From My Desk...

Dear Friends: I share with you my remarks at our Board of Directors meeting on November 5th. I hope you, as well as our Board members, will act.

I will do two things tonight. First, I will teach an ancient text, and show you the relevance it has to a problem we face currently at El Emeth.

Second, I will propose three solutions to the problem, one of which is the best.

Two months ago, we read a haftarah, from the prophet Isaiah. Isaiah lived 2700 years ago, and speaks to the Jewish people of his day. He says that G-d called out to the Jews to repent from their sins, but no one did. As a result, Isaiah warns them that the Temple will be destroyed, and that the subsequent Exile will last a long time. Isaiah (50:2) prophesies in G-d's name:

ַ מַדּוּעַ בָּאתִי וְאֵין אִישׁ, קָרָאתִי וְאֵין עוֹנֶה? הָקְצוֹר קָצְרָה יָדִי מִפְּדוּת, וְאִם־אֵין־בִּי כֹח ?לְהַצִּיל

Why, when I came, was no one there, Why, when I called, would none respond? Is My arm, then, too short to rescue, Have I not the power to save?

Isaiah's statement means that because of their sins, and because they ignore G-d and His expectations of them, the Jews, themselves, are responsible for the destruction of the Temple. Moreover, G-d, who has the power to keep them safe, will no longer do so, and will punish them with a lengthy exile from Israel, and subjugation to their enemies.

Rabbi Yochanan (a sage of the 1st century CE) offers a midrash on this verse. He applies the verse and its message to his own days.

G-d comes into the synagogue, he says, and when there are not ten people there, G-d is immediately upset. "How do we know this?", asks Rabbi Yochanan. From this verse: "Why, when I came, was no one there? Why, when I called, did no one answer?" Rabbi Yochanan explained to the Jews of his day, that G-d arrives at the shul, expecting to find a minyan (at the very least), but sees that there are not ten people. G-d calls out for more people to attend, and no one from the community responds.

My friends. The problem of maintaining a vigorous service is not a new one. Sadly, TEE has this very problem. With snowbirds in Florida, members passing (Rachamana litzlan) or moving away, our Shabbat services are weak. We're running on a razor thin edge. We usually have 10 people, but not always. G-d is upset, and so are the regulars who look forward to having a minyan. And, I thank those regulars - including the snowbirds - who already attend most weekends. I am very grateful for their support. The problem is that we do not have enough regular attendees to maintain a Shabbat minyan.

From Rabbi's Desk,

Why do we have such a weak Shabbat minyan? The 4 answers which follow are not meant to insult readers; they are simply facts.

- 1. People are not accustomed to coming to synagogue.
- 2. Some are afraid to take an aliyah, or lead a part of a service, and do not want to risk being asked.
- 3. Some don't feel any personal need to pray.
- 4. Some believe that they are not needed; they think that someone else can take their place.

There are 3 possible solutions to this problem:

- A. Do nothing, and recognize that we will lose minyanim. This means no Torah reading, and no kaddish for those who want to say it. This is a bad solution that a congregation should reject. But, it's up to the congregation.
- B. "Zoom" our minyanim, rather than "YouTube". At first hearing, this sounds great, since Zoom allows greater participation from home than YouTube. However, I know from two years' experience using Zoom, such services encourage "tune-ins" to remain at home, thus lowering the number of actual attendees in shul, which only exacerbates the problem. It also introduces the frequent problem of "unwanted interruptions", such as what occurred one Friday evening, as I was about to sing Lecha Dodi. We all heard the following conversation: "Mildred, where is the butter? Oh, come on Sam, I told you it's in the fridge on the second shelf!" I also know of people who forget they are on zoom, and appear on camera with inappropriate clothing. This solution, therefore, is unacceptable for me. We'll stay with YouTube.
- C. Ask every Board member (and, now, every member) to become a Shabbat Guardian.

Where does the phrase Shabbat Guardian come from ? It's a translation of Shomer Shabbat: One who observes (lit. "guards") the Shabbat.

A TEE Shabbat Guardian will have 2 Responsibilities:

Attend the 1 hour Friday night service.

Attend the morning service from 10:00 to 12 (2 hours). Shabbat Guardians will help keep our minyan vigorous, and are guarantors that we can read the Torah and that Kaddish can be said.

(Shabbat Guardians do not have to take an aliyah or lead any part of the service, if they do not wish to do so.)

Shabbat Guardians are great Jews. Everybody can be a great Jew for 3 hours on a weekend. If you generally work on weekends, I ask that you consider scheduling 4 weekends, from now until next Rosh Hashanah to become a Shabbat Guardian.

If you are retired, I ask you to share 3 hours of your time on 8 weekends between now and next Rosh Hashanah.

Please consider becoming a Shabbat Guardian. Call the office (or me) to schedule. You and I can work together this year to strengthen our shul.

CANDLE LIGHTING

On Erev Chanukah, we light the first flame, and each night after, we add an additional light until the eighth night, when eight lights are lit.

The Hanukkah candles should be lit At sunset or afterwards.

The candles are placed in the Menorah from right to left, and the flames are lit from left to right, with today's flame being lit first.

The reason we first kindle the light which had been added that evening is to show that the greatness of the Miracle increased on each successive night.

*Friday, December 27th Menorah is lit *before* the Shabbat Candle

*Saturday, December 28th Menorah is lit *after* Havdalah
