What A Find!! By Tim Cox

I am a keen metal detectorist and I would like to tell you about my amazing find in a field locally.

There were eighteen silver hammered coins from the reign of Elizabeth 1 and James 1 all found close together on ridge and furrow pasture about eight inches below the surface. They were either lost or buried I suppose we shall never know. The find is classed as a hoard so I had to contact my local finds liaison officer at Derby Museum and the coins now become the property of the Crown.

The find was made on 1st August 2025.

These sorts of finds are the real high point of the hobby but a lot of the time I spend full days searching and only find trash, so you need to be patient.

When you dig up a coin that was lost hundreds of years ago it's just amazing to think about the person who lost it all those years ago - where did they live and what was their occupation?

Please be aware before you go metal detecting you always need the land owner's permission.

Cookery Corner by Longford WI

There appears to be a plentiful supply of apples locally at the moment so I have used some for this recipe from Ashbourne Show.

Apple Crumble Custard Cake

Ingredients:

150g softened butter

3 large eating apples

2 eggs

220g caster sugar

260g self raising flour

2 tablespoons custard powder

180 ml milk

For the topping:

110g plain flour

165g light soft brown sugar

75g desiccated coconut

100g softened butter



- 1. Butter a 23cm springform tin and line with baking paper.
- 2. Peel, core and slice the apples thickly. Put the slices in a pan. Add 60ml water. Cover and simmer until just tender. Drain and cool.
- 3. Preheat the oven to 170C/ 150C fan. Place all the crumble topping ingredients into a food processor and process until it resembles rough breadcrumbs. Set aside.
- 4. Now make the cake mixture. Whisk the eggs and sugar until light and creamy. Add the butter and process for a further 2 mins. Add the flour, custard powder and milk and process until combined.
- 5. Place the cake mixture into the cake tin and level the top. Lay the stewed apples on top, covering all the cake mixture. Sprinkle over the prepared topping. Bake for about an hour a skewer inserted in the centre should come out clean.

Serve as a cake or dessert.

The Charity nowadays does this in part by making grants of modest financial assistance to young persons under 25 years of age living in these villages who have left secondary school and are in, or are about to begin, university or college courses, apprenticeships or similar training. The grants are usually paid in December or January and limited to two grants per person.

Please spread the word that applications are now invited for grants for 2025. Applications should be submitted by email to Paul Hudson at paulhudson67@icloud.com and applicants should ensure that they receive an acknowledgement of receipt from Paul to confirm that their application has been safely received. Applications should state:

- (i) the applicant's name, home address, and age;
- (ii) what course is being undertaken, their university/college/ employer and what year of the course the applicant is currently in; and
- (iii) any specific purposes for which the grant may be sought in order to help the Trustees in considering the application (iv) and whether this is your first or second application.

In addition, it will be necessary for applicants to provide written evidence that they have secured their place (or continuation of their study) at their university/college or provide a letter from their employer confirming that their apprenticeship or training is being undertaken.

The Longford Book Group by Angela Churchill

This is our 20th year and we have had a busy summer. In June we had a "Jane Eyre Walk", a hilly circuit beginning in Hathersage and taking in eight points of inspiration for Charlotte Bronte's book. It was a beautiful sunny day and we had a picnic stop on top of Stanage Edge.

Our next event was a huge surprise (to me at least); an afternoon of Regency dancing which was perfect timing on the 250th anniversary year of Jane Austen's birth. Our dancing was rounded off by a wonderful afternoon tea in the beautiful, sunny garden of one of our members. We found Regency dancing quite tricky and consequently quite amusing as we tried to remember our





Tales of a Country Parish by Colin Heber-Percy, (Octopus), Book Group Score 6


Written by the vicar of Savernake Forest during the Covid lockdown, this is a book full of thoughts and ideas about faith, often triggered by an everyday event from his life during this time. Colin Heber-Percy draws on experience, biblical knowledge, history, philosophy, etymology and more to explore his subject. Although easy and accessible to read, we thought this book best read and digested in bite size pieces. We felt it might work better in a "thought for the day" type format, due to how densely packed with information each chapter was. We also questioned the accuracy of the back cover which states that the book is relevant to all, "regardless of faith and creed", since either all the ideas explored in Tales of a Country Parish are based around Christianity, or Christianity is used as a key point of exploration of the idea, with biblical references. The book comes with a list of music, listened to by the author at various stages of writing, which was interesting and which we talked about.



I Belong Here by Anita Sethi, (Bloomsbury), Book Group Score 6

In this book, Anita Sethi explores racism and at times, sexism, whilst walking in the North of England. Despite a number of accolades, this was definitely a Marmite book for us, with most of us thinking Anita Sethi had sought to tackle some weighty topics but seemed to have done so in a superficial way. We felt factual reference was needed for some comments and context for others, whilst the writing style was at times repetitive in both use of words and content. Those who had enjoyed the book had listened to the audible version. They enjoyed hearing the information discussed and the descriptions of Yorkshire in particular. They also liked Anita Sethi as the narrator. Overall we agreed that it was shocking that racism continues to be experienced in the 21st century.

Our next 2 books are both novels, the first to be discussed at our September meeting.


