Cookery Corner by Longford WI

Christmas bites - Cranberry, brie & bacon in mini filo cases

Ingredients

1 sheet filo pastry
30g unsalted butter
75g brie
Half a teaspoon mustard (optional)
50g cranberry sauce
35g smoked backed bacon rashers
You will need a 12 hole mini muffin tin

Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 190C/170C fan. Cut the bacon into 1cm strips.
- 2. Melt the butter and brush it over the filo pastry. Cut the pastry into 5cm squares. Place 3 squares on top of each other, angled a little to create a star.
- 3. Press each pile of 3 squares into one of the holes in the mini muffin tin to form a pastry case.
- 4. Cut the brie into 12 small pieces and put one into each pastry case. Add a small amount of mustard, if you choose to include this. Then add some cranberry sauce and finish with a bacon strip.
- 5. Bake for around 11 minutes. Check the bacon is cooked, the pastry is golden and the cheese is melted.
- 6. Remove from the oven, cool a little in the tin then remove and serve warm. Delicious!

The quantities of each filling can be varied to suit your taste.

Longford Community Fund by Ginty Leedham

Winter Bird Visitors by Mick Tunnicliffe

It's the time of year when our summer visitors have headed south to various areas of Southern Europe and Africa and warmer climes. Willow Warblers, Chiffchaff, Swallows, House Martins, Swifts, Redstarts and Sand Martins and many more species.

They are replaced by birds that have bred in the Arctic and Northern Europe, such as Fieldfare, Redwing, Waxwing, Pink Footed Goose and Whooper and Bewick Swans.

Whooper and Bewick Swans don't stay the winter in this area but head down to Norfolk and Suffolk where they feed during the day on sugar beet tops and spilled grain in stubble fields, then roost safely at night on reservoirs and other bodies of water.

Sometimes during October and November I have seen skeins (Geese) and herds (Swans) over Longford heading south, honking to keep in touch with one another, a wonderful sight.

Fieldfare and Redwing are common around Longford, you will see them in fields and gardens feeding on the abundant berries at this time of year, however having said that I have not seen many yet this year.

Waxwings are one of those birds that are very difficult to find in most years, I suspect most residents have never seen one. I only see them if there is an alert on my Rare Bird Pager and I

would have travel to see them (Twitching), which I have done on a couple of occasions when they were in

Allestree and Stretton I recall.

However, two years ago when it was what they call a 'Waxwing Winter' when tens of thousands arrive because of a poor berry crop in their usual winter area. We were walking in the grounds of Alton Towers when we found about six of them, very close, a beautiful bird.

This winter there are very few waxwings around, mainly in the Aberdeen, Scarborough and East Coast areas, however as they eat the berry crop up they move further inland, so you never know they may reach this area.

If there are any close by this winter I will put it on the WhatsApp Group.

What a great year for house martins. We have had two nests on the front of our houses, Mill View & Holme Lea and one at the back. There seems to have been an abundance of swallows and bats as well which is really lovely to see, such a privilege to sit in the garden at dusk and see so many bats flying around. Long may it continue.

The Longford Book Group by Angela Churchill

We had a trip to Sudbury Stables tearoom for a pre-Christmas coffee and have now set about organising our Christmas party. Once again we've decided to have it in January, for some winter cheer after the Christmas festivities.

The Secrets of Hartwood Hall by Katie Lumsden (Penguin) Book Group Score 7

A fairly light modern take on the Victorian gothic novel. The story follows recently widowed Margaret, forced by circumstance to take up the role of governess at isolated Hartwood Hall. Threats from other servants, the mysterious east wing and a strange figure in the forest, add to Margaret's sense of foreboding.

We felt this was quite a fun book, with enough mystery to keep us reading, even though some events were slightly silly. We talked about how much of the story we had managed to guess in advance. We discussed the measles outbreak in the book and Margaret's final decision.

Getting Away by Kate Sawyer (Bonnier Books Ltd), Book Group Score 6

We were lucky enough to be given a set of 10 copies of this novel by the publisher. A story of 4 or 5 generations of one family, told through their various holidays. Beginning when a day out on the works trip was the annual get-away; ending where members of the family meet by flying halfway across the world for a celebration. We learn of family secrets, personalities and see past harms healing over the generations.

Two of the group enjoyed this very much as an easy, end of summer read. Others found it lacked momentum and interest after the first few chapters. We enjoyed how the book showed holidays changing over the course of the last century, up to the present time. We also liked the chapter on Butlins, and seeing post war Britain through the eyes of a young American. We discussed how it was quite difficult to remember all the characters in the book as the family grew and how some seemed to be included mainly to ensure that a range of types of individual was represented. Some of us found the character development to be minimal as was any description of fallout from major life events, but we also talked about whether this might be due to seeing the family through snapshots in time, over a period of many years.

We are looking forward to meeting to talk about our next book in January 2026!

The Oldest Building in Longford

The oldest building in Longford, Hollington or Rodsley that dates from early in the 12th century.

Churchyard clear-up


Thanks to everyone who helped with the churchyard clear up in October. Your efforts are very much appreciated.
