### From the Churchwardens

The leaves are turning and we've been enjoying some beautiful days. Last weekend we hosted walkers on the 'historic churches' walk as part of the Dursley Walking Festival. Around 15 walkers enjoyed refreshments at St Giles and St Bartholemew's, and David Thomas gave them brief talks about the history of each of the churches pointing out some of the features of interest.

Hospitality continued over the next couple of days with our Harvest service at St Bartholemew's which began with breakfast in the Nympsfield village hall before moving over to the church for a wonderful all-age celebratory service. Offerings of food, both fresh and preserved, were gratefully received and displayed on the altar, then after the service were donated to the Stroud District foodbank. It was great to see a good turnout of people, both familiar and new.

And then on Monday we hosted the first of our coffee mornings at St Giles, which was well attended. The plan is to meet weekly from 10-12, with time for chat, play, and a short reflection. All 'ages and stages' are welcome, but particularly newcomers to the village and others who are feeling isolated or lonely. Please do drop in one week if you are available.

Turning our thoughts towards November, we are preparing for our Remembrance services. We'll be marking this day with services in both Nympsfield and Uley.

At Nympsfield there will be the usual service at the wayside cross, while at St Giles we'll gather for refreshments before the service of remembrance and then move outdoors for llam to observe the 2 minutes silence around the war memorial. Please do consider joining us. Note that there will not be a communion service in the parish, though there will be one at St James in Dursley at 10am. The usual parade of uniformed services, including scouts and guided units will take place in Dursley in the afternoon worth a visit, but also worth bearing in mind if you're planning to travel through Dursley around then!



## **Church Letter**

Dear Friends,

The poem To Autumn by John Keats begins, "Season of mists and mellow fruitfulness.

Close bosom-friend of the maturing sun; Time is marching and how many people have said to you already, "it's only (...?) days to Christmas... where has the time gone!?"

Sometimes of course we can be in such a hurry that we miss the things around us that matter. Keats makes the point beautifully in his poem, as we ponder the bounty that autumn can bring. The colours this year are spectacular and the amount of fruit on the trees amazing. Our freezers at home are crammed with apples and damsons. Sheila has plans for jams and pies!

We are approaching the end of the year and there will be time to reflect on what 2025 has brought us. I imagine we will be thinking about... Is there going to be peace at last in the Middle East? What of the war in Ukraine? Conflict..is it inevitable? Where are the peacemakers?

Apart from bonfire night, fireworks and Guy Fawkes, November is the time when collectively much of the world remembers those lost in conflicts, particularly in the 20th century. On November 11th and Remembrance Sunday we will pause, reflect and remember those who died in the major wars and other conflicts. We

will speak the names of lost generations and wonder what might have been. We will look at young men and women's faces. Family portraits, of such innocence and promise and wonder what might they have achieved.

My Uncle Ron, Ronald Gordon, is one such portrait. November 20th 1944 is the day we as family remember him. Piloting a Lancaster he, along with 6 of his crew, died over Homberg, Germany and is now buried on the Dutch/ German Border at Reichswald Forest War Cemetery. He smiles out from the portrait on the wall. In his uniform, handsome and proud, he was just 21 years of age. What would he have done with his life? My enduring sadness is that I never got to meet him.

I have spoken of colour and the beauty of autumn. The promise that even in the process of dying and shutting down, as winter approaches, there will be new life. New shoots will appear and the cycle will once again begin, the cycle of life. This is the beautiful and eternal resurrection we are privileged to experience.

The one evocative colour of this season is red. The poppy will be seen everywhere. Worn by many in remembrance The first verse of the poem written by John McRae has the last word:

In Flanders fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row That mark our place; and in the sky The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below. We are the Dead. Short days ago We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow, Loved and were loved, and now we lie In Flanders fields.

## **Garden Notes**

What an autumn! It came early and the intensity of colour revealed in the leaves as the chlorophyll ebbed away was breathtaking. A standout in our garden were the Euonymus Alatus - the winged spindle or aptly named fire bush. It also has distinctive corky, winged stems, so a nice thing to do on an established shrub is to 'lift' its lower side branches to reveal this architecture. There's now a very good compact variety imaginatively named Euonymus Alatus 'Compactus'!

Short, damp days filled with misty mornings, bejewelled cobwebs and a thick carpet of leaves often the herald of the start of winter. But before we retreat to the fireside there is still plenty to do in the garden.

#### **Protect**

You can play russian roulette with your tender plants and succulents but this can end in casualties. Best to move to shelter or wrap. Plant pot feet aren't just decorative, they protect plants roots from becoming waterlogged and rotting and keep pots off freezing surfaces. Bricks serve very well too.

Protect your soil from leaching nutrients over winter by mulching. A free version is raking fallen leaves into borders or veg beds creating a duvet for plants and wildlife alike. To prevent the gales whisking them away a light topping of compost/mulch will hold them in place.

#### **Plant and Sow**

November is the perfect time to plant hardy trees, shrubs, hedging, fruit canes and roses - all will be available bare-root. Cheaper than their potted versions, they'll romp away in Spring having settled in all winter.

Still time to plant garlic and onion sets which did very well this year. Homegrown garlic is so fresh and moist unlike its supermarket counterparts. They like a sunny spot and well drained soil, so amend with compost if you have heavy clay like us. Overrun by pigeons as we are, it's best to protect its tempting tips from being yanked out with light fleece or net. This can be removed once they've rooted. The same applies if you plant into a pot or trough.

This is the optimal time to plant your tulips and other bulbs. A favourite activity knowing that the dividends will repay you for years to come. Keep an eye out for bulb sales locally this month.

If you haven't already, its not too late to sow sweet peas for a head start to huge bunches of these fragrant beauties next year. I favour the Spencer varieties for their amazing length of stem and still with good fragrance. www. somersetsweetpeas.com are my go to..

This year I'm trialling a dwarf broad bean to sow now (or in Spring). This will save on support and hopefully not on quantity. Such a versatile crop.. warm broad bean salad, broad bean hummus come to mind. Just delish.

Finally I'd encourage you to sow two great winter salad crops. Rocket - a bit marmitey for some but I love its peppery flavour and my favourite, lambs lettuce or mache as the french say. Expensive small, bagged salads in the supermarket, you can be harvesting these all winter with successional sowings when you remember. Fresh and organic. Great in containers and out of reach of slugs!

Keep feeding your birds!




