From My Desk... The Spiritual Problems of Rabbis

Recently, I had lunch with a dear friend (I'll call him "W") who happens to be a retired rabbi. Our friendship reaches back many years. I always enjoy seeing him, as we share jokes and funny stories. But this particular lunch meeting was a bit more serious and reflective, as W had just reached his 80th birthday.

W told me that he was going through a crisis of faith.

My friend has preached about G-d and spiritual matters all his life. He has taught Biblical literature and Jewish philosophy, and now, he admitted that he was experiencing a crisis of faith. Now, it's important to understand what a crisis of faith is, and what it is not. It is not a crisis of faith when an individual simply says, "I do not believe in G-d." A crisis of faith arises when someone seriously questions his long-held religious beliefs, and suffers from feeling alienated from G-d. It is especially keen in people who are deeply knowledgeable about their faith, and have lived a life closely attached to G-d.

"What prompted this crisis?" I asked him. W told me that if Judaism portrays G-d as loving and kind, "He is doing a good job of hiding it. With the world in such disarray, and the Jewish people under attack around the world, I can't pray to G-d without wondering whether my words have any meaning anymore. I sometimes wonder whether I can even speak of a relationship with G-d anymore."

"Do you still believe there is a G-d?" I asked. He paused.

"I believe there is a G-d who cares about the world, only because not believing would be worse for me, personally."

My friends, I can't say I was shocked. Judaism must deal with this problem because of the very nature of placing one's trust in an unseeable G-d. I sympathize with W. I wanted to help my friend. We spoke at length about the very personal and approachable G-d of Hasidism versus the G-d of Maimonides, who is beyond comprehension and difficult to approach.

Of course, W is familiar with much of what we spoke about. A Jew going through a crisis of faith does well to think deeply about which kind of G-d makes sense to him. And, it is in the very act of searching - really searching - that the possibility of rapprochement with G-d exists.

Maimonidean and Hasidic thought both teach us that pursuing the search is key. Indeed, if we don't look for G-d, we will certainly never find Him. Moreover, if the Jew won't look for G-d, who will? That reminds me of a Hasidic story from G-d's perspective, and (as it were) "the crisis of faith in Man" that G-d experiences.


