### Day 1 -- God's Word Answers the Big Questions

### Day 2 -- God's Word Feeds and Nourishes

The Bible invites us to a daily feast, encouraging us to seek God's Word regularly throughout the day.

As we embark on this second day of our devotional journey, we again turn our hearts and minds to God's Word. Just as we require daily nourishment for our bodies, the Bible provides daily sustenance for our intellectual and spiritual needs. Today, we explore the profound impact of God's Holy Word in feeding and nourishing our souls.

The Word is a powerful, discerning force. It digs deep into our core, shining a light on our hidden thoughts and calling us to lay ourselves aside and serve others. It is a trusted guide and a mirror that reflects Christ's redeeming love and God the Father's merciful heart. Nothing is as effective in transforming our lives than a prayerful study and life application of what we learn in Scripture! "For the Word of God is living and active, sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing to the division of soul and of spirit, of joints and of marrow, and discerning the thoughts and intentions of the heart" Hebrews 4:12 (ESV).

Imagine attempting to sustain your physical body with just one meal a week. Picture the weariness, the lack of energy, and the inevitable decline in health. This mental exercise highlights the importance of consistent nourishment for our bodies. Similarly, our spiritual selves require regular sustenance to thrive, and God's Word stands as the divine feast our souls crave. Consider the meal of the week. It may have been a magnificent and satisfying experience, providing energy and sustenance for that particular moment. Yet, as time passes, the effects wane, and we find ourselves needing another meal to meet the demands of a new day. Trying to get through the week on one encounter with God's Word, no matter how impactful is insufficient to carry us through the challenges and opportunities of today.

The Bible invites us to a daily feast, encouraging us to seek God's Word regularly throughout the day. In Matthew 4:4, Jesus declares, "Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of God." This verse echoes the sentiment that just as physical food is vital for our bodies, the spiritual nourishment derived from God's Word is indispensable for our souls.

We can incorporate daily Bible reading into our routines in many practical ways. Using a Bible app is a convenient way to stay on track with daily reading, and it offers various reading plans, devotions, and tools to help us dive deeper into God's Word. Committing a verse or passage to memory is an excellent way to internalize the Word and have it readily available for meditation and reflection throughout the day. Comparing writing styles among different Bible versions can also help us gain a richer and more nuanced understanding of the text, especially when encountering challenging or complex passages.

The psalmist beautifully captures the essence of God's Word when he describes it as "sweeter than honey dripping from a honeycomb" Psalm 19:10. The imagery evokes not only sweetness but also richness and abundance. Just as honey provides sweetness and sustenance, God's Word offers a profound and multifaceted nourishment for our spiritual well-being.

In 1 Peter 2:2, we are urged to "crave pure spiritual milk, so that by it you may grow up in your salvation." This metaphor of milk underscores the essential nature of God's Word in the developmental stages of our faith. It's not a one-time feast. Instead, it provides a continual spiritual nourishment that enables us to grow and mature in our relationship with Christ.

We may struggle with motivation to eat healthy foods, and we may also encounter challenges in prioritizing daily spiritual nourishment. Yet, just as we reap the benefits of a healthy diet in our physical health, we can experience the transformative power of God's Word in our spiritual lives when we make it a daily priority. The concept of daily nourishment is deeply ingrained in the Lord's Prayer, where Jesus teaches us to pray, "Give us this day our daily bread" Matthew 6:11. This goes beyond a plea for physical sustenance; it encompasses a profound acknowledgment of our dependence on God's provision, guidance, and wisdom every day.

It's easy to underestimate the significance of daily spiritual nourishment. Yet, just as our bodies require consistent and balanced nutrition, our souls crave the sustenance found only in God's Word. It is not a mere religious ritual but a lifeline, a source of strength, wisdom, and divine connection that empowers us to face the challenges and uncertainties of each day.

As we reflect on the vital role of God's Word in nourishing our souls, let us approach it with a sense of anticipation and reverence. ### Day 3 – God's Word Brings Salvation

Ezekiel 36:26 It is essential to fasten powerful Bible texts in our hearts and minds in order to ride upon the high places of faith and victory during times of trial. "For the weapons of our warfare are not carnal, but mighty through God to the pulling down of strong holds" 2 Corinthians. 10:4. Jesus said: "the words that I speak unto you, they are spirit, and they are life" John. 6:63.

Remember how Jesus touched the leper and his leprosy was healed. When the enemy tries to make you think that you are unclean through the leprosy of sin, you may claim the healing words of Jesus, "be thou clean". ### Day 4 -- God's Word is Powerful

"And take the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God; praying always with all prayer and supplication in the Spirit, being watchful to this end with all perseverance and supplication for all the saints" Eph 6:10-18.

Temptation often hits us unexpectedly, and we're seldom thinking about reading the Bible at that moment. This is why we need to read the Bible and put on the full armor of God every day so that we can meet Satan's temptations.

So put: Truth around your waist; Righteousness as your breastplate; The peace of preparation of the gospel for your shoes; Shield of faith to quench the fiery darts of the wicked ones; Salvation as a helmet; and the Holy Spirit as your sword. This will help us to be like Jesus. When Satan tempted Him three times in the desert, Jesus spoke to him from the Word of God thereby defeating him. God's Word is essential because through it we can have meaningful, come-to-Jesus conversations.

Have you ever had a conversation that went south? When I was a child, one of my jobs was to wash and dry the dishes when I came home from school. My brother also had this job depending on which day mom assigned the task. One day I came home from school and wanted to do something else. I wrote a note to my brother that said, "Mom says you are supposed to do the dishes today." Signed Mom. Needless to say, when my brother read the note, he knew mom had not written it. After a short conversation, I ended up washing the dishes. My brother knew mom would not write a note to him that way. He also recognized it was not her handwriting.

When listening for the voice of God, we need to realize that His voice will always agree with the truth in his word (John 16:13). "All scripture is breathed out by God and profitable for teaching" 2 Timothy 3:16. God will not tell us to fear (1 John 4:18). He tells us to be quick to hear and slow to speak, (James 1:19).

"God's word is living and active, sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing to the division of soul and of spirit, of joints and of marrow, and discerning the thoughts and intentions of the heart" Hebrews 4:12. There are voices in the world that pretend to know how to have a conversation with God, but if they speak not according to what is in the Bible, they are false. We are to be on guard against the devil who tries to deceive us (1 Peter 5:8).

We are safe listening for God's voice when we pray through the Bible. We can have a full-circle communication with God through scripture and prayer. As we pray for all men, women, boys and girls in Upper Columbia Conference to develop a deep connection with the Holy Spirit, and a conversation with God, let us pray through John 10:27-30. "My sheep hear my voice, and I know them, and they follow me. I give them eternal life, and they will never perish, and no one will snatch them out of my hand. My Father, who has given them to me, is greater than all, and no one is able to snatch them out of the Father's hand. I and the Father are one."

## Day 6 -- God's Word Is Truth

Jesus answered, "I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me" John 14:6.

"What is truth?" It was the question Pilate asked Jesus at His trial and the question every philosopher has asked since the Greeks revolutionized the discipline. Currently, there are multiple answers on the market and you are invited to pick the one you like best. "There is no absolute truth," one says. Another theorizes, "Truth is what is real for you; it is what you want it to be". Many voices scream, "My truth is the only truth." So, what is Truth? Perhaps the question is better asked, "Who is Truth?" For that answer we look to John the apostle who wrote much on this theme. In John 14:6, Christ declares Himself to be the truth. The first

chapter of the Gospel of John declares Jesus to be full of grace and truth. "The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us. We have seen his glory, the glory of the one and only Son, who came from the Father, full of grace and truth" John 1:14.

"For the law was given through Moses; grace and truth came through Jesus Christ" John 1:17. In John 17:17, Christ asks the Father to sanctify or clean His followers with the Truth. He then states that God's word is truth. If we follow the reasoning, we find ourselves back at the first chapter of John where we discover that Christ is the Word made flesh.

So, to recap: God's Word is Truth, Christ is God's Word, and so, therefore, Christ is Truth. The Holy Scriptures are the character of Christ in written form, for "all Scripture is God-breathed" 2 Timothy 3:16\*, and the character of Christ is love (1 John 4:88). The Bible, as a full revelation of God to the world, particularly in Christ, is reliable as our source of truth, the measure by which we can measure all else. As confusion in our world continues to exponentially increase, it is imperative to have a solid foundation upon which to rest. And that foundation is the Eternal Word, found in Christ and the Holy Scriptures. "For man shall live... by every Word that proceeds from the mouth of God." Deuteronomy 8:3

#### Dear Father God,

As I search for truth, guide me first to Your Word. Help me to hide your Word in my heart that I might have a solid foundation in a time of upheaval and shaking. I invite Christ Your Living Word into my heart that I might know Him better and reflect your precept of love to the corner of the world you have planted me in.
