teachers' salaries.

The Teachers Federation attempted to answer the charge of excessive salaries, in a public statement:

There is a general impression that the salaries for teachers are too high in Brandon. As a matter of fact the Brandon schedule is not as high as that of St. Boniface, Portage la Prairie, Winnipeg and the district surrounding it. Saskatchewan and Alberta are paying higher salaries than Manitoba especially in the smaller towns and rural sections ---- The present schedule has been voluntarily accepted by teachers and any departure from it should not be imposed on them in any arbitrary manner, and however critical the financial'situation may be the teachers feel that they ought not to be asked to bear a share of the burden not commensurate with that borne by citizens generally. 45

Replying to the Board's request for the continuance of service during May and June, a letter signed by 84 of the 88 teachers was delivered to the School District on March 25. Of the four missing teachers, two were ill and two others could not be reached.

The teachers on the staff as of March 1, 1922 with their respective locations and salaries were as follows: 46
