Around the age of 8, I started creating bad habits for myself and influencing my friends and siblings. I grew up in the home with five siblings, my mother and stepfather. My family moved from place to place, and I would often be split between homes. One Wednesday evening a Living Faith Church bus came through the Willow Heights Projects in Fayetteville picking up the neighborhood kids for Wednesday night services. This went on for several Wednesdays until I felt a need to know what it was about. The day I approached the bus, the driver, Frank Lofton, gave off a caring presence that other males in my life haven't, and he encouraged me to come to church and have a great time. I took the leap!

The next few years flew by as seeds were planted into my life about Jesus Christ. This environment created a safe place for me with reliable people I could trust. In 2011, we unexpectedly moved away. As I became a teen, I picked up bad habits and extreme behaviors like using drugs, joining a gang at the age of 13, and repeatedly getting arrested for the lifestyle I chose to live. At age 18, I was facing a life sentence and began reliving my past in a prison cell blaming others for my own reckless and careless behavior. I started to seek God and prayed for mercy. While facing the life sentence my Father passed away in 2020 and I burned with a desire to change, so I prayed. In 2021 I was sentenced to 25 years in prison fully understanding the chance that God gave me. I left my gang affiliation behind and began applying myself in college and other programs the prison offered. In November of 2022, I applied and got accepted into Pathway to Freedom (PTF). I was believing that PTF would be my next step in life, but unaware of the doors that God would open for me. I have invested my time learning my "True Face".

During a May 12, 2023 "540 Event", a group of volunteers from Northwest Arkansas came to worship and minister to us at the prison. I met and began a conversation with Pastor Steven Curtis. I asked Pastor Curtis where he pastored, and he stated, Living Faith Church. I replied, "That's my church"! I later reconnected with Frank Lofton, the bus driver who transported myself and the other neighborhood kids to Living Faith Church. Seeing Frank again with his consistent, serving presence from 14 years ago gave me all the hope and happiness that I needed. I give thanks to God for allowing me a second chance to show myself a new man in Christ to the same man and Church that loved me and sowed a seed with that first bus ride to church that left an impression.
