MARION COUNTY QUORUM COURT MINUTES

April 11, 2023

The Marion County Quorum Court held their monthly meeting beginning at 6 p.m. on April 11, 2023.

Judge Stumph presided over the meeting and all Justices were present. Sheriff Alexander gave the invocation and Jim Kuchenbecker led the Pledge.

All reports were read and accepted. During the OEM report, Director Jim Kuchenbecker announced that his office and the mapping department have moved to the Marion County Command Center (formally the old Sheriff's Office). Justice Nickels commented that he thought that 911 dispatch was also supposed to be moving to that building. During the Grant Report, Karen Carter announced that a report had been filed with the Local Assistance Tribal Consistency Fund (LATC) and that we are expecting an additional \$299,545.34. Also, the Court Security Committee has applied for a \$20,000 grant for window tinting, Kevlar for the courtrooms and emergency ladders for the second floor of the courthouse.

Old Business:

Ordinance 2023-28 – Amending the Personnel Policy – Sponsored by Justices Vancuren, Brigham, White, McCalla, Nickels and Scrima. This ordinance was vetoed by Judge Stumph after the March meeting. Justice Vancuren made the motion to override the veto and Justice McCalla seconded. Justice Brigham stated that the Clerk is responsible for immediately notifying the Quorum Court when an ordinance is vetoed. This did not happen. Judge Stumph stated that during the January Personnel Committee the committee agreed to amend the policy to state that any employee that was rehired after more than a sixty-day separation would be treated as a new employee. If the employee left for medical reasons and the gap in employment is less than six months the employee could be reinstated as if there were no lapse at the discretion of their supervisor. Ordinance 2023-28 amends this policy to state if an employee is rehired after more than a ninety day separation or if an employee is rehired upon return for medical reasons for less than six months they would be treated as new employees. The years of service are cumulative if there is less than the above stated gap in service. This ordinance also does not allow for the discretion of the supervisor. Judge Stumph also pointed out that this ordinance did not go before the Personnel Committee. Justice Vancuren stated that if an employee was terminated for no reason and is rehired, by the current policy the employee would earn less money and lose their benefits, that is why he didn't

want it to be at the discretion of the supervisor. Judge Stumph pointed out that there were employees that were not retained, but they were not terminated. County Attorney John Russo commented that at the end of an elected officials term all employees have to be rehired. He continued by stating that if an employee was paid out their sick and vacation time contrary to the Personnel Policy, these benefits would need to be repaid in order to keep their seniority. If these benefits are not repaid then the employee would be considered a new employee. Russo continued by stating that the policy needs to be fixed. The motion to override the veto passed with Justices Reed and Hutching voting against it.

Justice Vancuren made a motion that Justice White be the Quorum Court Metro representative at the next Metro meeting. Justice McCalla seconded the motion and the motion passed unanimously.

New Business:

A motion to read the ordinances by title only was made by Justice Vancuren and seconded by Justice McCalla. The motion passed unanimously.

Ordinance 23-30 – Clerk's Office – Wage Increase – Sponsored by the Budget Committee. This ordinance would give the Clerk at her discretion to give a wage increase to each of her deputies. Also, it states that the Clerk will reimburse County General out of the Recorder's fund the amount that she has been paid thus far in 2023, and would for the rest of her term have her salary paid completely out of the Recorder's fund. Before a motion to adopt was made, discussion started. Justice Brigham stated that the Personnel committee didn't approve of this ordinance and then it was taken before the Budget committee. She stated is like Mom said no, so I'll ask Dad. She continued that one committee does not trump another committee. Clerk Moffet pointed out that she had been unable to be at the Personnel committee to defend this ordinance and was confused as to which committee the ordinance should go before. Since there was no motion to adopt before the discussion started there was no vote taken. Clerk Moffet stated that she would be bringing this ordinance back in front of the Budget Committee.

Ordinance 23-31 – Collector's Office – Vacated Position – Sponsored by Personnel and Budget Committee. This ordinance allows the Collector to fill the current vacated position from the Collector's Automation fund (3001). The motion to adopt was made by Justice Vancuren and seconded by Justice Reed. During discussion Justice Vancuren clarified that this position was going to be paid out of the automation fund. Collector Purdome answered in the affirmative. Because there is no hiring freeze in the collector's office Justice Vancuren stated that this

ordinance was unnecessary. Justice Vancuren made the motion to table this ordinance indefinitely. Justice White seconded the motion and the motion passed unanimously.

Ordinance 2023-32 – Lifting Hiring Freeze – Sponsored by Justice Reed. This ordinance repeals Ordinance 20-35. In 2020 there was a hiring freeze put into place to adjust budget shortfalls. The motion to adopt was made by Justice Vancuren and seconded by Justice McCalla. The motion passed unanimously.

Ordinance 2023-33 – Collector's Office – Wage Increase – Sponsored by Justice White. This ordinance allows the Collector to give a raise to her Chief Deputy from \$13.25 to \$14.50. The motion to adopt was made by Justice Hutching and seconded by Justice White. During discussion Justice Brigham asked if both deputies would be paid out of the automation fund. Collector Purdome replied that her office is reimbursed 82% every year which is approximately \$42,000 to \$45,000. Also, during the final settlement her office receives \$10,000 to \$15,000. This will pay both deputies and can be sustained until the end of her term. The motion to adopt was passed unanimously.

Ordinance 2023-34 – Numbers & Compensation – Sponsored by the Budget Committee. This budget is to amend the numbers and compensation portion of Ordinance 2023-34 to reflect accurately the actual budget line items. The motion to adopt was made by Justice Reed and seconded by Hutching. Justice Reed asked if Exhibit 2 was prepared by the comptroller. The response was yes. Justice Brigham asked if the two exhibits had been compared and again the answer was yes. Justice Brigham stated that the court didn't know if this numbers and compensation matches the budget. Justice Vancuren suggested that this ordinance be presented to the budget committee with the adjusted insurances, and then it should match the budget. The motion to table was made by Justice Reed and seconded by Justice Brigham. The motion passed unanimously.

Ordinance 2023-35 – Election – Election Reimbursement Fund – Sponsored by Justice Nickels. This ordinance creates a sub fund of County General to be called the Election Reimbursement Fund. When the reimbursement for the 2022 primary election is received, those monies will go into this fund to help deter the cost of the 2024 primary. The motion to adopt was made by Justice Vancuren and seconded by Justice White. The motion passed unanimously.

Ordinance 2033-36 – Sheriff's Office – Corps of Engineer – Sponsored by Justices Nickels, White, Reed, Hutching, and McCalla. This ordinance will transfer \$9,762.17 from fund 3406 Corp of Engineers into fund 1800 Sales Tax Law

Enforcement. The motion to adopt was made by Justice Vancuren and seconded by Justice McCalla. The motion passed unanimously.

Ordinance 2023-37 – Sheriff's Office – Vests – Sponsored by the Budget Committee. This ordinance appropriates \$34,392.18 from fund 1005 Corona Virus Relief Treasurer to the Sheriff Fund 1005-0400 into the clothing and uniform line item for the purpose of purchasing bullet proof vests. The motion to adopt was made by Justice Vancuren and seconded by Justice Hutching. Sheriff Alexander commented that these vests and accessories were ordered in October and received in January. The motion to adopt passed unanimously.

Ordinance 2023-38 – Sheriff's Office – Ballistic Vests – Sponsored by the Budget Committee. This ordinance appropriates \$20,071.83 from fund 3575 – DPS PSEG Public Safety to fund 3575-0400 Sheriff DPS grant into the clothing and uniforms and other professional services line items. The motion to adopt was made by Justice McCalla and seconded by Justice Reed. The motion passed unanimously.

Ordinance 2023-39 – Fire Departments – Appropriations – Sponsored by the Budget Committee. This ordinance \$71,624.60 from the America Rescue Fund – Fire Departments (1006) to ARPA Revenue Replacement Fund – Fire Departments (1006-0502) into various line items to complete the purchase of equipment and moving of the radio towers for the county fire department services. The motion to adopt was made by Justice Vancuren and seconded by Justice Nickels. Justice Reed asked if this was an oversight, Justice Vancuren replied that this was a one time appropriation. Justice Vancuren also asked in the future if the old ordinance could be attached to the new one to lessen the confusion of what was trying to be done. The motion to adopt passed unanimously.

Ordinance 2023-40 – E-911 – Appropriations – Sponsored by the Budget Committee. This ordinance appropriates \$288,914.91 from fund 1006 ARPA Revenue Replacement Fund into ARPA Revenue Replace Fund- E-911 fund (1006-0501) into various line items. This money was appropriated in 2022 but was not transferred into the 2023 budget. The motion to adopt was made by Justice Hutching and seconded by Justice Reed. Justice Vancuren commented that the E-911 system was supposed to be placed in the command center after the renovation was completed, however, dispatch is still at the detention center. He stated that he would be voting no. Justice Nickels stated that they spent \$125,000 to renovate the old jail for the purpose of moving E-911 and creating an office for the coroner. Judge Stumph stated that OEM and mapping had moved to the command center and dispatch would be staying where it is. Justice Vancuren said that the safety of the citizens is at stake with the dispatch being at the detention center. He reflected

that there were reports that inmates were being allowed into the 911 center and that some employees had bringing their children to work. Judge Stumph stated that the inmate in the dispatch area was a 309 inmate doing some quick house keeping. E-911 director Cassie Foster stated that the door to dispatch remains locked at all times. She asked that the court not vote against this ordinance. The motion to adopt failed with Justices White, Reed and Hutching voting in favor and Justices Scrima, Nickels, Vancuren, Shipman, Brigham and McCalla voting against it.

Ordinance 2023-41 – Transfer Station – Position Title – Sponsored by the Peronnell Committee. This ordinance changes the title from employee to lead transfer station operator and from employee to transfer station licensed operator. No wages are being changed. The motion to adopt was made by Justice Brigham and seconded by Justice McCalla. Justice McCalla pointed out that this was only changing the job descriptions. The motion to adopt was passed unanimously.

Ordinance 2023-42 – Personnel Policy – Birthday – Sponsored by the Personnel Committee. This ordinance changes the Personnel policy from allowing an employee from taking their birthday off within on year to within 30 days. The motion to adopt was made by Justice Brigham and seconded by Justice McCalla. Justice Vancuren asked if this was a problem. Karen Carter stated that the bookkeeping is easier if the time is reduced from one year to 30 days. Justice Vancuren stated that the way the ordinance reads, the employee isn't even allowed to take the day of their birthday. He motioned to amend the ordinance to read that "This day must be used on or within 30 days after the Employee's Birthday day". The motion to amend seconded by Justice McCalla. The motion passed unanimously. The motion to adopt also passed unanimously.

Ordinance 2023-43 – Sales Tax – Solid Waste – Equipment – Sponsored by Justices Nickels, White, Reed, Hutching, McCalla and Scrima. This ordinance allows for \$80,150 to be appropriated from Fund 1802 Sales Tax Waste/Recycling to fund 1802-0700 and placed into the machinery and equipment and building materials and supplies line items. These monies will be used for the purpose of purchasing two forklifts, four 8x10 trailers for cardboard locations and parts for the trailers to provide the capabilities to hold the cardboard. The motion to adopt was made by Justice Vancuren and seconded by Justice McCalla. The motion passed unanimously.

Ordinance 2023-44 – Road Department – Grader Purchase – Sponsored by Justices Nickels, White, Reed, Hutching, McCalla, and Scrima. This ordinance would appropriate \$229,000 from fund 1005 Coronavirus Relief fund into fund 2000 County Road fund for the purpose of purchasing a new grader. The motion to

adopt was made by Justice Hutching and seconded by Justice Reed. Justice Brigham asked why the Judge was using the Coronavirus fund instead of the money in the County Road fund. Judge answered that there was money left and he thought that he would use that money rather than tax payer money. Justice Brigham stated that she thought that he should use the Road Department money and save the Coronavirus fund for other projects. Justice Nickels asked if the road department was still having issues with the Sany graders purchased last year. Judge stated that the previous issues have been resolved and all are running at this time. They had to return a grader which had been leased. Justice Nickels said that he agreed with Justice Brigham, that the money for this purchase should come out of the road department budget. The motion to amend the ordinance to pay for the grader out of the road department budget was made by Justice Brigham and seconded by Scrima. The motion passed unanimously. The motion to adopt also passed unanimously.

Ordinance 2023-45 – Coroner – Correcting Line Items – Sponsored by the Budget Committee. This ordinance appropriates \$27,365.65 from the ARPA Revenue Replacement Fund (1006) into the ARPA Revenue Replacement Fund – Coroner Fund (1006-0419) into various line items. These funds were appropriated in 2022 but was not transferred into the 2023 budget. The motion to adopt was made by Justice Nickels and seconded by Justice Scima. The motion passed unanimously.

Ordinance 2023-46 - Marion County Auxiliary – American Rescue Fund – Sponsored by the Budget Committee. This ordinance allows for \$75,000 to be appropriated from the American Rescue Fund (3046) to American Rescue Fund – Nursing Home Auxiliary Fund (3406-0806) for the construction of a 2,400 sq. ft storage building. The motion to adopt was made by Justice McCalla and seconded by Justice White. The motion passed with Justice Brigham abstaining.

Ordinance 2023-47 – Sheriff's Department – Aligning the Budget – Sponsored by the Budget Committee. This ordinance appropriates \$81,392 from the Sales Tax Law Enforcement Fund (1800) into various line items in the Sales Tax Law Enforcement fund (1800-0400). The motion to adopt was made by Justice McCalla and seconded by Justice White. Justice Scrima explained that this fund (1800) did not change for the 2023 budget so the numbers were from the 2022 budget. Justice Vancuren stated that this fund did not have enough in the budget to appropriate into the line items. The projected revenues must be raised first. Justice Vancuren made the motion to table this ordinance until this can be rectified. Justice Scrima seconded the motion and the motion passed unanimously.

Ordinance 2023-48 – This number was accidentally skipped.

Ordinance 2023-49 – Treasurer’s Office – Wage Increase – Sponsored by Justices White and McCalla. This ordinance would allow for Numbers and Compensation to reflect a \$3.00 per hour raise for the Deputy Treasurer, raising the pay from \$13.25 per hour to \$16.25 per hour. Justice Hutching made the motion to adopt. There was no second so the motion failed.

Ordinance 2023-50 – Food Closet – American Rescue Fund – Sponsored by the Budget Committee. This ordinance allows for \$25,000 to be given to the Yellville Area Food Closet Association for the purchase of food, from the American Rescue Fund. The motion to adopt was made by Justice McCalla and seconded by Justice Brigham. Justice Vancuren commented that this Ordinance would allow them to buy food and not a structure. He continued by stating that he would support building a structure that would last for years. Justice White stated that the cost of food was getting higher and higher and people were having issues in buying food. A volunteer from the Food Closet spoke up and stated that when he had started volunteering there, the Closet might help 40 families in a given day. He continued that the past Thursday, they supplied 140 families with food and ran out of food. Another citizen spoke up stating that this was income based and people had to fill out paper work and show their tax returns. Justice Vancuren then stated that he had changed his mind. The motion to adopt passed unanimously.

Ordinance 2023-51 – Water Rescue Fund – Sponsored by the Budget Committee. This ordinance will appropriate \$1,536.92 from ARPA Revenue Replacement Fund (3046) into ARPA – Water Rescue Fund (3046-0504) into the line items for general supplies and machinery and equipment. These monies were not transferred from the 2022 budget into the 2023 budget. The motion to adopt was made by Justice Vancuren and seconded by Justice McCalla. The motion passed unanimously.

Ordinance 2023-52 – Oakland Community Center – Sponsored by the Budget Committee. This ordinance appropriates \$12,000 from the Corona Virus Relief Fund (1005) to County General- Grants in Aid Fund (1000-0116). There was a theft of funds from Oakland Community Center, and they are unable to pay their bills. The motion to adopt was made by Justice Scrima and seconded by Justice Vancuren. Justice Vancuren made a motion to amend the ordinance to include a section regarding reimbursement should these funds be recovered. Justice Brigham seconded the motion. The motion to amend passed unanimously. The motion to adopt also passed unanimously.

The motion to accept the appointment of Dan Amato to the Ra Valley Fire Protection District Board was made by Justice McCalla and seconded by Justice White. The motion passed unanimously.

The motion to accept the appointment of Peggy Pentkowski to the Marion County Library board was made by Justice Reed and seconded by Justice Nickels. Justice Brigham stated that she had passed on the name of an individual that showed an interest in being on this board and wondered if that person had been interviewed for the position. Judge Stumph replied that Library Director Dana Scott and the Board had requested that Ms. Pentkowski be placed on the Board. He was going with their suggestion. Justices Brigham and Vancuren both stated that they would like to be a part of the process of board appointments. The vote to ratify failed, with Justices Reed and Shipman voting in favor, Justices Vancuren and Brigham voting against and Justices Scrima, Nickels, White, Hutching and McCalla abstaining.

An ordinance and a resolution were not presented to the Clerk in a timely manner to get into the packet, so although they were passed out at the meeting, they were not considered.

Cara Hurley from "The Call" gave a presentation to the court regarding a party they are having on April 21 at the Elms Barn in Flippin. She stated that Marion County has 17 children in foster care and only four are in foster homes in Marion County.

Author Wendy Wise asked for permission to place her book "Seeing Ourselves Through the Eyes of God" into the detention center. She stated that this book offers encouragement to the inmates to see themselves in a better state.

The meeting was adjourned.

Please find for your review and deliberation the monthly report for the Marion County Office of Emergency Management. Should you have any questions specific to any of the following items please do not hesitate to ask.

- Met with 911 Coordinator and continued to oversee and discuss the ongoing training on our new CAD System with our telecommunications staff.
- The Office of Emergency Management has completed the move to our new Office of Emergency Management building located at the former Marion County Sheriff's office & Jail facility and we are now fully operational.
- We have implemented weekly radio testing for all fire agencies on the North, South and Central radio towers. These tests occur on Saturdays & Sundays and these tests have been very successful.
- 03 MAY 23 Judge Stumph, OEM Director Kuchenbecker and Streets / Mapping Specialist Penn met with the contractor, Bryan Bell, to discuss various "punch list" items at the new OEM Facility & Coroner's Office.
- We discovered an error in the quarterly Sales Tax distribution to local Fire Departments. As a result of this error, we discovered a myriad of issues that have never been addressed in terms of distribution, rural department clarification and various other matters related to this process. We are working with the Judge's Office and County Corporation Counsel to draft legislation via County Ordinance to correct the shortcomings that have been identified so that moving forward we will not experience similar problems.

14 new addresses and 8 signs were completed.

Budget Committee Meeting
May 4, 2023

The meeting was called to order at 5:30 pm by Chairperson Justice Joyce McCalla; in attendance was Justice Joyce McCalla, Justice Rick White, Justice John Reed and Justice Marty Nickels.

Item #1 of last months meeting minutes which all members accepted.

Item#2 the approval by the ARPA and tribal grant applications. Justice Brigham, who represents the applications committee, discussed the Bull Shoals Library grant request for \$4,000.00 to replace a heating and air conditioner. The committee approved this request. Second, was an application from the Marion County Arkansas Heritage Society for \$15,000.00 which the panel also approved. The third request was from the Lakeway Fire Department and Justice Brigham suggested we hold back on this \$80,000.00 request till the Chief's meeting and all fire departments can receive the required information. Clerk Moffit thanked Justice Brigham for her work with these grants applications; Justice Brigham deferred that it's Karen Carter and Cheyenne that does all the work.

Item #3 a resolution from Clerk Moffit for a grant valued at \$114,736.97, to scan Marion County records for the past 60 years. Clerk Moffit added that if she doesn't receive the grant, could the board consider taking the funds from ARPA or Tribal accounts? The various businesses and individuals can use this information is endless. The committee agreed to sponsor the resolution

Item #4 an ordinance previously brought to the Quorum Court, which raises the salaries to the Clerk's office personnel. Currently, two employees are making \$13.25 an hour, and another are receiving \$15.60 an hour. Clerk Moffit stated that her salary will come from recorders fund and will save County General, \$21,450.00 a year. The realignment of funds will give the Clerk's office employees an increase to \$15.25 and \$18.60. Also included in the proposal was various job descriptions. Justice Scrima questioned; what is a fair wage, and to put the max salary at \$18.50? Clerk Moffit stated that she would rewrite the ordinance to \$18.50 and \$15.25. Comptroller Todaro added that the ordinance would also free up funds from County General for other departments. Many offices are reimbursed by the state or a special fund. Clerk Moffit spoke that she would wait to submit this ordinance till the June meeting.

Item #5 the ARPA revenue replacement for E911 to appropriate \$289,914.91, to complete the payment for emergency equipment. This ordinance was in front of the Quorum Court in the previous year when Dwayne McFarland was OEM director. The committee agreed to sponsor the ordinance.

Justice Scrima added that many employees transfer on January 1 to other departments.

Item #8 an ordinance for OEM, to hand out the fire department funds of \$102,000.00. Director Kuchenbecker added that each department must come to his office and sign for the reimbursement. Justice Scrima suggested all disbursements and bills must be paid monthly by the end of the year.

Justices,

Please find attached an ordinance that I would like to have presented to the proper committees and then to the entire court. Unfortunately, I will not be able to attend the Personnel meeting as my husband is having surgery that day, and I will need to stay with him. However, I will be able to attend the budget meeting.

This ordinance allows at my discretion to give my deputies raises. The wage range is \$13.25 to \$20.00 for each deputy.

Two of my deputies are paid out of the Recorder's fund, which brings in approximately \$108,000.00 per year, as of this date there is \$260,041.41 in this fund. So, this change will be completely sustainable. This ordinance reflects that I will refund county general the amount that I have been paid from there from the Recorder's fund in the amount of \$13,200.00 and for the rest of my term, my salary will only come from the Recorder's fund thus saving county general \$21,450.00 per year.

Also attached, is a spreadsheet of the approved budgets under my administration. You will notice that my county general budgets have been reduced every year, while the Recorder's fund has generally increased.

Over the years, this office has done many things in order to help maintain County General. Court Order – 2018-13 - \$80,000 was transferred from the Recorder's fund to County General. Ordinance 2020-21 – I created the line items and appropriated money from Child Support fees to pay one deputy for 17 pay periods, during the 2020 crisis.

Ordinance 2020-27 – I complied with the budget reduction of 10% across the board for the month of May, June and July, 2020.

Ordinance 2020-32 – More money was transferred from the Child Support fees fund to continue to pay one deputy until December 31, 2020. Also, \$19434.61 was appropriated from the Recorder's fund to pay the Clerk and one deputy until December 31, 2020.

Ordinance 2020-53 – This ordinance reflects that the Clerk got paid for 20 pay periods from the Recorder's fund, rather than 13.

April 25, 2023

Attendees: Justice Brigham, Justice Hutching, Justice White, Justice Reed and Justice McCalla by phone.

Topic

1. Work at Home Policy

There was extensive conversation regarding a work at home policy mostly supported by Dana Scott. Portions of this conversation are summarized.

Dana Scott supported a work at home policy stating that it was a benefit to the employees and could be as functional for certain tasks as being physically in the Library. She presented a policy statement approved by the Library Board for Committee review. She stated that Justice Brigham had attended the Board meeting in February and had asked for a policy statement from the Board.

Justice Brigham noted that she had not specially asked for a policy but if employees were working at home a policy was needed.

Marsha Richardson stated that she felt that work at home was mostly supported due to the covid pandemic.

Justice Brigham questioned if an employee worked at home who would pay for computers, internet access, and other at home expenses.

Dana Scott noted that the Library had computers are available for check out, while internet and other expenses should be paid by the employees. She noted that work at home would work for the Library staff but not necessarily for other departments.

Justice Hutching questioned issues with information security.

Justice White questioned a work at home policy for employees that were sick. This example was offered by Dana Scott.

Justice Brigham and Justice McCalla stated that a work at home policy must be for all county employees.

Justice Hutching noted that there would be issues with work place liabilities if an employee was injured at home.



Deputy Prosecutor Russo noted that any injuries incurred by an employee working at home would be covered by workman compensation if the policy was in place.

Justice Reed asked if a signed agreement noting the employees responsibility in the case of injuries was defensible.

Deputy Prosecutor Russo responded no.

Justice Reed motioned that the issue be table until the county had an information security policy, a better understanding of the expectations of customer service and a definition for work at home workman compensation coverage. Justice Brigham second the motion and the committee voted agreement.

Note: Although not specially stated by the committee there was general consensus that no county employee is authorized to work at home until an approved policy is in place.

2. Interview with Peggy Pentkowski for a place on the Library Board.

The committee accepted Mrs. Pentkowski desire to be on the Library Board and will forward to Quorum Court for consideration.

Minutes from the Law Enforcement Committee
April 20, 2023

Topics:

1. Metro Contract

Justice White raised concerns about the billing accountability for the contract as well as an unknown contract between Yellville and Summit for law enforcement coverage from the Metro contract. He noted that he had contacted Ed Jones of AAC concerning the Summit contract. Mr. Jones was reported as saying the contract should be with the county and not Yellville.

Sheriff Alexander stated he was working on billing transparency.

Mayor Lane noted that there was no contract between Yellville and Summit for Metro laws enforcement coverage.

Sheriff Alexander confirmed the lack of a contract.

Justice White expressed concerns about what was being funded in the contract. His concerns were based on the list of possible expenses noted in the AAC Sheriff's Manual.

Mayor Lane noted that Yellville paid a flat fee of \$9,000 a month that he felt covered all expenses. He also noted that Yellville buys a vehicle for Metro officers every three years.

Sheriff Alexander confirmed that Metro officers were County Deputies assigned to Metro and he made no distinction between these officers and other deputies in regard to supplying county funded equipment. He also stated that although deputies are assigned to Metro they would be expected to response to as-needed emergencies outside of Yellville. Judge Stumph confirmed that Metro deputies seldom leave their assigned areas.

Mayor Lane stated he understood and supported this need.

Justice McCalla questioned inmate expenses for inmates arrested by cities in the county and incarcerated in the county jail and whether or not the cities funded associated inmate costs.

2. Software that supports the Jail and the Sheriff's Office

Sheriff Alexander reported that the costs of support software were outdated.

He noted the maintenance agreement for RPS (software that supports the administrative functions of the Sheriff's Office) had not been paid for several years with \$27,000 in arrears. It was noted that RPS had forgiven this amount but expects to be paid the annual \$7,900 maintenance fee from this point forward.

Sheriff Alexander also reported that the software that supports Jail operations is outdated and is no longer totally functional. He estimated the costs of replacement to be \$69,000 to \$80,000

Sheriff Alexander stated he would submit ordinances to the Budget Committee for these new costs.

3. Inmate Health Care

Sheriff Alexander reported that as of May 15, 2023 the county will no longer have inmate health care as the current agreement is being terminated.

Justice McCalla asked what was to be done.

Sheriff Alexander reported that he was contacting local physicians as a possible solution.

Justices,

Please find attached an ordinance that I would like to have presented to the proper committees and then to the entire court. Unfortunately, I will not be able to attend the Personnel meeting as my husband is having surgery that day, and I will need to stay with him. However, I will be able to attend the budget meeting.

This ordinance allows at my discretion to give my deputies raises. The wage range is \$13.25 to \$20.00 for each deputy.

Two of my deputies are paid out of the Recorder's fund, which brings in approximately \$108,000.00 per year, as of this date there is \$260,041.41 in this fund. So, this change will be completely sustainable. This ordinance reflects that I will refund county general the amount that I have been paid from there from the Recorder's fund in the amount of \$13,200.00 and for the rest of my term, my salary will only come from the Recorder's fund thus saving county general \$21,450.00 per year.

Also attached, is a spreadsheet of the approved budgets under my administration. You will notice that my county general budgets have been reduced every year, while the Recorder's fund has generally increased.

Over the years, this office has done many things in order to help maintain County General. Court Order – 2018-13 - \$80,000 was transferred from the Recorder's fund to County General. Ordinance 2020-21 – I created the line items and appropriated money from Child Support fees to pay one deputy for 17 pay periods, during the 2020 crisis.

Ordinance 2020-27 – I complied with the budget reduction of 10% across the board for the month of May, June and July, 2020.

Ordinance 2020-32 – More money was transferred from the Child Support fees fund to continue to pay one deputy until December 31, 2020. Also, \$19,434.61 was appropriated from the Recorder's fund to pay the Clerk and one deputy until December 31, 2020.

Ordinance 2020-53 – This ordinance reflects that the Clerk got paid for 20 pay periods from the Recorder's fund, rather than 13.

SECTION 2. Marion County AR Heritage Society is a non-profit 501 (c) (3) all volunteer organization with the mission of to collect, preserve, and share data of historic and genealogical significance in Marion County, Arkansas.
