## KAIROS CORNER

March, 2024
I shared a blessing by John O'Donohue at the close of the most recent meeting of our presbytery. It's called "For the Interim Time." The whole blessing speaks to me, but four lines in particular sound a note so true that I can't stop thinking about them:

You are in this time of the interim
Where everything seems withheld.
The path you took to get here has washed out;
The way forward is still concealed from you.
Have you ever been stuck in a place or time like that? When you can't figure out what's going on? When nothing feels familiar? Where you know things have changed-and you aren't sure how you got here or where to go next?

It happens to each of us, I suppose. And it happens to communities of faith like ours. The pandemic sped the pace of change for congregations like us, and it's been difficult to catch up. It seems almost cliché to say, but it remains true: nothing is the same; it's all changed.

Maybe you know the temptation of wanting to go back to the way things were, whatever that may mean in your imagination, and find that O'Donohue gives you some language for what you have discovered the hard way. "The path that took you here has washed out," which means you can't go back.
Or maybe you don't want to go back, but you are convinced that you are stuck and you're desperate to move-anywhere! If your temptation is to rush ahead to the next thing too quickly, O'Donohue has a word for you too. "The way forward is still concealed from you."
With the path that got us here gone, and the way forward still concealed from us, it feels much like what O'Donohue describes-like an interim time.

The biblical language speaks of times like this as like being in exile, or in the wilderness. And while no one seeks such moments (or rarely), times in exile, in the wilderness, have produced some of the most beautiful articulations of our faith.

The question we face, then, is whether this "interim time" will lead us to despair, or to a renewed hope, a deeper faith.
Easter reminds us of God's power to make all things new. Our task is to wait in the midst-not idly, but with prayer and other disciplines of readiness-so that when God shows up with power, the way before us will become clear once more. And we will do what we have sought to do for generations-to love God with all that we are, and our neighbors as ourselves.

Hold on to instruction, do not let it go; guard it well, for it is your life. Proverbs 4:13


From UK Health Care: 6 Tips to poison-proof your home It's not uncommon for kids to get their hands on potentially dangerous stuff around the house. Make up, personal care products, pesticides, art supplies, and of course medicines can be a threat if ingested. This danger also applies if an adult with cognitive issues lives in the home or even just visits, so being mindful of how we store things is important.

1. Store all cleaning solutions out of sight and reach. Under the sink is eye level for children.
2. Poisonous items should be stored in the original containers with safety locks in place. This includes liquid packets for laundry and dishwasher.
3. Dangerous household items include health and beauty products, plants, cleaning and gardening supplies, alcohol and lead. Keep them out of sight.
4. Make sure all medicines and vitamins are not left out, on a bedside stand or in a purse.
5. Post the Poison Help Number in a clear place that is visible to all 800-222-1222.
6. If you suspect any lead based paint, remove any peeling paint strips.
Take a walk around your home and look through the lens of a child what might be a danger that can be prevented.
