From My Desk...

Preparation is the Key

If you want to enjoy a nice vacation away from home, you probably need to make some preparations. There's choosing the right destination, reserving a good hotel, making certain your airline flights are accurate, ascertaining that basic health care facilities are located nearby, packing a few changes of clothing, and other relevant activities, as well. Of course, the possibility of jumping in a car, and simply leaving home for unknown destinations can also be a way of vacationing, but, you're risking a lot. If it works out, great. But, there are many ways such vacations can go wrong.

What's true of vacations is even more true of career. Most people try to plan out an educational path that will direct them towards a goal. Trying to become successful in any endeavor simply by trusting luck may work for a few people. But for the majority, it takes hard work, specific educational training, and dedication to a perceived goal. Over time, we develop an inner sense of what is required to be successful in our chosen profession.

That's also true of our inner spiritual lives. It takes hard work and dedication to move forward spiritually. That truth really hits home during the High Holidays. Extracting just a few minutes of spiritual uplift during Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur can be difficult. Even rabbis have to work at it. Our tradition recognizes this difficulty, and advises that, if you want to really feel spiritually connected, it's risky to arrive at the High Holidays without prior preparation.

That's why preparations for the *Yamim Noraim* begin 30 days before Rosh Hashanah. After every morning service (with the exception of Shabbat), we sound the shofar. The sound is designed to wake us up; not from real sleep, but from spiritual lethargy. It gives us a month's notice - on a daily basis- that today would be a good day to reawaken spiritual connections. Perhaps that means placing a dollar in the synagogue charity box. Perhaps that means returning to a Jewish practice that you have let slip over the year. Or, perhaps it means learning something Jewish through [Judaism 101](#) online. It could also mean making plans during the 30 days prior to Rosh Hashanah for a trip to Israel in the coming year. Activities which focus our attention on Jewish living are a great way to prepare ourselves for the spiritual return which the High holidays ask of us.

There is another well-established practice of reciting certain prayers, called *selichot*, during this 30 day time period. While generally maintained in Sephardic communities, this practice can be adapted to Ashkenazic Jewish circles as well. There are books available to help prepare us for the "Days of Awe".

ABOUT THE YIZKOR BOOK OF REMEMBRANCE

Every year, in preparation of the High Holidays, the names of those for a memorial plaque has been purchased are listed in the **YIZKOR BOOK OF REMEMBRANCE** which is disseminated for Yizkor Services on Yom Kippur, Shemini Atzeret, Pesach, and Shavuot.

For Yom Kippur, the names of loved ones who do **NOT** have a plaque, may be listed on an insert in the Yizkor Book of Remembrance for Yom Kippur only.

This year, in place of the small cards we have used in the past for submitting names for the Yizkor Book of Remembrance insert, we have included a full-size form for you to complete and return to the Temple office no later [than September 25th](#) to ensure your loved ones' names are included on the *Book of Remembrance Yom Kippur Insert*.

Please *print* the names as you want them listed. A donation is customary, but is not required for names listed on the Yom Kippur Insert.

ABOUT MEMORIAL PLAQUES

Memorial plaques may be purchased through the Temple Office. Memorial plaques are mounted in the Chapel. They remain lit for the entire week of Yahrzeit.

The memorial plaque entitles ANY member of the deceased's family, and their heirs, to a yahrzeit notification in perpetuity, as long as the Temple Office is notified of name and address changes and additions.

Membership in Temple El Emeth is **NOT** a requirement for yahrzeit notification for the relatives of those for whom a plaque has been purchased.

Names of deceased from all of the memorial plaques comprise the Book of Remembrance.

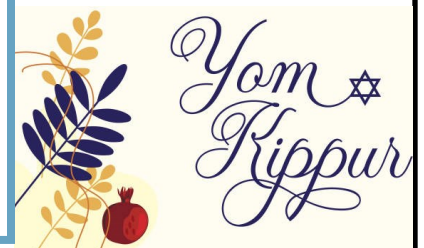
DINNER REFUND POLICY

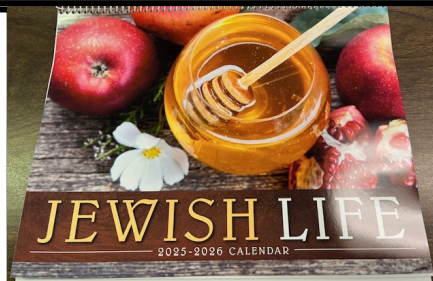

10th of Tishri, 5786

The recording of names in the BOOK OF REMEMBRANCE is a significant religious act. Yizkor is without a doubt, one of Judaism's most emotional rituals. In this moment we recall the memories of all the people we loved, those who gave us life and nurtured us, those with whom we shared time and love, and all of those who were family. The word Yizkor is derived from the Hebrew word zachor, which means simply "to remember." On this day we remember all those who gave our lives the meaning and depth that make our lives what they are. This year we also remember our brothers and sisters who died "Al Kiddush Hashem" just for being Jews both in Israel and around the world.

Every year in preparation for the High Holidays, the names of those for whom a memorial plaque has been purchased are placed into the Memorial Book, which is disseminated for Yizkor on Yom Kippur, Shemini Atzeret, Peasch and Shavuot. For Yom Kippur, however, the names of loved ones who do not have a plaque may be listed on an insert in the *BOOK OF REMEMBRANCE* for the Yom Kippur Yizkor service.

Please print the names of your loved ones, in English, to be included on the *Yizkor Book of Remembrance Insert* and return to the temple office **September 25th**. A donation is customary for names to be listed on the Yom Kippur insert.
