

have family and friends in Ukraine and have been directly affected by the turmoil that has resulted in the loss of many lives.



ACTIONS TAKEN AT 2.24.22 EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Administration update

- David Jamieson, newly elected UCC president, shared his personal journey of serving the Lord and entering the ministry. A brief introduction of each executive committee member and a short devotional was then given. Jamieson shared how excited he was to be a part of the conference and is very much looking forward to seeing how God blesses the work here in a transformative way.
- Rodney Mills, UCC vice president for administration, shared the 2021 year-end conference membership statistical report. Mills included a story about a young single mother that began attending Spokane Central Church with her children. As a non-Adventist, she was very interested in the church and never missed a Sabbath. She began volunteering with Vacation Bible School and was eventually baptized.
- Darin Patzer, manager of Shine 104.9 (KEEH) gave a report about the work of his team in the Spokane area. Shine has been named the #1 station in Spokane for several of the past few months by Nielson. The radio ministry continues to create relationships in the Spokane community through local events and concerts. Shine has three major concert events happening this spring with a large event in the fall. Through its annual fundraisers, Shine is completely funded through listener support.
- Eric Brown gave a report from the ministerial, men's ministry, and family ministry department. Supporting our pastors through COVID has been his number one priority since starting at UCC in 2020. An evangelism fund and a way to disburse the funds has been developed to assist our pastors with community evangelism.
- It was voted that Spokane North View Adventist Company be accepted as a church and recommend

- their acceptance into the sisterhood of churches at the next Constituency Session.
- It was voted to approve the establishment of the Hermiston Rekindle Adventist Group, planted by the Hermiston Spanish Adventist Church.

Financial update

- Allee Currier, UCC vice president for finance, presented an update on conference finances.
- Working capital continues to grow with 3.71 months saved. The conference goal is six months.
- The 2022 budget will be based on a 92% tithe basis.

Education update

- Brian Harris, UCC vice president for education, gave an update from office of education.
- UCC schools experienced a much higher rate of COVID during the months of January late February, 2022. Cases are now stabilizing and dropping significantly. Masking requirements are expected to be released in the next month.
- The first spiritual retreat for Upper Columbia Conference educators is planned for April 1-3, 2022, at Camp MiVoden. The spiritual retreat, titled "Overflow: Being filled beyond the brim!," will focus on principals and teachers with an emphasis on purpose.
- By 2023, the office of education anticipates implementing standards-based learning to reinforce core elements and build capacity in our educators.
- Several critical issues are on the horizon for the office of education, including LGBTQ+ and mental health of our students. Addressing these needs will be of great importance to our schools and educators, as will providing them with the resources they need to address these challenges.
