SOLEMNITY OF CHRIST THE KING

"Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." (Luke 23:42)

"Jesús, acuérdate de mí cuando llegues a tu reino." (Lucas 23:42)

Reflection:

In this poignant moment on the cross, we see the profound humility and faith of the repentant thief. Despite his past, he recognizes Jesus' kingship and seeks His mercy. This encounter is a powerful reminder that Christ's kingdom is not of this world, but of hearts transformed by grace. As we celebrate Christ the King, let us humbly invite Jesus to reign in our hearts. in our hearts, trusting in His infinite love and forgiveness.

Socratic Question:

What prevents us from fully recognizing and accepting Jesus' kingship in our own lives, and how might embracing His reign transform our hearts and our actions?

Reflect on this question and consider how openness to Christ's transformative power can influence your daily life and interactions with others.

Reflexión:

Reflexiona sobre esta pregunta y considera cómo la apertura al poder transformador de Cristo puede influir en tu vida diaria y en tus interacciones con los demás.

"Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord! Blessed is the kingdom of our father David that is to come!" (Mark 11: 9,10)

Dear Parish Family and Friends,

As the political climate here in the U.S. grows partisan amid the "No Kings" march, we have to ask: do we not have a King of Kings who rules over us? Of course, we do not have a human king, but we have a Spiritual and redemptive King who will someday come to judge the living and the dead.

Today is our last week of Cycle C in ordinary time, and the Church celebrates with imagery of kingship and covenant, which evokes marital relationships. King David succeeded King Saul. Those who followed King Saul had no one to lead them in Israel due to the factions among his sons. They came to King David and asked him to be their King. The dialogue between them was beautiful, speaking about being bone of my bone and flesh of my flesh. The statements made by the Israelites recall the Genesis account of Adam and Eve and their marriage bond. In a profound sense, King David was King not only of Judah but also of Israel. That is precisely why the Messiah comes from the Davidic line to fulfill the prophetic utterances handed down before and after King David.

However, our Gospel for this week is the crucifixion narrative, reminding us what Jesus endured as the King of the Jews on our behalf. Ironically, the Romans either were being disrespectful or they knew to some degree Jesus was someone special and they placed above His head, "This is the King of the Jews." What is so beautiful about the narrative is that the repentant thief, in his own way, recognized his guilt and sought forgiveness. Jesus promised him paradise today.

For us, how do we allow Jesus to be King of our lives? Is Jesus the focus of our lives, and do we seek a deep, intimate relationship with our King? As we shift into Advent, the themes we encounter are light, hope, and the birth of the newborn King. Can we, this Advent, open ourselves to a deeper encounter with our Lord and welcome Him into our hearts so that He reigns in our homes to bring about peace, joy, and love? Come, Lord Jesus, come!

Thank you all for your kind attention to the changes taking place within the Sacred Liturgy. It is Sacred because it is Jesus Christ in our midst, and by His presence, He makes the Mass holy. Our Parish Leadership Team is prayerfully assisting me in bringing these essential reminders to our parish family, so that we may be a parish that prays unceasingly. Celebrating Mass with reverence and intention, the grace we receive from our worship helps transform us into an Amazing Parish. We recognize that this is a slight change, and as a team, we are prayerfully observing and exploring how to work out some of the kinks in this new process. Again, thank you, and let us become a parish family that prays unceasingly for one another!

Lastly, we will be celebrating Thanksgiving this Thursday. If you would like to bring any of your food items for a blessing before your celebrations, we will have a table in front of the altar where you can place them, and I will extend a blessing over them. I am thankful for all of you, and I wish you all the most wonderful and blessed Thanksgiving.

"¡Bendito el que viene en el nombre del Señor!¡Bendito el reino que llega, el reino de nuestro padre David!" (Marcos 11, 9-10)

Querida familia parroquial y amigos,

A medida que el clima político aquí en los Estados Unidos se vuelve más partidista en medio de la marcha de "No Kings", debemos preguntarnos: ¿acaso no tenemos un Rey de Reyes que reina sobre nosotros? Por supuesto, no tenemos un rey humano, pero sí tenemos un Rey espiritual y redentor que algún día vendrá a juzgar a los vivos y a los muertos.

Hoy celebramos la última semana del Ciclo C del Tiempo Ordinario y la Iglesia nos presenta imágenes de realeza y alianza que también evocan relaciones conyugales. El rey David sucedió al rey Saúl. Aquellos que habían seguido al rey Saúl quedaron sin líder en Israel debido a las facciones entre sus hijos. Acudieron al rey David y le pidieron que fuera su rey. El diálogo entre ellos fue hermoso, hablando de ser hueso de mis huesos y carne de mi carne. Las palabras pronunciadas por los israelitas recuerdan el relato del Génesis sobre Adán y Eva y su vínculo matrimonial. En un sentido profundo, el rey David fue rey no solo de Judá, sino también de Israel. Y es precisamente por eso que el Mesías proviene de la línea davídica, para cumplir las profecías transmitidas antes y después del reinado de David.

Sin embargo, nuestro Evangelio de esta semana es el relato de la crucifixión, que nos recuerda lo que Jesús soportó como Rey de los Judíos por nosotros. Los romanos, ya fuera por burla o porque reconocían, en cierta medida, que Jesús era alguien especial, colocaron sobre su cabeza la inscripción: "Este es el Rey de los Judíos." Lo hermoso del relato es que el ladrón arrepentido, a su manera, reconoció su culpa y pidió perdón. Jesús le prometió el paraíso ese mismo día.

¿Qué hacemos nosotros para asegurarnos de que Jesús sea el Rey de nuestras vidas? ¿Es Jesús el centro de nuestra existencia? ¿Buscamos una relación profunda e íntima con nuestro Rey? Al entrar en el Adviento, los temas que encontramos son la luz, la esperanza y la llegada del Rey recién nacido. ¿Podemos, en este Adviento, abrirnos a un encuentro más profundo con nuestro Señor y recibirlo en nuestro corazón para que reine en nuestros hogares y traiga paz, alegría y amor? ¡Ven, Señor Jesús, ven!

Gracias a todos por su amable atención a los cambios que están teniendo lugar en la Sagrada Liturgia aquí en nuestra parroquia. Es Sagrada porque es Jesucristo en medio de nosotros y, por Su presencia, Él hace santa la Misa. Nuestro Equipo de Liderazgo Parroquial me está ayudando en oración para presentar estos recordatorios esenciales a nuestra familia parroquial, para que podamos ser una parroquia que ore sin cesar. Celebrar la Misa con reverencia e intención hace que la gracia que recibimos de nuestro culto nos ayude a transformarnos en una Parroquia Admirable. Reconocemos que este es un pequeño cambio y, como equipo, estamos observando y discerniendo, en oración, cómo resolver algunos detalles de este nuevo proceso. Nuevamente, gracias, y ¡sigamos convirtiéndonos en una familia parroquial que ora sin cesar unos por otros!

Por último, celebraremos el Día de Acción de Gracias este jueves. Si desean traer alguno de sus alimentos para una bendición antes de sus celebraciones, tendremos una mesa frente al altar donde pueden colocarlos y yo extenderé una bendición sobre ellos. Estoy agradecido por todos ustedes y les deseo un maravilloso y bendecido Día de Acción de Gracias.

GOSPEL MEDITATION

IN THE GOSPEL PASSAGE...

The Solemnity of Christ the King invites us to contemplate the mystery of Jesus' kingship. Unlike earthly rulers who seek power and dominion, Jesus reigns from the wood of the cross, offering Himself for our salvation. His kingdom is one of love. service, and truth. In the face of suffering and injustice, we might feel tempted to doubt His reign, vet the repentant thief teaches us that true power lies in surrendering to God's will and embracing His mercy.

Reflection Question:

As we reflect on this Gospel, let us ask ourselves: Do we allow Christ to be the ruler of our hearts and lives? And do we extend His reign by bringing His love and justice into our world?

THE SOLEMNITY OF CHRIST THE KING...

was instituted by Pope Pius XI in 1925 with the encyclical Quas Primas. This feast was a response to growing secularism and nationalism by reasserting the truth of Christ's sovereignty over all creation. Originally celebrated on the last Sunday of October, it was moved to the final Sunday of the liturgical year after the Second Vatican Council, highlighting Christ's ultimate reign at the end of time. This feast calls believers to recognize Christ's authority in our lives and the world, reminding us that His kingdom transcends earthly powers and invites all to share in His life-giving reign.



MINISTRY HIGHLIGHT

ST. RITA MUSIC MINISTRY

Bulletin Editor Interviews Mrs. Nancy CampmanCrofts, St. Rita Music Ministry Director

Purpose and Mission? Music ministry enhances the worship experience through music, leading the congregation in song to foster deeper faith and unity. Participation through music promotes "the full, conscious, and active participation" of the congregation using music to glorify God, proclaim the Word and help individuals grow in their relationship with Jesus Christ.

How and when the ministry began? Singing at Catholic mass goes w-a-y back. Before Gregorian chant, Jesus sang psalms at Passover/the last supper when He instituted the mass (Matt 26:30; Mark 14:26). Sacred singing goes back to our Jewish roots.

Scripture or church teaching? USCCB published Sing to the Lord: Music in Divine Worship which states, "One of God's greatest gifts to us, his creation, was the gift of song. In words and music, our ancestors in faith—Moses, David, Deborah, Paul, St. Gregory—have taught us how to revel in God's infinite love, proclaim his glory, give thanks for his abounding generosity, and plead for mercy and forgiveness." In Sept 2019, Pope Francis wrote "I recommend that you help the whole people of God to sing with conscious and active participation in the liturgy. This is important: closeness to the people of God."

Role of prayer? St. Augustine is credited with saying, "He who sings, prays twice." The most important elements of the mass, the Mass Propers, are to be sung always. Most of our hymns and songs derive from scripture. So literally we sing prayers.

Saints, devotion, or traditions? St. Cecelia, St. Gregory (Pope / Gregorian chant), St. Blaze (throat ailments)

What called you to serve in this ministry? I left St. Rita's in 2024 to sing at several other Tucson churches before serving as the Pray 2X Teen Choir Director at Our Mother of Sorrows in Tucson. When I heard of the opening, the opportunity to return to St. Rita's felt like coming home.

Responsibilities? Selecting liturgically relevant music for our English and Spanish Sunday mass, Holy Days of Obligation and other celebrations as directed. Preparing and directing the English adult and children's choirs, as well as leading and playing guitar for the Spanish choir.

Ministry Operations? Members/volunteers: Adult choirs=12 | Children's choir=10 members | Spanish = 3

Training & Preparation? Our music ministers love to sing and play at church; we feel called to lend our time and talents to praise Jesus Christ in the mass.

Special events? Christmas, Holy Week, Easter, Holy Days of Obligation

The harmonies were incredible. Everyone could feel the Holy Spirit! This description doesn't do the experience justice. It was a sacred moment that brought tears to my eyes. I'll never forget the experience.

Parish support? If it's within your means, consider allocating just \$5/month to music ministry – offsets choir sheet music photocopying.

Ministry loves? The people! The fellowship!

What you should know? We are not classically trained musicians. We are people who love sacred music. We are called to share the Word through our music.





KIDS CORNER



One inspiring saint whose feast day falls during this week is St. Catherine Labouré, celebrated on November 28. As a young nun, she experienced several visions of the Blessed Virgin Mary in 1830, through which she was entrusted with the mission of spreading devotion to the Miraculous Medal. St. Catherine listened to Mary and prayed for everyone by spreading the Miraculous Medal, which became a sign of God's love.

St. Catherine Labouré inspired:

- 1. Youthful Witness: St. Catherine was in her early twenties when she received her visions, which shows kids that they are never too young to be called by God for a special purpose.
- 2. Courage and Faith: Despite facing doubts from others, Catherine remained faithful to her mission, encouraging children to trust in God's plans for them even when it seems difficult.
- 3. Miraculous Medal: The story of the Miraculous Medal introduces kids to the idea of tangible signs of faith and Mary's intercession. It's a beautiful way to teach them about the power of devotion and prayer.

Sunday Activity Make a Medal: Parents provide materials for kids to create their own paper medals, encouraging them to decorate them with symbols of their faith, such as a cross or a heart.

Kids Reflection Question

How can you show your love for Jesus and Mary like St. Catherine did?

"Dear St. Catherine, help me to be brave and loving like you. Show me how to listen to Mary and share God's love with the world. Amen.'

Parent's Note: This approach can help children find a personal connection with St. Catherine Labouré and be inspired to live out their faith courageously. What creative ways can you think of to help further engage their interest in saints like St. Catherine?

SAINT CATHERINE LABOURÉ

Feast Day: November 28 **Patronage:** Miraculous Medal

Early Life and Call:

St. Catherine Labouré was born on May 2, 1806, in a small village in Burgundy, France. From a young age, she demonstrated a deep devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary. Catherine entered the Daughters of Charity in Paris in her early twenties, inspired by a desire to serve God and the poor.

Apparitions and Mission:

In 1830, while a novice at the convent on the Rue du Bac, Catherine experienced several apparitions of the Virgin Mary. During these encounters, Mary asked her to have a medal struck according to a design she revealed. This medal, known today as the Miraculous Medal, became a symbol of Mary's intercession and God's grace, spreading swiftly throughout the world.

Challenges and Humility:

Despite experiencing these extraordinary visions, Catherine remained quietly obedient to her superiors and did not seek attention or recognition. She kept her identity as the visionary a secret for most of her life, choosing instead to live in humble service, working with the elderly and the infirm.

Legacy and Impact:

St. Catherine's humble acceptance of her mission and her profound trust in God's providence inspire Christians to remain faithful to their own callings, regardless of recognition. The Miraculous Medal has been attributed to numerous conversions and healings, serving as a reminder of Mary's continuing care for her children and her role in leading them to Christ.

Canonization:

St. Catherine Labouré was canonized by Pope Pius XII on July 27, 1947. Her incorrupt body remains a place of pilgrimage at the Chapel of Our Lady of the Miraculous Medal in Paris.

Reflection Questions:

How can St. Catherine's life inspire us to embrace our own divine missions with humility and faith?

In what ways can devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary deepen our relationship with Christ and support us in our spiritual journey?
