Welcome to Uley Trees & Meadows

We want to improve nature around Uley, and we'd like you to join us!

Whether you're young or old, have a few acres or a small back garden, if you're keen on doing more for nature, we would love it if you supported us! No commitment necessary, anything you can do would be hugely appreciated. We'll give you more details of how you can get involved in the coming months, but this is to tell you that we're planning.

It all began in 2023 when David Lungley arranged for children from Uley School to plant young trees, that Gloucestershire County Council provided, in a field on the Rymer's farm. One thing led to another, and soon we had planted up 3 sites, and had a willing team of villagers co-ordinating it all, led by Chris Shaw.

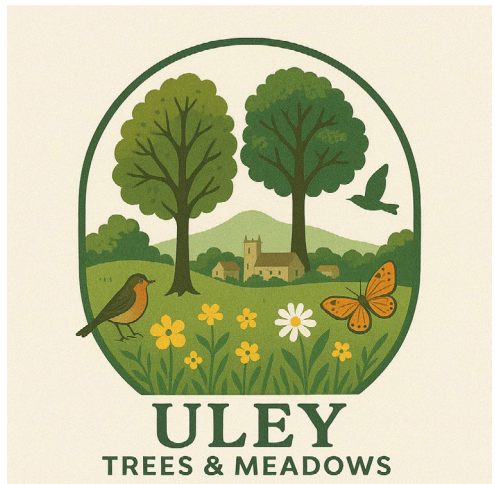
In 2024, an ecologist from Glorious Cotswold Grasslands helped to identify 2 further areas - the far bank on Millennium Green (with the support of the Millennium Green Committee), and Uley Common at the very top of Crawley Hill, both of which we've been working on to let the wildflowers thrive, and the insects, bees and butterflies flourish.

And then in 2025, we formally established ourselves as Uley Trees & Meadows, as an independent project within Coaley & Uley Climate Action Network, who provide our website (<https://cucan.org.uk/>), insurance and accounting.

So now we're here, with over 30 members in a WhatsApp group, an active Committee, and a plan of action that will involve YOU! There'll be events to attend, where you can help restore nature, and lots of ideas on things you can do in your garden to make it more wildlife-friendly.

We've got the backing of the Parish Council, and we can manage what gets done, but we need the village to get involved to help increase bio-diversity. You'll see a bit more in Uley Friends if you're on Facebook, and there'll be a window display in the shop this month. Keep a look out for further updates in next month's Village News!

A Gentle Reminder About Dog Control in Uley

Last month, a Uley resident had a worrying experience on the Bury after being approached by a dog that appeared overly excited and difficult for its owners to control. Although no one was hurt, the incident has prompted a friendly reminder about keeping dogs safely under control when out and about in the village.

Uley's lanes, footpaths and green spaces are enjoyed by everyone, from dog walkers and families to cyclists and visitors, and a little extra care helps ensure they remain welcoming for all.

What Owners Need to Know

UK law requires dogs to be **kept under control in public places**. A dog can be considered "dangerously out of control" if it makes someone

feel threatened, even if there is no physical contact. Some areas also have local rules requiring dogs to be kept on leads.

Recent updates to livestock protection laws also mean stronger penalties if dogs chase or disturb farm animals, highlighting the importance of responsible handling in rural areas like ours.

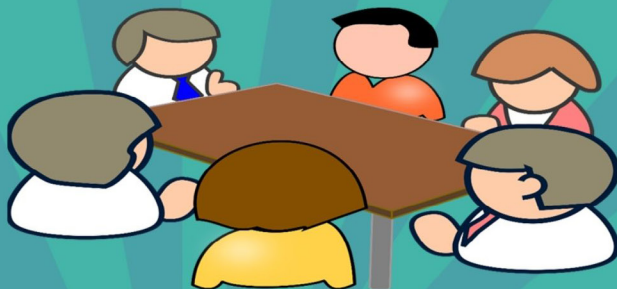
Looking After Each Other

Most dog owners in Uley are thoughtful and considerate, and a few simple steps, such as using a lead when needed, ensuring good recall, and being mindful of others' comfort, go a long way in keeping our village safe and friendly for everyone.

Defibrillators

The parish council has ordered two new defibrillators to replace the ones installed ten years ago. Currently there is only ONE in the village - at the Playing Field. The one outside the Village Hall is NOT working. The two new ones will be installed in the next two weeks.

From the Churchwardens

It was wonderful to see our churches filled to brim at our Christmas Services, welcoming people in from the cold into candlelit spaces, all ready to celebrate. For the statistics enthusiasts amongst you, the 'headcount' totalled 461 (261 at Uley, 72 at Nympsfield and 128 at Owlpen); over-excited children, new born babies (and perhaps some overwhelmed parents!), teenagers, couples preparing for marriage, and more - all escaping the hustle and bustle of preparations such as gift buying and food planning, as well as fitting in other seasonal events. A huge thanks to all who helped in running these services, and particularly to Prue and her helpers preparing the wonderful Christingles. A healthy £349.30 was raised for the Children's Society – thank you all for your generosity.

Gathering is important and not just at Christmas, so do look for ways you can 'join us' this year, perhaps our 'Second Sunday' less formal services as mentioned by Juliet, or our 'Monday Mingle' at St Giles – a chance for people of all ages (babies/toddlers up to 'senior citizens') to come and enjoy coffee and cake, chat, or (for the younger element!) roll around/play on the carpeted floor. Thanks to the ongoing activities of the Friends of St

Giles we have an up-coming quiz for those who love to work as a team and stretch their memories.

On a personal note, I (Nikki) have been greatly touched at the way the Brimscombe and Minchinhampton communities have gathered in the face of the devastating house fire on Boxing Day, with spaces open at The Sanctuary at Brimscombe Mill and coordinated efforts by the local clergy to offer space for people to gather and grieve. It made me reflect that spaces that are 'set apart' are valuable and very much worth investing in for when we need them.

So an ask! Church Letter

The Pete Seeger song written in 1959 has been going round and round in my head these last few days. To everything, turn, turn, turn....

Most of the words of this song are taken directly from the book of Ecclesiastes, traditionally ascribed to King Solomon, a piece of Scripture that both attests to the cyclical nature of the seasons and the realities of human experience. There is a wisdom in knowing the season that we are in and living accordingly.

February is getting towards the end of winter and the time for cutting back and laying hedges, planting trees, and making space for new growth. This is also a time when we may be grateful for the warmth of a wood-burning stove and we may be enjoying various winter crafts. I love that at this time of year the trees can be seen in all their naked glory, the views are clearer and even the grass is lent some definition by the frost.

Many of us will have a view on the current season that we are in globally, nationally and perhaps in our own families and community. We may not agree with one another, which is perhaps a defining characteristic of this season. But I know for many it feels a dark and fearful time.

Which brings me back to the song, Turn Turn Turn. The Christian tradition speaks to the realities of our human condition and invites us to look at the signs of the times and to keep turning and re-turning to Christ, to learn and be healed and to become perhaps a little freer. The image of wood being turned, again and again and again, eventually to reveal something beautiful and/or useful resonates with my experience of the Christian spiritual life. In practical terms, this happens in prayer, returning to a place of trust, hope and love. Daring to put ourselves in the hands of Jesus the Master Carpenter.

On Ash Wednesday, which is 18th February this year, everyone is invited to gather at Midday in St Giles Church, to be marked with an ash cross as a reminder of our mortality and the love of Christ in which we are held. During Lent we are invited to return to the Lord, to respond to the invitation to fast and pray, pruning back inclinations that are neither healthy nor life-giving; making space for new growth.

*To everything (turn turn turn) there is a season,
and a time to every purpose under the heaven:*

*A time to be born, and a time to die;
a time to plant,
and a time to pluck up that which is
planted;
A time to kill, and a time to heal; a
time to break down, and a time to
build up;
A time to weep, and a time to laugh;
a time to mourn, and a time to
dance;
A time to cast away stones, and a
time to gather stones together;
A time to embrace, and a time to
refrain from embracing;
A time to get, and a time to lose;
a time to keep, and a time to cast
away;
A time to rend, and a time to sew; a
time to keep silence, and a time to
speak;
A time to love, and a time to hate; a
time of war, and a time of peace.
(I swear its not too late).*

The next Second Sunday Special Service is at 10am at St Giles on 8th February when we will explore the theme of Winter Wood with local people who work with wood, there will be some displays, including photography from the late, and much loved Elliot Gilfoyle and wood that was turned by his brother Ed. It will be good to gather as a worshipping community (wherever we are on the journey) and live this season together.

To everything turn, turn, turn.....

Garden Notes

Whether you chose to curl up with a good book or got out mulching and hedge cutting over winter - beneath the soil, our gardens were definitely not asleep. Plants that went in during autumn have slowly been developing their root systems giving them a great start in Spring. Most excitingly are the bulbs thrusting up to give their early spring cheer. A particular favourite is the diminutive Iris Reticulata group. Following on from the snowdrops these tiny bulbs are delightful in pots to better admire their intricate beauty at eye level. Plant in the garden after flowering.

To avoid damage to vulnerable young growth, now is the time to get stuck into pruning. I could fill the whole newsletter but here's a few ideas to get you started!

Clematis

A guide to wrapping your head around their pruning groups. Label your clematis with name and pruning group!

Group 1 - These flower in winter/early Spring (Montana/Alpina/Armandii) no pruning required or tidy up immediately after flowering as they flower on old wood.

Group 2 - Large flowered varieties flowering mid summer, light prune Feb/ March. Prune above a bud to create a framework on its support and tie in.

Group 3 - Flower in late summer, these can be hard pruned in Feb/March to about knee height, above a bud. Faced with a mountain of last years growth can be daunting, hack off top growth first so you can see what you're doing.

Wisteria

Prune twice a year for best flowering results. Winter prune in February, shortening spurs back to 3 or 4 buds, easily done with leaves off and framework nicely visible. Summer prune, July/August. Prune hard the long whippy growth to 6"(15cm) leaving any long growth needed for framework.

Buddleja

There are many different and beautiful varieties of buddleja. B. davidii (most common) flowering July/Aug, are pruned late Feb/March to a 30-60cm frame, cutting just above an outward facing bud. B. alternifolia and B. globosa flower late spring/early summer and flower on old wood (last years growth) so prune right after flowering.

Cornus (Dogwood)

Prune stems to ground level in Feb/March for bright new stems next winter. This also gives you free plant supports!

Deciduous Grasses

Cut to ground level

Hellebores

If you haven't already cut leaves off (if blighted with blackspot), now is the time to reveal the emerging flowers (assuming the mice have left any.)

Sedums

Remove old stems now to avoid damage to delicate new growth.

I hope you all watched the marvellous Wild London which I thought illustrated so well how we can connect our pockets of green space to help our wildlife whether its London or Uley - Lets show them how!

Starting at Perrotts Brook we take the Monarch's Way following the Churn into the Cirencester Abbey Grounds then take in some historic features before returning.

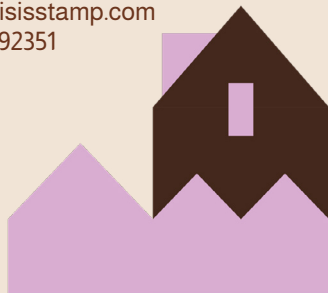
Distance: 7.5 miles | Duration: 3.5 hours

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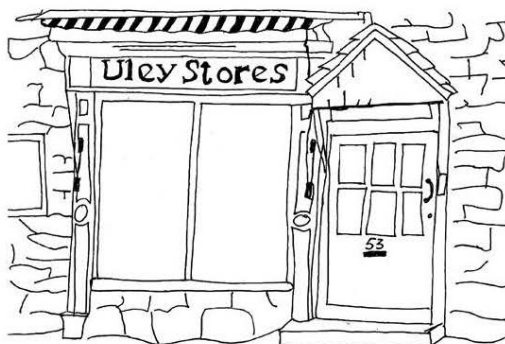

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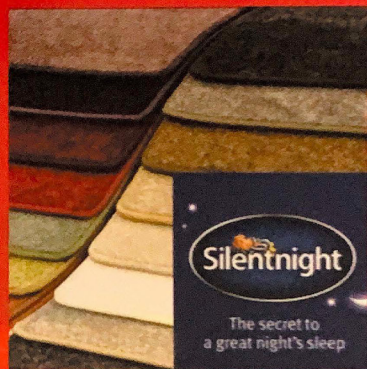
