From My Desk...

As the days wear on in Operation Swords Of Iron (the official name for the current war against Hamas), the danger arises that the Israeli government will weaken its commitment to bringing home all the hostages. In fact, Israeli citizens, themselves, cannot maintain the same level of concern that motivated them in the early days of the war. And, for Jews around the world, who live hundreds and even thousands of miles away from Israel, it is even more difficult to maintain, on a daily basis, our concern for the welfare of our brothers and sisters in captivity. This decrease in attention to the plight of the captives is no one's fault. It is human nature. But, that is precisely the danger. Without being constantly reminded of their plight, we may, G-d forbid, relegate these unfortunate men, women and children to the recesses of our memories. Doing so would be, effectively, a death sentence for them all.

On Monday night, August 19th, Noa Reuveni addressed about 80 people assembled in a synagogue in Cleveland Ohio. She spoke of this very danger in clear terms. Noa is an Israeli activist who works tirelessly to keep the plight of the hostages front and center. I attended her moving and heartfelt presentation. She spoke of her special relationship with twin brothers Ziv and Gali Berman, two young men who would otherwise be serving in the IDF. Noa told us of how she and the twins had developed a deep friendship in their high school days, and had never let a day pass without speaking to each other at least once a day. In particular, she and Ziv might text even more frequently, often helping each other through difficult life decisions and family health issues. As Noa put it, "the only person in the world who knows my secrets is Ziv". The three friends would put their lives on the line for each other, she added.

Noa has been going around the United States and other countries visiting Jewish communities to sound the alarm, warning us not to forget the hostages. Not a day should go by without our doing something for them. And that is the hardest part. How can we do something that will prevent us from giving in to human nature, and allowing human nature to lull us into forgetfulness?

Noa suggested that we find something - anything - that will keep reminding us of their plight. Perhaps devoting one or two minutes a day to praying for them. Perhaps baking a challah, or singing a Jewish song every day in their honor. Perhaps looking up the names of those who are still hostages and taking the time to read about them. Reading about one hostage every day will take months, as there are still more than 100 of them in Gaza. Perhaps getting from Amazon a Bring them home now necklace. Noa also suggested joining a walk to remember them that takes place at 9AM every Sunday, rain or shine, in Beachwood, Ohio. There are so many ways to help, and each person can decide for himself how to help.

The specific mitzvah of redeeming captives is known as Pidyon Shvuyim. It is a mitzvah of great significance, and, sadly, we now have the (unwanted) opportunity

Even though we live 6,000 miles away from Israel, we can do our part in keeping the plight of the hostages alive, and working towards the goal of having them return to our people, where they will have the opportunity for rehabilitation, and a chance at regaining a somewhat normal life.

Now that we are in the month of Elul, let us use these days to rekindle our love for our brothers and sisters in Israel, our concern for our family still kept captive in Gazan dungeons, and fire-up our mandate to do more mitzvot in the days leading up to Rosh Hashanah. And may G-d bless us with good health, and a good year filled with Torah, mitzvot, and kind acts.

ABOUT THE YIZKOR BOOK OF REMEMBRANCE

Every year, in preparation of the High Holidays, the names of those for a memorial plaque has been purchased are listed in the YIZKOR BOOK OF REMEMBRANCE which is disseminated for Yizkor Services on Yom Kippur, Shemini Atzeret, Pesach, and Shavuot.

For Yom Kippur, the names of loved ones who do <u>NOT</u> have a plaque, may be listed on an insert in the Yizkor Book of Remembrance for Yom Kippur only.

This year, in place of the small cards we have used in the past for submitting names for the Yizkor Book of Remembrance Insert, we have included a full-size paper for you to complete and return to the Temple office no later than **October 7**th to ensure your loved ones' names are included on the **Book of Remembrance Yom Kippur Insert**.

Please *print* the names as you want them listed. A donation is customary, but is not required for names listed on the Yom Kippur Insert.

ABOUT MEMORIAL PLAQUES

Memorial plaques may be purchased through the Temple Office. Memorial plaques are mounted in the Chapel. They remain lit for the entire week of Yahrzeit.

The memorial plaque entitles ANY member of the deceased's family, and their heirs, to yahrzeit notification in perpetuity, as long as the Temple Office is notified of name and address changes and additions.

Membership in Temple El Emeth is NOT a requirement for yahrzeit notification for the relatives of those for whom a plaque has been purchased.

Names of deceased from all of the memorial plaques comprise the Book of Remembrance.

Yahrzeit Memorial Plaques ordered by <u>September 30th</u> will be included in the 5785 Book of Remembrance in time for Yom Kippur.



YOM KIPPUR, THE DAY OF ATONEMENT Wednesday, October 12, 2024 10th of Tishri, 5785

The recording of names in the BOOK OF REMEMBRANCE is a significant religious act. Yizkor is without a doubt, one of Judaism's most emotional rituals. In this moment we recall the memories of all the people we loved, those who gave us life and nurtured us, those with whom we shared time and love, and all of those who were family. The word Yizkor is derived from the Hebrew word zachor, which means simply "to remember." On this day we remember all those who gave our lives the meaning and depth that make our lives what they are. This year we also remember our brothers and sisters who died "Al Kiddush Hashem" just for being Jews both in Israel and around the world.

Every year in preparation for the High Holidays, the names of those for whom a memorial plaque has been purchased are placed into the Memorial Book, which is disseminated for Yizkor on Yom Kippur, Shemini Atzeret, Peasch and Shavuot. For Yom Kippur, however, the names of loved ones who do not have a plaque may be listed on an insert in the BOOK OF REMEMBRANCE for the Yom Kippur Yizkor service.


