Bishops Call to oppose Physician Assisted Suicide: Members of the Minnesota State Legislature have introduced H.F. 1930 and S.F. 1813 that would legalize death via physician-assisted suicide in Minnesota. Physician-assisted suicide is the intentional taking of human life that leaves the elderly, ill, including those struggling with mental health; and persons with disabilities at high risk. We stand with disability advocates, members of the medical community, patient advocates and other religious organizations through the Minnesota Alliance for

Living in a Devalued World

Recently, the mayor of a large Mid-Western city spoke about the greatly increased revenue in the city coffers from taxing legalized cannabis products. But he said nothing about the increased problems of young people and the crime that is the result. What is interesting is that when I tried to follow up on those reported problems of young people – there was nothing to be found. Everything negative had been wiped off the internet.

"The love of money is the root of all evil." So often, when money is involved, people make serious compromises with their moral values. Thus, they will lie, cheat, steal – and even take a life – if they can raise the bottom line of personal, corporate, or community income.

has Human nature two conflicting characteristics. Part of us is good and noble -And part is broken and corrupt. Original Sin damaged the beauty and wholeness that God created us to possess - And whenever we choose the dark side - we add to the darkness of our fallen world. Fortunately, God would not be outdone by satan - Nor would He abandon His creation. A little over 4,000 years ago, God called Abraham. God established a People, especially chosen, from which a Savior would come. And, today in the Book of Exodus, we learn of the Commandments God gave to that nation – and, subsequently, to the world.

What is significant is that there would never be discord or violence anywhere, if everyone kept those Commandments. And the very first, is always to keep the Lord God foremost in our hearts and lives. Furthermore, if God is always foremost, then the other Commandments become easier to keep!

However, because He knew that we would bend these Commandments for self-service – God spelled things out. – We are not to make idols out of our material things. This includes our homes, our wardrobe, our toys, and our cellphones! – We are not to have anyone do things or us that we are not to do ourselves. – We are not to covet or desire forbidden things or already-committed people – Because desire leads to action – and action brings harm and death to our souls – even as it violates others in some way.

Today, St. John tells us that Jesus attacked the Stockmen and the Money Changers in the Temple. They were not where they were supposed to be! They were also taking advantage of people's obligation to make certain sacrifices. Furthermore, the religious leaders looked the other way – probably for a "kick-back". God's house of prayer had, indeed, become a marketplace!

The Gospel also tells us that Jesus didn't get taken-in by his growing popularity. He knew that human nature was imperfect and weak. People followed him because of the signs and miracles he worked – And they had it all wrong about the kind of Messiah he would be. Jesus knew that they would desert him when the Gospel made its real demands upon them. They would desert him – as they do now – because they wanted an easy life in this world. They would not want or accept the hardships of a journey – with the cross as the doorway to eternal life!

This last consideration is what inspired St. Paul's passage in 1st Corinthians. The Jewish leadership wanted signs – but there would never be enough of those signs. The Gentile Greeks thought that wisdom answered every question and solved every problem. However, the Christian disciple must embrace a different sign – and a different wisdom. It is the sign of the Cross and the Power of the Resurrection.

Unfortunately, most people in our world today do not have the faith to embrace these Gospel realities. Money – and the health, wealth, and power that money can buy – is everything. Today, all kinds of moral realities have become devalued. Because they are commonplace – and legal – people forget what God wants and commands. Thus, abortion, in vitro fertilization – use of aborted stem-cells, sex-change operations, same sex marriages are just some of the things that show how far we have strayed from God's plan and will!

Brothers and Sisters, our present-day vocation as Christian disciples is to survive the devalued world in which we live. So, let us pray for steadfastness – Let us pray for courage – And may the Wisdom of God and the Foolishness of God be our guiding light and our salvation!
