Starting in 2026, Stroud District Council will be providing grants of up to £2,000 to support arts & culture activities in the Stroud district. The grants will focus on supporting future generations. Applications will close on 25 September 2026, with the first-round deadline of 2 March 2026.

You may already have heard about the work of local councillor Gil Thomas who aims to provide primary school children with litter pickers which they can use to keep the area around their school clean. The Conservation area covers a large part of Uley, which is recognised for its special architectural and historic character. Living in such a beautiful village brings with it a shared


responsibility to help preserve its unique charm for future generations. We would gently remind residents that certain works to properties may require planning permission or additional consent, even where this might not normally be the case elsewhere. This helps ensure that changes are in keeping with the character of Uley and protect the features that make our village so special. The Community Design statement, which is on the parish website (the shop has a hard copy) is a useful source of information and has a map of the Conservation Area. This document is referred to by the planning authority when considering an application.

You may need planning permission or consent for:

- Replacing windows or doors (particularly changing materials or style)
- Alterations to roofs, including changing tiles or adding roof lights
- Painting or rendering stonework, or altering exterior finishes
- Extensions, porches, or outbuildings
- Installing solar panels (especially on street-facing roofs)
- Demolishing walls, gates, fences, or chimneys

- Removing or significantly altering trees or hedges
- Installing satellite dishes in visible locations
- Adding hard standing, driveways, or boundary treatments

If you are considering any changes to your property, it is always advisable to check first with the local planning authority to ensure the correct permissions are in place. A quick enquiry can help avoid difficulties later and supports our shared aim of protecting Uley's distinctive character. Any of your parish councillors is also able to help and offer advice.

From the Churchwardens

Many of you will be aware of the conservation work being undertaken around the parish by the 'Uley Trees and Meadows' group. We are really pleased about the suggestion that this group should work with the PCC to extend its conservation 'acreage' by managing an area of the 'old' churchyard at St Giles to encourage wild flower and insect diversity. This will build on the work already undertaken by Robin Coates and his son in the churchyard in not cutting the grass around clumps of wild flowers in the spring until they die back. Robin has also been involved over the past 2 or 3 years in managing the mowing of, and the seeding of appropriate wild flowers in, 'Pauline's eco-patch' – the conservation area against the footpath wall to the NW of the church initiated a few years ago by Pauline Thomas.

The new area proposed is the comparatively narrow stretch extending westwards between the footpath wall/fence and the back gardens of the properties on the Street.

The proposed management regime is very simple. The grass will be cut just twice a year – in early spring (March) and early autumn (September), with the cuttings raked into one or more piles at the edges of the area. This will encourage wild flowers to develop and thrive. If the cuttings are left in situ, they rot down and enrich the soil fertility and the resultant encouragement of strong growth in the grass smothers the growth of the flower

species, which do not require such fertile conditions. An incidental benefit of removing the cuttings is that the pile of decaying vegetation becomes a habitat for decay insects and fungi, further increasing the biodiversity.

It is envisaged that the area should be delineated by a line of logs along the boundary with the remainder of the churchyard, with a sign indicating "Area managed for Biodiversity". A mown path down the length of the area will facilitate access for anyone wishing to visit the gravestones.

The 'Pauline Thomas eco-patch' (which is already marked off with a square of logs) will continue to be managed in the same manner as outlined above



Work Parties

1230pm, on the Millennium Green bank. It's not only enjoyable, but also a great opportunity to meet new people, or old friends, in the village.

Wildlife-friendly gardening

We'd like to build a community of wildlife-friendly gardeners. You'll see in the shop window, and on Facebook (Uley Friends), a map of where we are currently managing the land to let wildlife thrive. Wouldn't it be wonderful if we could do the same in our own back gardens, to connect the village with the land around us, with corridors along which nature can thrive.

We've got a small quiz below, to see if you're a wildlife-friendly gardener. If you are, can you email on uleytreesandmeadows@outlook.com, so we know where our wildlife-friendly gardens are, and create a community to share ideas and knowledge, and build a bigger corridor for nature. Otherwise, maybe think about doing some of the activities below this Spring or Summer to help nature into your garden.

QUIZ: Are you a wildlife-friendly gardener?

Q1 - Is there a part of your garden in which you actively try to encourage wildlife to thrive? (This could be anything from a few square metres, to the entire garden, however large or small.)

Q2 - Do you try to limit how much weed killer or pesticide you use in the garden?

Q3 - How many of the following do you do?

- Mow the lawn less frequently, and/or on a higher setting
- Do anything to encourage pollinators
- Have a pond
- Regularly leave food out for birds
- Delay cutting back plants until after they have gone to seed
- Have a compost heap
- Improve the condition of your soil, or generally adopt organic approaches
- Grow wildflowers in part of the garden
- Encourage hedgehogs/small mammals
- Leave deadwood in piles to provide shelter and food for insects

If you've answered Yes to 1 and 2, and are doing 4 or more of the 10 activities at 3, then you're a wildlife-friendly gardener! Please contact us as above, so we can start to build a community of gardeners helping wildlife. Thankyou!

Wednesday 11th March at 10:00 am Frampton Mansell, Oakridge and The Holy Brook

A Springtime stroll through pastures, woods and Cotswold villages.

Distance: 5.5 miles | **Duration:** 3 hours
Difficulty: Unsurfaced paths, basic fitness
Start: The Crown Inn, Frampton Mansell. Please drive through the area next to the pub entrance to reach a larger parking place at the rear.

Friday 27th March at 10:00 am Avening: Gatcombe View and Secluded Valley

A circular walk across varied landscapes giving glorious views of the Gatcombe Estate and providing the peace of a hidden valley.

Distance: 7.5 miles | **Duration:** 4.5 hours
Difficulty: May be steep slopes, moderate fitness | **Start:** Bell Inn, Avening. Please park considerately nearby.

Church Letter

Well, we can build a well! Well, not literally.

There is a small charity called WellBoring that works very locally to provide clean water for school communities in Africa, mostly Kenya and more recently Malawi. If, as a village, we can give £3750 between us, we can provide clean water for Kachikho School in Nkhotakota, Malawi. Currently the school and local community get their water from a swamp and as a result, suffer with cholera. 384 children, 6 staff at the school will benefit along with others in the local community.

Talking with people in Uley, I've discovered enthusiasm about making a difference in this way and that this isn't the first well that the village has helped to build. There is a history of building wells in Sierra Leone. Interestingly, WellBoring is currently rehabilitating 20 wells in Pujehun, Sierra Leone – I wonder if anyone knows whether that's where the Uley wells are?

There's so much need in the world, sometimes we can experience the endless possibilities for giving and supporting good causes as something that leaves us feeling helpless and overwhelmed at best, and hard-hearted and indifferent at worst.

So, why this? Why now? Why together? Well...

The Second Sunday Services at St Giles each month are a bit Special. We try to engage more intentionally with village life beyond the worshipping community. Sunday March 8th is in the church season of Lent, where traditionally we are encouraged to take little steps away from our natural inclinations of self-sufficiency and self-centredness. We are encouraged to pray a bit more, to give a bit more and to put a check on our appetites – a bit of an annual re-set. These disciplines are not practiced as an end in themselves, but in the hope of living a little closer to God, all God's creatures, including oneself.

The scripture for 8th March is about Jesus' encounter with a woman coming to collect water from a well in the heat of the day and I was reminded of the charity WellBoring which my family have recently supported to build a well in Malawi. It occurred to me that this is something that the village could do together, with the aim of raising the money by Easter, which this year falls on Sunday 5th April. This doesn't really allow enough time for much in the way of fundraising and so I propose that we see this more as an opportunity to simply put our hands in our pockets and to give and enjoy the connection we will form with Kachikho School community. Uley CofE Primary School will get to see a bit of life in Malawi and discover the difference that clean water makes.



Giving is incredibly good for us. It's what we are made to do. And when we do it together, we can change the world a little bit for the better.

Now, that really is a refreshing thought – Happy Lent!

Uley WI Diary – February 2026

On Wednesday 11th February a ‘Special Meeting’ of Uley WI members was held in Uley Village Hall to discuss and vote on the future of the group. For some time there has been discussion about the pros and cons of remaining under the WI umbrella organisations, which include both a Gloucestershire Federation (GFWI) and the National body.

We appreciate the WI has benefitted women here and all over the country for a long time. Indeed, Uley WI has existed for 86 years and has facilitated with lots of friendships, skills and sharing of interests. So, calling time on what has been and remains a vibrant, successful group may seem surprising. However, we felt it important to plan a more sustainable future for this community-based women’s group and to involve a more diverse cross-section of women if possible.

The meeting was attended by two representatives from the GFWI. Following their input and discussion by members, the vote was taken and the result announced immediately. 82% of the 44 members who voted elected to LEAVE WI. So, it closes.

The final meeting as a WI will be held on Wednesday 11th March in the Village Hall as usual. The speaker will be Andrew Mellor talking about a selection of Blue Plaques in Gloucestershire. We will also begin the process of reinventing ourselves as an independent community women’s group. Women from all around Uley are welcome to join us at this meeting. We need a new name for our organisation too, so please send suggestions.

A party to celebrate the achievements of Uley WI will be held in the Village Hall on Wednesday 18th March from 7:30pm. You are welcome to join us, but please let us know by contacting Belinda Williams, the current WI secretary at the email address below.

In next month’s final ‘diary’, there will be details about the new women’s group and how to get involved. We hope you will.

Garden Notes

Officially the first month of Spring, but also a month of contrasts. Wind and warmth, frosts and flowers. Gardeners need to be on their toes! Gardens are awash with cheery daffodils and the hedgerows overflowing with the snowy blossom of early flowering blackthorn (*prunus spinosa*) providing much needed sustenance to early flying insects. An ancient long lived shrubby tree, one could imagine its use with hawthorn to protect the settlement on Uley Bury.

If its mild, you might think to have your first mow with blades set high. Together with edging borders, this can have the pleasingly groomed effect of well polished shoes after the soggy detritus of winter - even if you don't do anything else!

Of course there's plenty you can do given decent conditions...

Lift and divide snowdrops. After flowers have faded, lift a clump and tease apart into small groups replanting at the same depth in their new spaces.

Divide crowded perennials such as hostas and day lilies to rejuvenate and create free plants. Improve soil and feed as you go.

Finish clearing away any remaining dead material in borders to make way for new growth.

Plant summer flowering bulbs in borders or containers. *Lilium Regale* is a scented sensation in either border or container. Be vigilant for the scarlet lily beetle, hand picking them off through the season. For fireworks in your border try *Eremurus* (foxtail lily) - a 4ft vertical accent. Plant in groups in a shallow dip on a mound of horticultural grit with just their tips showing. Other summer bulbs to plant now are gladioli (I mulch mine and they seems happy to return in the cutting garden without lifting). They all enjoy a sunny spot in free draining soil. *Dahlia* tubers are also great to start now. Single varieties are best for pollinators - the 'bishop' series being a great place to start.

Refresh existing plants in your pots and containers by repotting and refreshing the compost, adding in a slow release fertiliser.

Feed hungry roses. A thick circle of rotted manure (keeping clear of the stem) will feed and protect them from weeds and summer drought. A good mulch and quality rose food is also fine.

Mulch! Mulch! Mulch!

Sow Seeds! It's still early, and temperatures are not reliable, but you can get started with certain crops especially if you have a heated propagator or windowsill. Of course the vexing issue can be that your window sills fill up with germinated seeds but it's still too cold to plant them out! For annuals try cosmos, marigolds (my fav is tagetes 'cinnabar') and sunflowers. For veg - chillies, tomatoes and early salad crops are good.

As a constant reminder, please clean your bird feeders and and water dishes.

Whether you take it as a positive or a negative - the clocks go forward on Sunday 29th March. Blame Benjamin Franklin who proposed daylight saving in 1784 to save on candles! Europe didn't follow suit until 1916.

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

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
