Delivered from Isolation

My Brothers and Sisters in the Lord – It is a terrible thing to be cut off from others. Being forced to live in isolation is something that no one wants. Isolation can seriously affect the life and well-being of anyone. We were not born to be isolated from others. We need close connections with loved ones, family, and friends – And we will suffer if we are cut off.

People who are isolated will soon begin to feel lonely. They can experience mental decline – as well as anxiety and depression. Even criminals, in prison, need each other for social interaction. Moreover, solitary confinement is condemned and outlawed in most places. It is considered to be torture!

Nevertheless, sometimes, temporary isolation is required to stop the spread of a contagious disease. A person or group can be under a temporary quarantine. This was the case when Covid-19 was running rampant.

Until only recently, leprosy was an incurable disease. It was thought to be extremely contagious. Consequently, lepers were shunned – and forced to live apart. This was done to preserve the health of the larger community. And this is the background for the decree in the Book of Leviticus. If anyone had a skin disorder that even resembled leprosy – they were to be evaluated. Aaron, the brother of Moses, or some other priest – was to make the determination. The infected person was to be isolated if they were judged to have leprosy.

Thus, the leper became an outcast. They could be re-admitted to the community only if they were completely cured. An infection could heal. But the leprosy would not. Consequently, the poor leper was cut off from everyone in the larger community for the rest of their life!

Nevertheless, so harmful was absolute isolation – that lepers would, often, band together. They did this for personal interaction and mutual support. However, they were poor, bedraggled, and probably starving most of the time!

In the Gospel of Mark, the leper took a great chance when he approached Jesus. He was breaking the Law when he did so. He even risked being stoned by others – because Jesus was seldom alone.

Jesus, himself, risked any standing that he had with the Jewish leadership – Because Jesus did the unthinkable. He approached the leper – touched him – and healed him!

Jesus gave back a normal life to the leper. The man could, now, return to family, friends, and loved ones – and live with them! However, he did have to be evaluated by one of the priestly class – Then he had to make the offering that Moses required in gratitude for the cure.

In his 1st Letter to the Corinthians, St. Paul urges us to do everything with the glory of God in our minds and hearts. We must be careful not to deliberately offend anyone – Because we touch the heart and soul of everyone, we encounter whether we are aware of it or not. Furthermore, when we do harm to others, we betray our God-given heritage as Christian disciples.

Certainly, one of the things we can do as disciples is to become more aware of the needs of others. Perhaps, those in the greatest need are the ones who are isolated. These can be older folks or people with inadequate social skills. A little time – and a little effort – can do much to help them in their isolation.

However, perhaps the greatest number of forgotten isolationists are our young people today. They number in the tens of millions. Most communicate only by text messages. They have minimal, live contact with anyone else. Consequently, they are not experiencing the real emotions and feelings of others – They can send devastating messages to others with impunity – And they are not developing a personal, emotional life of compassion, heartfelt care, and understanding in their own hearts and souls. There must be a way to draw them out of their isolated lives – Or the future bodes ill for America and all First World countries!

And so, Brothers and Sisters, let us pray for God's wonderful grace. May we escape any self-imposed isolation by always reaching out and becoming involved with others outside of ourselves. And may we also becomes instruments of care and concern for those who tend to hide themselves away!
