is one of five Dundas churches who take turns providing the meals every Monday. This program is an initiative of The Association of Dundas Churches (ADC) that St. Paul's has been part of for the past decade. Carlies Longbottom organizes a dedicated group of volunteers who provide the meal to an ever growing number of guests every month. She reports that the dinners are averaging about 55 guests at a cost of approximately \$300.00 monthly. The need is great and your donation is greatly appreciated.

On Sunday, **October 19** a special presentation will be made celebrating St. Paul's long held support of the Canadian Food Banks.

'Courageous Conversations', a collaborative project with Christian Development and Pastoral Care committees will address financial concerns in a session titled 'Handling Money Ethically in an Age of Anxiety'. The date is not confirmed at the time of this report. Watch for posters!

AT ST. PAUL'S



PROPERTY COMMITTEE

Extensive gym renovations were started in July and completed at the end of August. The water leakage has been rectified and the glazed wall tiles have been cleaned. The old ceiling has been replaced and acoustic panels were installed. The perimeter of the floor has been painted and the whole floor has been given a fresh coat of varathane. The back stairwell ceiling as well as the side entranceway to the Scouts storage area has also been renovated.

We now have a new tenant, Valley Adult Day Program, who have signed a one-year lease to use the gym during the daytime, Monday through Friday. Other arrangements have been made with them during the time of Fiesta, Garage Sale and Previous loved Art sale.

Over the summer, we met with a representative of the Hamilton Heritage Committee for criteria on the installation of an accessible ramp at the front of the church. Through these conversations, we are now in discussions with an engineering firm to review options and designs to install a ramp.

We are hoping to soon replace the badly worn out and stained carpets in the Moss Davidson Hill room, Library and hallway by the Parlour and YCC room. A special thanks to the Afternoon Singers for their generous donation to help offset the cost of new carpeting.
