FEAST OF THE CONVERSION

OF SAINT PAUL, APOSTLE

*"Follow me, and I will make you fishers
of men." (Matthew 4:19)*

*"Sígueme, y los haré pescadores de
hombres." (Mateo 4:19)*

Reflection:

In this Gospel passage, Jesus calls His first disciples, Peter and Andrew, inviting them to leave behind their nets and follow Him. This call to discipleship is not just for them but extends to each of us. We are invited to respond to Christ's call by stepping out in faith and sharing His love and truth with others. Just as the first disciples were transformed from fishermen to fishers of men, we too are called to let our lives be changed and aligned with Christ's mission. Answering Jesus' call may lead us down paths we never expected, but it will always guide us towards a deeper relationship with Him. How is Jesus calling you today to become a "fisher of men"?

Socratic Question:

How can you respond to Jesus' call to become a "fisher of men" in your everyday life, & what changes might this require in your approach to relationships?

Reflexión:

En este pasaje del Evangelio, Jesús llama a Sus primeros discípulos, Pedro y Andrés, invitándolos a dejar sus redes y seguirlo. Esta llamada al discipulado no es solo para ellos sino que se extiende a cada uno de nosotros. Estamos invitados a responder al llamado de Cristo con fe, compartiendo Su amor y verdad con los demás. Así como los primeros discípulos fueron transformados de pescadores a pescadores de hombres, también nosotros estamos llamados a permitir que nuestras vidas se transformen y se alineen con la misión de Cristo. Responder al llamado de Jesús puede llevarnos por caminos que nunca esperábamos, pero siempre nos guiará hacia una relación más profunda con Él. ¿Cómo te está llamando Jesús hoy a ser un "pescador de hombres"?

Pregunta socrática:

¿Cómo puedes responder al llamado de Jesús a ser "pescador de hombres" en tu vida diaria, y que cambios podría requerir esto en tu enfoque hacia las relaciones?

"The Lord is my light and my salvation." (Psalm 27:1)

Dear Parish Family and Friends,

"Those who have walked into darkness have seen a great light." (Isaiah 9:2) What a fantastic sense of hope, joy, and expectation that God would Himself walk with the Nation of Israel and be their light. If we look at the Gospel of Matthew, we see elements of fulfillment in Jesus' revelation in Galilee. We can additionally see that our Psalm speaks of the Lord as being our light and our salvation. These scriptures not only recount historical promises but also provide a beacon of hope for our everyday challenges. When we face personal struggles or moments of uncertainty, these passages remind us that light will emerge, guiding us through our difficulties, just like the dawn after the darkest night. They inspire us to seek out those small yet profound moments of light in our daily lives, offering reassurance and strength to move forward.

Our world indeed needs much light against the darkness of this present age. The darkness I speak of is the failure to dialogue, the idea that human beings can change the natural order, and perhaps the saddest part is that some would protect evil-doers and act as though they are righteous and doing 'good.' Our world has lost its way and is in chaos. What is equally disturbing is that some of our elected leaders are promoting such darkness and ignorance at the detriment of our children and youth. Yet, I wonder, how do you personally encounter this darkness in your own life? Where do you glimpse moments of light or hope, however small they may be? By sharing and reflecting on these questions, we can begin to turn what feels like a proclamation into a shared exploration toward understanding and change.

While many social activists would argue that we need to 'change the world,' they fall short of recognizing that change begins internally before it can change the world around us. What areas of darkness do we harbour in our hearts and minds? What relationships need healing and reconciliation to be free of anger, resentment, and bitterness? In a word, we cannot give what we do not have, and while we desire to help many, we are unable to do so until we first take stock of the broken areas in our lives and work to allow the love, grace, and light of Christ to heal us.


Finally, Jesus called His disciples to abandon their nets at the sea shore and to follow after Him. Perhaps we, too, can drop our net of entanglement in this world and see the hope of Jesus Christ's transforming love enlighten us into a family of one mind, one heart, and one spirit? God knows, we cannot do this on our own, and we need the supernatural grace of Jesus in the Sacraments to illuminate our conscience. Hence, we are truly disciples of the light rather than pretenders, bringing about destruction, chaos, and darkness to our world. Choose and choose wisely.

I have some good news to report! We finally received three bids for the west and east parking lots for repair and resurfacing. We are working with one company, Bates, to determine the times of their arrival and work on each parking lot. The west parking lot, in front of the Shrine, will be closed as the crew works to remove part of the island and pave and add parking bays. You will have to enter off the east parking lot and park by the Verhegan building and the Center. Our east parking lot will also be worked on, but Bates will work on that after they finish the west parking lot. I know this is exciting and inconvenient for some, and we ask for your patience as we work through this process. More details to come, please stay tuned!

Lastly, as St. Rita in the Desert Roman Catholic parish community begins to expand, it has come to mind that there is no legacy foundation for our parish. Our parish has been here in Vail, Arizona, for 90 years, and we have no foundation or way to sustain ourselves and future generations. I was at a training with the Diocese of Tucson Catholic Foundation, and they spoke to us about endowments for the various parishes. As I write my pastoral letter, members of the finance committee, Board of Directors, and Building Committee will gather at the Diocese of Tucson to discuss how St. Rita in the Desert Roman Catholic parish community can set monies aside on our behalf and those of our children's children. Once we gather more information, I would like to create The St. Rita in the Desert Legacy Fund. Funds would be set aside to help the parish today and in the future with various needs. Pray that we can make this a reality and grow our financial nest egg for the betterment of our parish and beyond. If you are familiar with this area and would like to offer suggestions, I would be most open to your assistance. Thank you and God bless!

“Aquel que es la Palabra se hizo hombre y habitó entre nosotros. A todos los que lo recibieron les concedió poder llegar a ser hijos de Dios.” (Juan 1:14a,12a)

Estimada familia parroquial y amigos:

Los que caminaban en tinieblas vieron una gran luz». (Isaías 9,2) ¡Qué maravilloso sentido de esperanza, gozo y expectativa encierra el hecho de que Dios mismo caminaría con la Nación de Israel y sería su luz! En el Evangelio de Mateo, vemos elementos de cumplimiento en la revelación de Jesús en Galilea. Además, vemos que nuestro Salmo habla del Señor como nuestra luz y salvación. Estas Escrituras no solo recuerdan promesas históricas, sino que también nos ofrecen un faro de esperanza para nuestros desafíos cotidianos. Cuando enfrentamos luchas personales o momentos de incertidumbre, estos pasajes nos recuerdan que la luz surgirá y nos guiará a través de nuestras dificultades, como el amanecer tras la noche más oscura. Nos inspiran a buscar esos pequeños pero profundos momentos de luz en nuestra vida diaria, brindándonos consuelo y fortaleza para seguir adelante.

Nuestro mundo, en verdad, necesita mucha luz frente a la oscuridad de esta época. La oscuridad de la que hablo es la incapacidad de dialogar, la idea de que los seres humanos pueden cambiar el orden natural y, tal vez, lo más triste, que algunos protejan a los malhechores y actúen como si fueran justos y estuvieran haciendo “el bien”. Nuestro mundo ha perdido el rumbo y está en el caos. Igualmente preocupante es que algunos de nuestros líderes electos promuevan tal oscuridad e ignorancia en detrimento de nuestros niños y jóvenes. Sin embargo, me pregunto: ¿cómo se enfrenta usted personalmente a esta oscuridad en su propia vida? ¿Dónde vislumbra momentos de luz o de esperanza, por pequeños que sean? Al compartir y reflexionar sobre estas preguntas, podemos comenzar a transformar lo que parece una proclamación en una exploración compartida hacia la comprensión y el cambio.

Si bien muchos activistas sociales argumentarían que necesitamos “cambiar el mundo”, se quedan cortos al no reconocer que el cambio comienza en el interior antes de poder transformar el mundo que nos rodea. ¿Qué áreas de oscuridad albergamos en nuestros corazones y mentes? ¿Qué relaciones necesitan sanación y reconciliación para liberarse de la ira, el resentimiento y la amargura? En pocas palabras, no podemos dar lo que no tenemos, y aunque deseamos ayudar a muchos, no podemos hacerlo hasta que primero hagamos un balance de las áreas rotas en nuestra vida y permitamos que el amor, la gracia y la luz de Cristo nos sanen.


Finalmente, Jesús llamó a sus discípulos a abandonar sus redes a la orilla del mar y a seguirlo. Tal vez nosotros también podamos soltar la red que nos enreda en este mundo y ver cómo la esperanza del amor transformador de Jesucristo nos ilumina para convertirnos en una familia de una sola mente, un solo corazón y un solo espíritu. Dios sabe que no podemos hacer esto por nuestra cuenta y que necesitamos la gracia sobrenatural de Jesús, en los Sacramentos, para iluminar nuestra conciencia. Así, somos verdaderamente discípulos de la luz y no simuladores que traen destrucción, caos y oscuridad a nuestro mundo. Elijan y elijan sabiamente.

¡Tengo buenas noticias que compartir! Por fin recibimos tres propuestas para la reparación y el reasfaltado de los estacionamientos oeste y este. Estamos trabajando con la empresa Bates para determinar los horarios de su llegada y de trabajo en cada estacionamiento. El estacionamiento oeste, frente al Santuario, estará cerrado mientras el equipo retira parte de la isleta y del pavimento y añade nuevos espacios de estacionamiento. Deberán ingresar por el estacionamiento este y estacionarse cerca del edificio Verhagen y del Centro. También se trabajará en el estacionamiento este, pero Bates comenzará allí una vez que termine con el estacionamiento oeste. Sé que esto es emocionante e inconveniente para algunos y les pedimos paciencia mientras avanzamos en este proceso. Pronto habrá más detalles. ¡por favor, estén atentos!

Por último, a medida que la comunidad parroquial católica romana de Sta. Rita en el Desierto comienza a expandirse; ha surgido la idea de que no existe una fundación de legado para nuestra parroquia. Nuestra parroquia ha estado aquí en Vail, Arizona, durante 90 años y no contamos con una fundación ni con una manera de sostenernos a nosotros mismos y a las futuras generaciones. Estuve en una capacitación con la Fundación Católica de la Diócesis de Tucson, donde nos hablaron sobre los fondos patrimoniales de las distintas parroquias. Mientras escribo esta carta pastoral, miembros del comité de finanzas, de la junta directiva y del comité de construcción se reunirán en la Diócesis de Tucson para dialogar sobre cómo la comunidad parroquial de Sta. Rita en el Desierto puede apartar fondos en beneficio nuestro y de los hijos de nuestros hijos. Cuando tengamos más información, me gustaría crear el Fondo Legado Sta. Rita en el Desierto. Los fondos se reservarán para ayudar a la parroquia, hoy y en el futuro, con diversas necesidades. Oremos para que podamos hacer realidad esto y fortalecer nuestro fondo financiero para el bien de nuestra parroquia y más allá. Si estás familiarizado con esta área y deseas ofrecer sugerencias, estaré muy abierto a tu ayuda. ¡Muchas gracias y que Dios los bendiga!


Welcome to the 2026 Annual Catholic Appeal!

GOSPEL MEDITATION

IN THE MATTHEW 4:12-23,

Jesus begins His public ministry with a powerful invitation: "Follow me, and I will make you fishers of men." This call marks the beginning of a profound transformation for Peter and Andrew. They leave behind everything familiar—their work, their routine, their security—to embrace a new and unknown journey with Christ. The Gospel challenges us to consider what it means to truly follow Jesus. It's a call to be open to conversion, to allow Christ to work within us, and to courageously step out of our comfort zones. When we follow Jesus, He reshapes our hearts and directs us towards a mission that extends beyond ourselves. Our talents and lives are now intertwined with bringing His love and light to others. Reflecting on this passage, we recognize that following Christ might require us to make sacrifices, but it also brings us the deepest fulfillment and joy, as we become instruments of His mission.

Reflection Question:

What familiar "nets" in your life might Jesus be asking you to leave behind to follow Him more closely and become a "fisher of men"?

EN MATEO 4:12-23,

Jesús inicia Su ministerio público con una poderosa invitación: "Sígueme, y los haré pescadores de hombres." Este llamado marca el comienzo de una transformación profunda para Pedro y Andrés. Dejan atrás todo lo familiar—su trabajo, su rutina, su seguridad—para embarcarse en una nueva y desconocida jornada con Cristo. El Evangelio nos desafía a considerar lo que realmente significa seguir a Jesús. Es un llamado a estar abiertos a la conversión, a permitir que Cristo trabaje dentro de nosotros, y a salir valientemente de nuestra zona de confort. Cuando seguimos a Jesús, Él moldea nuestros corazones y nos guía hacia una misión que va más allá de nosotros mismos. Nuestros talentos y vidas ahora se entrelazan con el llevar Su amor y luz a los demás. Reflexionando sobre este pasaje, reconocemos que seguir a Cristo puede requerir sacrificios, pero también nos brinda el más profundo cumplimiento y alegría, al convertirnos en instrumentos de Su misión.

Pregunta de reflexión:

¿Qué "redes" familiares en tu vida podría estar pidiéndote Jesús que dejes atrás para seguirlo más de cerca y convertirte en un "pescador de hombres"?

DID YOU KNOW....

JANUARY 25TH

Marks the Feast of the Conversion of Saint Paul the Apostle. This day commemorates the transformative event when Saul of Tarsus, a fierce persecutor of Christians, encountered the risen Christ on the road to Damascus (Acts 9:1-19). This powerful conversion not only changed Saul's life—turning him into Paul, a fervent apostle, and missionary—but also significantly impacted the growth of early Christianity as he became one of its greatest evangelists and writers of numerous New Testament letters.

The Feast of the Conversion of Saint Paul traditionally concludes the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, which begins on January 18. This ecumenical observance emphasizes prayer and efforts toward unity among all Christians, inspired by Paul's message that the body of Christ is one (1 Corinthians 12:12-27).



ST. THOMAS AQUINAS

Feast Day: January 28

Patronage:

St. Thomas Aquinas is the patron saint of universities, students, and scholars.

Story:

Born in 1225 in Italy, St. Thomas Aquinas was a Dominican friar and an immensely influential philosopher and theologian. Despite being nicknamed the "Dumb Ox" due to his quiet nature, Thomas was brilliant and dedicated to seeking truth. His most famous work, the *Summa Theologica*, is a comprehensive exploration of theology, reasoning, and the relationship between God and humankind, demonstrating the harmony of faith and reason.

Legacy:

St. Thomas Aquinas's synthesis of Aristotelian philosophy with Christian theology laid the groundwork for much of Western thought, ensuring that faith and reason are seen as complementary rather than opposing. His teachings continue to guide the Church's understanding of faith, morality, and the nature of God.

Reflection Question:

In what ways can you integrate faith and reason in your daily life, following St. Thomas Aquinas's example?

I hope this finds you well. One of my favorite daily practices is listening to the Daily Exegesis from Logical Bible Study on the Hallow app. I find it incredibly informative. By focusing on the literal sense of Scripture—what the author intended and how the original audience would have understood it—it consistently deepens my faith.

The Catholic Church teaches that understanding the literal sense of Scripture is the essential foundation before exploring its deeper spiritual meanings. I find this approach especially meaningful. It often leads me to ask “why” and to explore Scripture more deeply, sometimes down unexpected paths. While faith can be complex and challenging, I have come to see that this is part of its beauty.

This past week, I found myself wanting a clear overview of the Bible to help me focus on specific topics for further study. I compiled the following list in the hope that it will not only serve as a helpful guide for me, but also for others who enjoy exploring Scripture more deeply.
