





Stilwell Kiwanis Club 61st Anniversary

The Stilwell Kiwanis Club celebrates its 61st anniversary this year. The history of the club is so closely related to the now famous annual "Strawberry Festival", which they conceived and brought into existence as to seem almost synonymous terms. I however, strawberry promotion was not the original basis for the club's foundation.

The credit for its creation must go to seven civic-minded leaders of Stilwell, all of whom are now deceased. These men were: Jack Chaffin, Otto Alderson. Norvell Henley. Dick Brodie, Max Holcomb, Paul Chambers and Joe H. Carson.

They were enjoying a coffee break at a local café and began talking of an international organization called KIWANIS, formed in Detroit several years previously. The name was an Indian name that means WE SERVE. This title appealed to the hearts and minds of these seven men. They each had a desire to serve their community and their fellow man.

They soon recruited twenty-eight other men of Stilwell with like vision and petitioned the international organization for a charter which they received in early 1946.

By making personal contributions and conducting fund raising activities they financed a summer baseball program for the youths of the surrounding area that summer.

Also a swimming program was started when one of the original joiners, M.N. (Doc) Beene, loaned the use of his private swimming pool for that purpose. The club had raised sufficient funds to pay for an instructor, lifeguards and chemicals for the pool.

By the second year it was apparent that the club was determined to be in existence for years and other organizations began to lend assistance. Many small programs that had struggled to exist under a single sponsoring group were now able to expand and grow.

It wasn't until 1948 that the idea of a festival to promote the delicious strawberries being produced in Adair County was conceived and attempted.

It has been a giant step from that single baseball program in 1946 to baseball and swimming program in 1947. The step became a "Leap" with the beginning of a Strawberry Festival in 1948. This festival featured a one block long parade and a ten-year old "Strawberry Queen". She was selected by the applause of the crowd assembled at the steps of the Court House on the festival day. No one could have dreamed it would grow into the tremendous production you see today.

In the midst of this wonderful celebration today, the Stilwell Kiwanis wishes to pause briefly and remember sixty one years ago and the club's humble beginnings. Most of all to pay tribute on this sixtieth anniversary to those farsighted men who wanted to SERVE their fellow man and did so in a far greater sense than even they would have ever believed possible

In looking over the names of those thirty-five men on the original roll of the club, only one is known to still be alive today. He is Tom J. Carson. Tom Carson still lives in the community and although no longer an active member of the club, he still promotes Stilwell and its youth in every possible way.

We members of the club today only hope that on this sixty-first anniversary we can have the vision to carry on and SERVE our community as well as it has been served in the past.





In the Bluegrass Unlimited, Shawn Camp, songwriter of songs for Garth Brooks and Brooks and Dunn, referred to Virgil Bonham as one of his influences as a songwriter, as Virgil recruited him in the Band, Signal Mountain... Jim P. Blair is the president of the Oklahoma Music Hall of Fame and picked in a former band with Garth Brooks, the Red Valley Barn Stormers...Clifford Parrett was a member of a National Dixie Land Jazz Band and performed on the David Letterman show. A first for The Bonham Revue came in 2004 when they traveled to Europe to perform at a major music festival in Schleusingen. This group has had the honor of sharing the stage with such bluegrass greats as Bill Monroe, Lester Flatt, Ricky Skaggs, Vince Gill, the Whites, Emmylou Harris, Jerry Douglas and Byron Berline. They have performed at such shows as Grants Bluegrass Festival in Hugo, Oklahoma, River Fest in Farmington, New Mexico and the Oklahoma International Bluegrass Festival in Guthrie, Oklahoma, and many more over the years. 

Adair & Bigby Families

The Adair and Bigby Families are among the oldest families who reside in Adair County, Oklahoma. Both of these families were originally of Scottish-Irish descent and came to the United States from Europe in the 1700's and settled in areas that were in the heart of the Old Cherokee Nation. The Adairs settled in northern Georgia in a place that later became known as Adairsville. The Bigbys settled in eastern Tennessee in the Amohee District of the Old Cherokee Nation.

Both of these families intermarried into the Cherokees pre-removal to Indian Territory. Our ancestry can be traced back to a Cherokee woman, Nancy Ward who was known as the "Beloved Woman of the Cherokees."

These mixed blood Cherokees, the Adairs and Bigbys, were farmers, educators, political leaders, ministers, and business people. They either learned to speak or understood the Cherokee language.

The Bigby family members were forced to leave their homes when the Cherokees were removed over the "Trail of Tears" in 1839. The patriarchs of the Bigby family were Thomas Wilson Bigbey, Sr. and his wife, Margaret Catherine (Adair) Bigbey. With them on the journey to a new land in the west that became known as Indian Territory were many other relatives. Upon arrival in Indian Territory, the Bigbeys settled in an area that later became known as Oak Grove which is east of present day Stilwell. Just as they had lived previously, the Bigbeys cleared land, built homes, established businesses, opened schools, and organized churches in their new homeland in Indian Territory. Some family members became active in Cherokee Tribal Government. The Bigbeys became prominent citizens in Indian Territory.

While some of the Adair family were very early settlers in Indian Territory pre-removal of the Cherokees, other Adairs remained in Georgia until 1868 when John Adair and his wife Annie Berry (Graham) Adair and their families left Georgia by wagons and carts pulled by horses and oxen as they traveled to Indian Territory. Most of the Adair men in this group had served in the Confederate Army during the Civil War. They came west to join other family members who already resided in Indian Territory.

After a long and very difficult journey that lasted over several months, John and Annie Adair settled in the Chalk Bluff community, which is also east of present day Stilwell, Oklahoma. Other Adair family members also settled in the surrounding area and built or acquired homes and farms.

Virgil Ballentine Adair and his wife Talitha Jane (Bates) Adair purchased a large two-story log home from the Wright family in the Piney community in 1869. This Adair home is still owned by the present day Adair family. The Piney community was home to many of the Adairs. The Adairs in the Piney community established homes, schools, farms, country stores and even an early day post office. The Adairs also became a prominent family.

Six generations after their arrival to Indian Territory, the Adair and Bigby families still reside in Adair County, Oklahoma. Many of the families still reside on the original land settled by our ancestors who came to this area of Northeastern Oklahoma over 168 years ago. And yes, we are still educators, farmers, ranchers, business people, ministers, and political leaders in our area.





Fletcher's Hardware

The Fletcher Family has been in this area since 1855 when Robert Harrison Fletcher was recorded in the Flint District of the CNIT (Cherokee Nation Indian Territory). This area is the current area of Adair County. He married Charlotte Elizabeth Bigby in 1858 and they lived in the Goingsnake District of the CNIT. They had 9 children. The oldest child was Benjamin Gilreath Fletcher. He and his wife, Mary Harriet Guthrie, had many business ventures during their marriage. The one that has lasted for 100+ years is the Fletcher Hardware Store of Stilwell. It began in Flint District in the late 1800's and moved it to Stilwell in 1906.

Ben and Mary Harriet's son, Calvin Lorenzo (Wren) Fletcher, one of 8 children, operated the hardware in conjunction with his father until Ben died in 1920. Wren then operated it by himself until his oldest son Jack Blake Fletcher, Sr. returned from Naval Duty in World War II. Wren stayed active in the hardware with his son Jack, until a short time prior to his death in 1974. Jack ran the hardware until both his and his wife Margaret Ann (Mitchell) Fletcher's, untimely death in a car accident in September 1984. The Fletcher Hardware Store has continued to operate with the Fletcher's still involved for 100 years in the same building. In 1985, Bill and Linda Roedenbeck bought interest in the hardware and now manage it along with the Fletcher's.

The Fletcher Family has many descendants still living in Adair County and the nearby area.

Jim Proctor

Joe settled in Adair County after meeting a beautiful Cherokee lady named Rachel Proctor at the Stilwell Cafe. They married and began a jewelry store downtown in the early 1960's, but later bought a farm and became full time ranchers. Joe had several acres of strawberries during the 1970's along with his father-in-law Jim Proctor on top of Killer Mountain in southern Adair County.

Jim Proctor, a full blood Cherokee, lived and raised his 13 children in the Greasy community of Adair County as a full time farmer on Indian allotment land.

Jim was a direct descendent of Nancy Ward the "Beloved Woman of the Cherokees." Jim's ancestry of grandparents were Joseph "Chewey" Proctor, Nancy Bearpaw, Tahnoowee, Ellis Sanders Harlan, Nancy Barnett, Takahagi, and Charlotte Downing all making the journey from Georgia on the "Trail of Tears" in the 1830's. They all began a new life in Indian Territory, which is known today as Oklahoma.

Rachel, the eldest daughter of Jim Proctor, was also a full blood Cherokee born and raised in Adair County. Both sets of her grandparents (Paternal - Joe Proctor and Lucy Fogg; Maternal - Spencer Gonzallis and Sarah Feathers) were registered on the original Dawes Enrollment Act of the early 1900's. Rachel finished her Bachelor's degree in sociology after marrying Joe, making her the first in her family's history to achieve a college degree. She was one of the first women to ever be appointed to the Cherokee Nation Tribal Council in the late 1970's. She worked with the Bureau of Indian Affairs and Cherokee Nation for decades and left behind a legacy of helping her people until her death in 1989.

Joe and Rachel raised two children, Larry Lawrence and Brenda Lawrence Partain (1978 Strawberry Festival Rodeo Sweetheart & 1983 Strawberry Festival Queen), that still reside in Stilwell today along with their children: Adriana, Zachary, and William Carson; Mandy, Melody, Magen, Lauren and Sydney Lawrence.

The Lawrence Family have been attending or have been involved every year in a Strawberry Festival since Joe happened to stop and have a cup of coffee while passing through Stilwell and fell in love with a beautiful Indian lady.

Crozier's Enter Oklahoma

Early Statehood

With the hopes and dreams for a good life in a new state

Oliver "Ol" Charles Crozier and Mary Eliza Blakemore made a home in the Oak Grove Community after their marriage on January 13, 1915, in Dutch

Oliver Charles, born September 26, 1888, was the son of Charles Oliver Crozier and Mary Elizabeth Chandler and the Grandson of Charles Barton Crozier and Catherine Oliver Crozier. Union Soldiers near Cane Hill, AR, hanged Charles Barton Crozier for being a Rebel sympathizer on November 13, 1864, at the age of 65 years and 6 months.

Mary Eliza, born October 21, 1890, was the daughter of Will W. Blakemore and Mary L. Johnston in Mangum, TX, now Mangum, OK in Greer County.

She lived 102 years and 5 months. "Ol" and Mary were married almost 47 years when he died on September 21, 1961.

Five children were born to "Ol" and Mary. Every one of them made their home and raised their families in Adair County, with the exception of Billie

Marie who died at 2 years of age.

Margurite Oleta married James Garrison and they owned a dairy farm in the Horn Community west of Stilwell. Children: Joe James, Billie Jack, and Jerry Lynn. Mary Lou Irene married Ferel O. Chandler, a farmer/rancher and lived in the Whitmire Community north of Stilwell. Children: Janice Marie Vaughan, Carolyn Sue Morrison, Sammy Ferel, and Sandra Faye Barnes. <u>Betty Jo</u> married Jack Starr and owned a ranch south of Stilwell in the Zion Community. Children: Jacquline Ruth Staiger and Michael Joe. Charles Blakemore married Pauline Chambers and owns a cattle farm in Pilgrim Rest Community west of Stilwell and taught elementary school at Horn, one of the last two-room schools in Adair County. Children: Charles Wayne, Robert Lewis, and Paula Jean McGarrah.

"Ol" and Mary were farmers raising wheat, oats, corn, beans, tomatoes, and apples. The only jobs "Ol" worked off the farm were when he plowed with a team to dig the basement of the U.S. Post Office in Stilwell, and he drove a team of two big horses and one mule to grade Oklahoma Highway 51 when it crossed Caney Creek and ended at Norman Isaacs Station. Later, he was also the first to grade the "new" 51 Highway when it was extended from Caney Creek to its present location that intersects U.S. 59, north of Stilwell.

Adair County, Oklahoma

THE HOME OF THE STRAWBERRY CAPITAL OF THE WORLD

It was a progressive tribe that was transported from the east, to the west by the United States Government, when the mighty Cherokees were brought into what is now the State of Oklahoma.

After being settled in their new lands they did not give way to the many disappointments which they experienced from the time they were required to leave their homes in the states of Georgia, Alabama, Tennessee and the Carolinas until they finally reached what soon became their "New Happy

At first, it is reasonably easy to imagine how they resented their re-Hunting Ground." moval, but after they became reconciled they began to realize what a splendid country they had become owners of.

They immediately began to set up shop and with strong determination they cleared their lands and began producing various farm products to insure themselves a living. This they did without financial help from any

Having progressed successfully, insofar as getting settled was consource whatsoever. cerned, they began to build schools, and by the end of 1843 they had established 18 public schools. From this modest beginning the number had increased to 120 before their tribal government was discontinued.

Many of these schools were located in what is now Adair County, Oklahoma, and which was then Flint District, Cherokee Nation, Indian

Besides the public schools, the first Mission Schools that were estab-Territory. lished in what is now Oklahoma was in that portion now known as Adair County. A Presbyterian Mission which was located near Lyons, about eight miles south of Stilwell, and the Baptist Mission, about four miles north

of Westville, Oklahoma on highway 59. Adair County is the most historical section of this area. Here was located the first printing press ever to be established in what is now Oklahoma; the first Masonic Lodge ever chartered in Oklahoma; the first general conference of the Methodist church ever held in Oklahoma and the first and only Baptist Indian Association. The "The End of the Trail of Tears" over which was transported the Cherokees, is marked as being east of Westville

Stilwell, the county seat of Adair county, nestled among the foothills in Adair county. of the great Ozarks with its hundreds of sparkling springs, is justly recognized as the "Strawberry Capital of the World."

Tourists and travelers proclaim Adair county to be the most beautiful spot in Oklahoma. Here the sweet aroma of dogwood and redbud permeates the atmosphere.



Joe Carson lived and operated a livery stable in Stilwell. He had moved west from Georgia with his wife Eliza in 1885 They resettled in Evansville Arkansas and then moved to Stilwell, located in the IndianTerritory, Flint District of the Cherokee Nation, after the turn of the century. Joe and Eliza had a son, Horace, who lived in Stilwell with his wife Viola until their deaths in 1953. Most of their children chose to live and work in Stilwell with one grandson still living and working in Stilwell. Other grandchildren are retired after illustrious careers in banking, agriculture, teaching and US Government service. The only grandson of Horace and Viola not retired is Tom J. Carson Tom has the only centennial ranch in Adair County; the ownership is traced through his mother, an original enrollee in the Cherokee Nation. Horace and Viola have several great grand children that chose to live and work in Stilwell. In addition to working in banking, teaching, agriculture and U.S. government servic (as a U.S. Representative) this generation added law and finance. The great-great grandchildren generation already has teachers teaching in local schools and many attending college.

The Kiwanis Club has been instrumental in promoting Stilwell. Tom J. Carson is a charter member of the Club formed in 1946. There are three Carson members currently serving in the Club as other Carson family members have served in the past. Congratulations to all the past and present Kiwanis members for making the annual Strawberry Festival such a rousing success!

The Carson family salutes other Centennial Families, Stilwell and Adair County. We are looking forward to the next century!

In the early 1900s, J.R. Reed started a business located on the property where the Bank of Commerce is now located, selling, according to the sign on the windows, "Dry Goods, Groceries, and Ladies' and Gents Shoes". Others in the business with him were his son, Lowery M. Reed and his wife, Sarah, and B.F. (Fay) Reed and his wife, Lillus.

Mr. J.R. Reed was a successful and prosperous businessman and pioneer in the early days of Stilwell. He was president of the First National Bank of Stilwell, chartered in 1911

About 1932 Lowery M. Reed, C.J. Carson and R.L. Reese bought the Rogers Hardware & Furniture Company from W.M. Rogers. It was located across the street from the J.R. Reed business. They renamed the store Reed-Carson Hardware & Furniture Company and sold groceries, furniture, and John Deere farm equipment. The John Deere farm equipment was shipped from St. Louis, and some were shipped in "pool cars" with Lewis Brothers in Fayetteville, Arkansas.

After Lowery's death in 1934 until 1946 Sarah Reed, C.J. Carson, and B.F. Reed were partners in the business. Slogans for the hardware store were "Buy your hardware from a Hardware Store — the House of Quality Merchandise for Farm & Home" and "Quality remains long after the price is forgotten". Working in the business with Sarah Reed were B.F. and Lillus Reed, parents of Emma Dean Panter.

After returning from service in 1946 Quentin M. and Welch E. (Gene) Reed bought C.J. Carson's part of the business. The name was changed to Reed's Hardware & Furniture Company with Sarah Reed Bragg and her two sons as partners. After Sarah's death, Quentin Reed, Jr. became a partner.

Today Reed's Hardware is a franchised Servistar Dealer, selling plumbing, electrical supplies, hardware, paint, and floor covering.

None of the success that Reed's Hardware has enjoyed in the past would have been possible without the help and support of B.F. Reed, Ross Reed, and Leonard Poor.

The following have also worked for Reed's Hardware at different times: Carl Reed (B.F.'s brother), Naomi (Sis) Reed, Doris Jo Reed, Austin Johnson, Dollie Sharp, Pauline Ray, and Jack Eubanks.

HISTORY OF THE STILWELL STRAWBERRY FESTIVAL

Early in the year of 1948 the Kiwanis Club of Stilwell, in an effort to stimulate interest in what was considered one of the major economic resources of Adair county, set up an organization for the promotion of an Annual Strawberry Festival. With the assistance of the Chamber of Commerce, Strawberry Growers association, Stilwell school system, the Stilwell Canning Company, and practically every business organization in Stilwell, the First Annual Strawberry Festival was held on May 10, 1948.

With the assistance of radio stations and newspapers of the area, news of the clebration spread, and the First Annual Strawberry Festival saw the serving of 8,000 free portions of strawberries and ice cream. Neighboring high school and college bands contributed to the program.

The second Annual Strawberry Festival was an expansion of the first, and that year the Oklahoma Legislature designated by resolution passed, approved, signed by the governor and sent to the Congress of the United States, Stilwell and Adair County as the Strawberry Capital of the World.

At the Second Annual Strawberry Festival 12,000 free servings of ice cream and

than 600 acres.

The 1950 Third Annual Strawberry Festival saw greater expansion of the program, acreage increased to more than 1,800 acres of production; the Stilwell Canning Company began planning construction of a \$500,000 cold storage and increased facilities for processing of strawberries, and many more added attractions.

The 1951 Fourth Annual Strawberry Festival was held on May 26, and was the largest celebration to date, and 18,300 servings of ice cream topped with good delicious Adair County Strawberries were given to those present. The acreage was even larger than before. The Stilwell Canning Company's new freezing and cold storage plant was in operation.

In 1952 the Fifth Annual Strawberry Festival was the most successful to date.

In 1952 the Fifth Annual Strawberry Festival was the most successful to date, each year the festival growing to be a larger affair.

The most beautiful and luscious berries in years were produced during 1953, and although there was a short crop, the Sixth Festival parade was better than ever before, and again there were 20,000 free servings of strawberries and ice cream.

Last year, 1954, drouth hit the Stilwell area, but there were plenty of strawberries and 20,000 servings of ice cream topped with strawberries were given out free.

Each year the festival has grown to larger proportions than the year before. Be here on May 21, 1955 for the largest festival yet!

CHURCHES

The churches of Stilwell have kept in stride with the growth of Stilwell as a whole. Before 1900 there were only two churches in Stilwell, the Methodist and the Baptist. Since that time seven others have been established, and all remain at this time except the Presbyterian Church.

Currently the First Baptist Church is the largest. Having started in 1897 with bu 28 charter members, it now has a membership of 525. In 1939 they completed their new church building. At the present time the average Sunday School attendance in 180. Last year they donated \$10,000 to church work, \$2,000 of which was sent to the foreign fields for missionary work. Henry Wall has served as minister for six years.

The Methodist church is the oldest church in Stilwell, having been established several years before 1900. They have just completed extensive repairs and reduced accoration to their building. The average church attendance is 85-90. Mr. Gasking their minister, reports that interest is high in the work of the church at this time.

The Christian church began in 1905 with twenty charter members and now has a membership of 300 and the average church attendance is 165. Last year \$13,00 was the amount donated and extensive remodeling and repair work was done of the church building. No mention of the Christian Church would be complete without mention of the late E. R. Hall who served as minister of the Church for twenty year and exerted a great influence in Stilwell for Christ and His Church. Jack Steele the present minister.

The Church of Christ was organized seven years ago with a membership thirty-five. The church attendance at the present time is one hundred. They ha just finished the addition of several classrooms. Bro. H. Turney is their minist

The Holiness Church was established by Ben Hill and the exact date could not obtained. Their minister at the present time is Bill Padgett. The average attendar at this time is thirty. Their minister if Mr. Geithly of Muldrow.

The Central Baptist Church was founded some twenty years ago. Bro. Bill Isa is their minister and they have an average attendance of 60 to 65. Mr. Isaac preach on the first Sunday of each month and three of their deacons preach the remain Lord's days of each month.

In the latter part of 1951, Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Morris of Stilwell began work in establishment of a Pentecostal Holiness Church. They report that the averattendance is 55 to 60.

We might sum it up by making this observation, that in both morning evening services, well over one-third of the people in Stilwell attend Church Sunday School.

Arthur E. Stilwell, for whom the City of Stilwell was named, conceived the Kansas City Southern Lines when he saw the advantages of a short railroad line between Kansas City, Mo., and the Gulf of Mexico. He was born in Rochester, N.Y., in 1859 and died Sept. 26, 1928 at his home in New York City. He was in the insurance business in Kansas City when he became interested in railroading. His grandfather, Hamblin Stilwell, was one of the founders of the New York Central Railroad.







Festival Crowd Sets record-1971

Stilwell was jammed with the largest crowd in the 23-year history of the Strawberry Festival in 1970. Unofficial estimates placed the crowd at about 15,000.

The Stilwell Kiwanis Club-sponsored Festival had something for everyone.

The program from the platform included music by Leon McAuliffe and his Western Band, the Muskogee Manual Training High School Band, and the Stilwell High School Girls Ensemble.

The day was climaxed by the serving of 10,000 cups of strawberries and ice cream. A few failed to get their share, and Kiwanians have ordered more ice cream this year.
