From My Desk... Who wants a more lively Seder ?

There are times when friends who haven't spoken with each other for a while will set aside some to "catch up". Whether it's through a phone call or face to face contact, one of the most common questions that they ask each other is, "So, what's new?". Hopefully, each friend will have several pieces of news to share that will show how life has blessed them with accomplishments, success, and joyful celebrations. Sharing good news with each other keeps friendships vibrant, as both (or multiple) parties buoy up the conversation with fresh information.

What's true of personal relationships is also true of our relationship with religious rituals. At the Passover table, we tell the story that the written Haggadah provides; a story that we have not shared with each other for an entire year. The booklet may remain the same, and, so, without adding something original, or new, or unexpected, the practice of reading the Haggadah runs the risk of becoming stale. What ideas or activities can we share with each other that might spark a bright conversation at the Seder table?

Here are three suggestions that may enhance your seder celebration.

One- You could highlight the 5 women instrumental in bringing about the redemption from slavery: Yocheved, Moses' mother; Miriam, Moses' sister; Shifra and Puah, the courageous midwives; and Batya, Pharaoh's daughter. The Talmudic rabbis lauded each of these women, and we can do the same. In fact, Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg, in 2015, penned a short, but glorious summary of what these women accomplished on behalf of the Jewish people. Two: The Seder is designed to encourage us to ask questions. The four that we customarily sing at our Seder are examples that the Talmudic rabbis gave us to "jumpstart" the participants. So, about a week in advance of your Seder, ask guests to bring with them one question about Jews or Judaism (history, philosophy, ethnography, etc.). Perhaps a guest has researched something about that particular question, and will be able to share it at the table. But, just asking a good question is at least half the fun. Be sure to provide a small prize for the best, or most difficult, or funniest question that comes up.

Three: It's ok to use the standard Maxwell House Haggadah. However, so many new ones have been printed in the last decade that we have a literary feast. I've used many different ones over the years, since each Haggadah offers its own slant on the Seder. A simple search on Google will bring up a slew of them, and, if you have the time, it's a good idea to choose three or four that look interesting. Read about each one, and then select one that you believe you could use this year. Using a current Haggadah containing comments by thoughtful scholars and popular writers will freshen up your seder immensely.

Friends who get together after a long hiatus will pick up where they left off, and, hopefully, share wonderful ideas and stories to enliven their friendship. So, too with the Sedarim. May you have an inspiring and lively Seder this year.

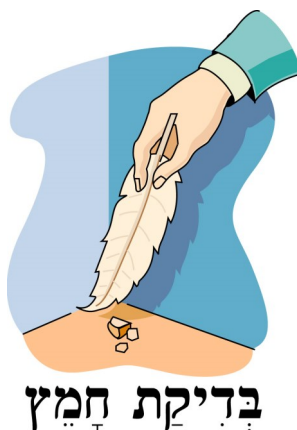

BEDIKAT HAMETZ (*The Search for Chametz*)

A formal search for leaven (Bedikat Hametz) is conducted the night before Pesach. This symbolizes the final removal of leaven (hametz) from the home. Before the search, it is customary to deposit small pieces of bread in strategic places so that the inspection should have a purpose. It is traditionally carried out by the light of a candle, with a feather, and a wooden spoon to collect the hametz; all this is set aside until morning when it is burned.

MECHIRAT CHAMETZ - PESACH 5785/2025 - SELLING CHAMETZ

There is a Biblical commandment of removing all leaven from one's home and business during Passover. In order to fulfill this commandment, individuals transfer their Chametz to the Rabbi, who in turn sells it to a non-Jew. At the conclusion of Passover, the Rabbi buys it back for his community. It is also customary to make a donation at this time (referred to as *Maot Hittin*) to help Jews without sufficient resources for Passover. Kindly complete this form. The Temple must receive it by **10:00 AM, Friday, April 11th**.

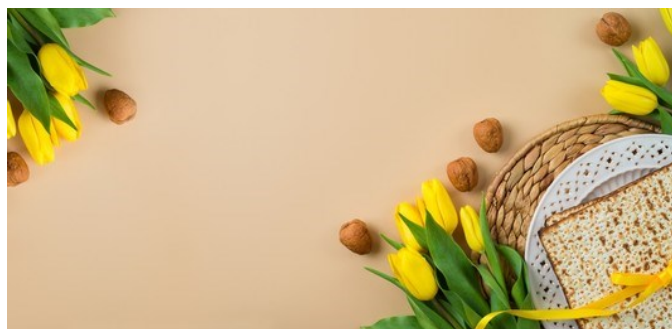

We learn that after several hundred years as slaves, the Israelites set off from Egypt, not knowing what the future would bring; not very different from our lives today. Every yearly celebration, decision, and life change brings with it the mystery of tomorrow. Let's make the most of this season by enjoying the company of family and friends while taking a leap into new life recipes and a bright new outlook.
