New MCFF Scholarships Awarded for 2025-26

McCook Community Foundation Fund awarded 10 scholarships this spring for the 2025-26 academic year, including the Bernard and Nelda Haag Scholarship, the Barbara Fassler-Neumann Nursing Scholarship and, for the first time, the Frank and Marion Weiland Scholarship.

The Haaq Scholarship was able to provide two \$1,000 scholarships this year. Kendall McKinzie, a 2025 Hayes Center High School graduate, will attend South Dakota State University. Jalen Collicott is a 2025 McCook High School graduate, who will attend McCook Community College. The Haaq Scholarship selection is based upon leadership and selfmotivation through involvement in extracurricular activities in high school; a dedication to agriculture or rural living; and a desire to return to a rural area or Southwest Nebraska

The Barbara Fassler-Neumann Nursing Scholarship provided six scholarships for a total of \$6,000. The scholarship may be awarded to recent high school graduates as well as currently practicing medical professionals who have resided in the area for at least 4 years. One scholarship worth \$1,500 was awarded to Candace Magnuson, a 2024 McCook High School graduate, who attends Fort Hays State University. Four students each received \$1,000 to further their medical education. They are: Addison Knoll, another former MHS graduate, is now studying at the University of Nebraska Medical Center; Natalie Roberts, a 2024 MHS graduate, now attending the University of Nebraska-Lincoln; Logan Barenberg, a 2020 MHS graduate, who attends Creighton University; and Sara Peterson, a



former MHS grad, who will attend UNMC in the fall.

And Leah Spencer, a 2023 MHS graduate, received \$500 to further her education at the University of Nebraska-Omaha.

The Haag Scholarship has been given since 2006, while the Fassler-Neumann Scholarship is now in its ninth year.



MCFF has also started a new Learn and Return Scholarship with a focus on those who intend to return to McCook after their schooling. They will sign an agreement with the MEDC to stay in the community or they will have to pay back their scholarship funds. The first scholarship was given to Lucas Gomez-Wilson, who attends UNL and plans to return to McCook to work as a teacher in the McCook Public Schools.

The George and Lois Tiller family also recently gifted funds to MCFF to form

another scholarship, which will be available in the spring of 2026. Look for more information in the upcoming months.

All of the scholarships are distributed through the McCook Community Foundation Fund, an affiliate of the Nebraska Community Foundation.

Walking Tour & Reality Check Provide Life Lessons for Young People

MCFF is proud to be part of two local projects which directly impact our local young people, one which gets kids up close and personal with their local history and another which gets them up close and personal with their financial choices.

The annual 6th grade Heritage Walking Tour takes kids on a stroll through downtown

McCook to learn about people and stories which have made McCook what it is today.

Coordinated by the McCook Community Foundation Fund and McCook Public Schools, the junior high students visit historic locations and hear from experts at each site. Hopefully by the end of the day, everyone learns something new.

For example, Stacee Smock shared during her history about MNB Bank that five investors pooled their money to start the local bank, among those investors was a Catholic priest.

The tour also included stops at Sen. Ben Nelson's boyhood home, which included personal tidbits about the McCook native and his role in McCook's rich political heritage; the Keystone Business Center, which always elicits "oohs" and "aahs" when they reach the upper stories, either because of the view or because the students are forced to take five flights of stairs; Ember's Bakery, formerly known as Sehnert's, which ends with the always-appreciated donut gift card; and the High Plains Museum, where the kids are in awe of a rotary telephone just to make the rest of us feel old. And new this year was a visit to the McCook Mural on West First Street. Led by artist Karrie Steely of the McCook Creative District, the students learned about the history incorporated into the half-block long painting and also had a chance to express their artistic side with drawings of their own.

Speaking of reality, the McCook eighth-graders took part in "Reality Check," which was started a few years ago with a grant from MCFF.

The goals of "Reality Check" are to give students a glimpse of their future in a fun way, help teens become aware of basic financial planning skills, and clarify the need for young people to examine their attitudes about their futures and career expectations. Participants are given a worksheet with an occupation and a lifestyle status a 25-year-old person may experience. Jobs range from a mechanic, banker to a teacher, along with a salary and corresponding payroll deductions. They may be single, living with a roommate, married, have a stay-at-home spouse or X number of children - all possible situations the students will face in a few years, brought to life through "stations" during the event.

Some stations had flexibility such as transportation, where you could choose to ride a bike or buy a car; or entertainment, where you could decide if you were going to a movie or staying home to play cards. During "Reality Check," there were kids who were downright depressed by the time they visited all the stations because they were broke and they hadn't even bought food for the month yet. But it was a good lesson in priorities, that maybe you don't have to go out to eat each week; a good lesson in economics, that a \$35,000 salary goes quickly if you want a nice car; and a good lesson in responsibilities, that all the education, bills, or even just figuring out what to make for dinner is hard. Being an adult isn't always all it's cracked up to be but it's a good lesson for the young people to learn.

Ultimately, both the McCook Heritage Walking Tour and Reality Checks provided lessons for our young people about themselves, their futures and their communities.
