PASSOVER

From My Desk...

According to Rabban Gamliel, there are three concepts/activities that are central to our Passover sederim. Without at least mentioning them, he says, we have not made an appropriate seder.

Rabban Gamliel was a leading second century sage, who was also the President of the Sanhedrin. He lived shortly after the Romans burned down Jerusalem, yet he ensured Judaism's survival by transitioning our ancestors from passive onlookers in a Temple-based cult to active synagogue-and-home-based participants. For him, the seder was not simply a rehashing of an old story about slavery and redemption. For him, the seder was a lively audio-visual experience that couldn't be ignored. It was an opportunity to relive, with his seder participants, the very actions that Moses and his generation had experienced. And, so, he declared,

כָּל שֶׁלֹא אָמַר וְשִׁלְשָׁה דְבָרִים אֵלּוּ בְפִסְחָא, לֹא יִצָּא יְדֵי חוֹבְתּוֹ, וְאֵלּוּ הֵן: פֶּסַח, מַצָּה, וּמָרֹר.

Anyone who does not say these three things on Pesach has not fulfilled his obligation, and these are they: PESACH, MATZAH, AND BITTER HERBS.

What do these three things represent? The Pesach represents G-d's passing over the houses of the Hebrew slaves while He brought the death of the first born of every Egyptian. This final plague would guarantee the freedom of the slaves. A sacrifice of thanksgiving was certainly appropriate as the about-to-be-freed Jews awaited Moses' signal to get up and leave. Matza represents the bread that our ancestors ate after they rushed out of Egypt.

Maror represents the afflictions our ancestors experienced while they were slaves under Pharaoh.

It's easy to see how each of these three items were relevant to the generation that had escaped Egypt. These people had directly experienced all of them. And, later, for the second century Jew, who had endured Roman occupation of Judea, and who had witnessed thousands of Jews tortured by Roman "justice", these three things certainly seemed relevant. They were enslaved again-this time by Rome - and, so, a seder at which they ate matzah and maror were all too real for them. And, since the Pesach, or Paschal sacrifice was now prohibited, they reminded themselves that there had been a time when they could sacrifice to G-d without Roman interference.

And, what about us? Until October 7th, 2023, Jews around the world (and in Israel, too) had deluded themselves that we were a new generation, untouched by Egyptian slaveowners, or Roman savagery. Of course, there were outbreaks of antisemitism, but these were largely singular acts; isolated occurrences. The Jewish people, as a whole, were safe. All that came crashing down on that fateful day, and we no longer live under that comfortable illusion. The Haggadah is ultimately correct: "In every generation they stand against us to wipe us out..."

What then, does Pesach, matzah, and maror have to teach us today?

Pesach is the eternal reminder that, since the time of King Solomon, our nation had a central place to worship G-d. The place of the paschal sacrifice is a Jewish site, and there is now an increasing number of voices calling for the re-establishment of Jewish presence on the Temple Mount. Those voices are not 'colonialist' voices. They are Jews waking up to the fact that this is Jewish land, and the holiest Jewish land, at that. Pesach is, in part, the dream of re-establishing Jewish control of Jewish places, and welcoming all peaceful people to join us in honoring G-d. After all, towards the end of our seder, we say, L'shanah Haba'ah B'yerushalayim. Let us celebrate next year's seder in Jerusalem!

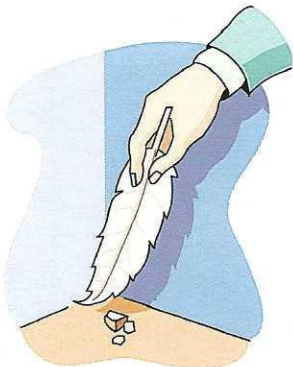
Maror makes us cry. There are plenty of antisemites who would like to see Jews cry. There were too many times throughout history when bitterness and weeping were our lot. No more. Our job is to make sure that the national crying we do is restricted to our sederim. Our job is to ensure that modern Israel remains a strong place which defends itself against all aggressors who wish to make us cry. We must be politically and militarily strong as a people.

Mazah is flat; unrisen. It represents the fact that any "puffing up" that we have done in recent years - over our financial or political success - must be 'tamped down'. Just because we had "made it" in America is no reason for boasting. We must recognize that it is not by our own hand that we accomplish great things, but by G-d's grace. Furthermore, matzah is best washed down with water. In Rabbinic terms, water represents Torah; that which gives spiritual life to our people. Humility, accompanied by Torah learning and Torah living, will assure that G-d continues to grace our lives.

In sum, we must be proud, strong Jews. We must be humble about our success, and dedicated to the spirit of Torah. If we remember that, our sederim will be very meaningful.

BEDIKAT HAMETZ (The Search for Chametz)

A formal search for leaven (Bedikat Hametz) is conducted the night before Pesach. This symbolizes the final removal of leaven (hametz) from the home. Before the search, it is customary to deposit small pieces of bread in strategic places so that the inspection should have a purpose. It is traditionally carried out by the light of a candle, with a feather, and a wooden spoon to collect the hametz; all this is set aside until morning when it is burned.

MECHIRAT CHAMETZ - PESACH 5786/2026 - SELLING CHAMETZ

There is a Biblical commandment of removing all leaven from one's home and business during Passover. In order to fulfill this commandment, individuals transfer their Chametz to the Rabbi, who in turn sells it to a non-Jew. At the conclusion of Passover, the Rabbi buys it back for his community. It is also customary to make a donation at this time (referred to as *Maot Hittin*) to help Jews without sufficient resources for Passover. Kindly complete this form. The Temple must receive it by **10:00 AM, Wednesday, April 1st**.

Nachas, Family, and Tradition: The Heart of El Emeth Sisterhood

El Emeth Sisterhood, by its very nature, exudes *nachas*, family, and tradition. Having been a cornerstone of El Emeth for over 50 years, these aren't just words to us—they are our history. My friend Claude (ette)—who may not be a rabbi but certainly understands the Jewish heart—defines *nachas* as that profound emotional pride we feel in the achievements of our loved ones, especially our children. We see this emotion come to life at every social gathering, spiritual service, and life-cycle event we share.

Our definition of family has beautifully evolved over these five decades, moving beyond stereotypes to embrace the new normal by welcoming extended, blended, same-sex, intergenerational, and "chosen" families. At El Emeth Sisterhood, we invite everyone to find a home within our temple family.

Tradition, however, is often trickier to define. While we respectfully honor the past, we recognize that time marches on. We strive to update old ideals to meet current realities without compromising ritual integrity. We are constantly working to maintain the sacred while pushing into new territory.

Yet, there is a more somber side to Jewish living. During Pesach, we drop wine from our cups to remember the Ten Plagues. From Purim to Hanukkah, from Lag B'Omer to Yom Ha'atzmaut, history reminds us that we have often had to protect ourselves. It would be wonderful if the world could simply learn from the past, but until then, our best defense remains education. Teaching our children brings us *nachas*, but acknowledging the darker chapters of our history is also part of the tradition of being a Jew.

This reality extends to the greater community. Our family includes our non-Jewish neighbors, and we believe education thrives through listening and dialogue. To that end, El Emeth Sisterhood is working to rekindle a program lost to the pandemic: the **Sisterhood Interfaith Tea**. Originally founded at Rodef Sholom by Marion Roth to foster mutual understanding, this program convenes women of all faiths through the auspices of Mahoning Valley Council of Churches. We are proud to be the catalyst for its return in the coming months.

In the meantime, let us focus on one of our most vital educational lessons: teaching our children the story of The Exodus. We wish you all the joy of *kvelling* as you experience *nachas* during your Passover Seder.

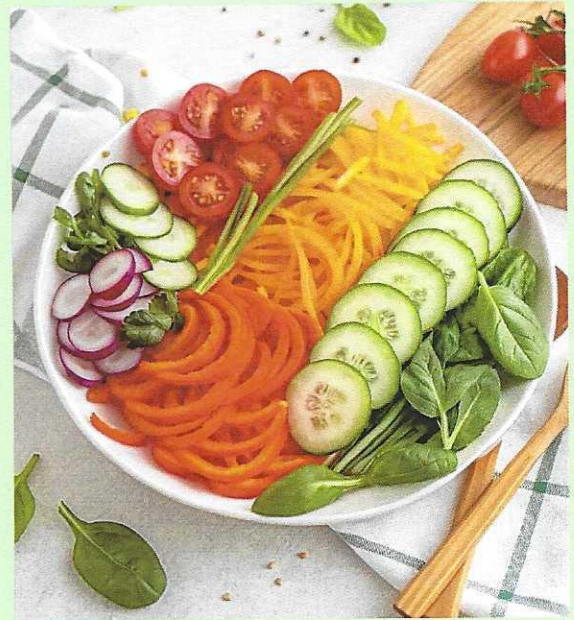

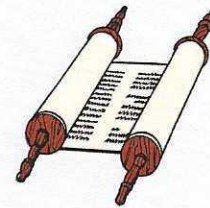

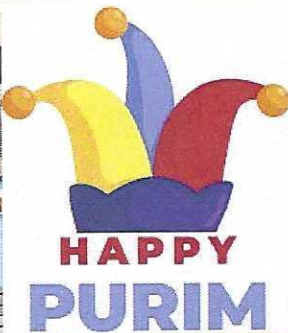
