Repent and Change

A great sadness with which we all have to live is knowing the harm we have done to someone else. It is one thing to make a mistake. Mistakes are usually unintended – and relatively easy to forgive. But it is another thing to do something deliberately out of selfishness – not caring that it will harm others. Whether it is from weakness, peer pressure, or self-indulgence, sin always does harm. It can damage others – as well as ourselves. And it offends God who made us for goodness and truth – and in His own image!

Once we are aware of our misdeeds, we should realize that we must do something about them. We must become a better person. We must also attempt to restore what we damaged or destroyed. This can be difficult if the offended party shuns us – If they refuse to forgive us. Consequently, probably the heaviest burden that anyone can carry is the knowledge of being unforgiven!

Fortunately, all the scriptures for today touch upon these issues in some way. The great flood that Noah survived probably covered the entire floodplain of the Tigris and Euphrates rivers. That flood plain amounts to over 333,000 square miles! The flood served to punish and eradicate all those who lived selfish, sinful, ungodly lives. The wages of sin is always death of some kind. It can affect the body as well as the soul. Furthermore, the great tragedy of spiritual death is that it can leave the soul with a feeling of hopelessness.

Noah was able to survive the flood because he was a good man. He was always open to God. He listened to the voice of the Holy Spirit – who warned Noah of what was to come. That premonition inspired him to build the Ark. Thus, he and his family survived – along with whatever else they brought along. What is noteworthy is that subsequent to the flood, is the first mention of a covenant. With that covenant, God made it clear that He truly loved and cared about the human race.

The Gospel of Mark tells us that the Holy Spirit "drove" Jesus out into the desert. While there, Jesus searched his soul for what the Spirit was asking of him. Jesus probably had a premonition of what was to come. He would preach the Good News of salvation – and about God's merciful love. But he also understood that he would be met with resistance and opposition. Satan was there in the desert to tempt Jesus away from his mission and his future ministry. But good angels were also there to help him as he wrestled with satan.

When he emerged from his desert retreat, Jesus was clear about what he had to do and what he had to say. Consequently, he took up what the Baptist was no longer able to do himself. It was the beginning of a whole new epoch. It was the fulfillment of all that had been promised. The Kingdom of God would be manifest and evident from that time on. All the work – the teaching and the miracles – of Jesus would make it evident.

However, to enter that Kingdom, people had to respond in a godly way. They had

to repent of their sinful ways – They had to believe in the Gospel – in the Good News! There could be no excuses. People had to change their hearts and their lives! The Good News was that no one was beyond salvation. No matter what they had done –

No matter who they had hurt – No matter who bore the burden of human unforgiveness – All could be saved! God could and would forgive – when others would not. God would be merciful – when others withheld mercy. God could heal the human soul and spirit no matter what continued to assault someone externally.

Brothers and Sisters, it is a wonderful thing to know that we have a loving and merciful God. Our God created us for infinitely more than we will ever experience in this life. Furthermore, God will sustain us, no matter what we suffer because of others.

So, let us pray, that during this Lent we do far more than just give up some small thing until Easter. Instead, may we look deeply within – change something important – and change it permanently. May we, truly, repent and believe – with the power of God's grace! Amen.
