

'Hearts on Fire, Feet on the Move' is this year's theme for Mission Sunday which is celebrated on October 22. It is inspired by the Lord's encounter with the disciples on the Road to Emmaus found in the Gospel (Luke 24:13-35). In choosing this theme Pope Francis has reaffirmed that world Mission Sunday is a privileged opportunity for us to foster missionary cooperation on both the spiritual and material levels.

Were your eyes opened and is 'your heart on fire' after encountering Jesus in the Eucharist? Will you take the risk of faith to invite everyone to walk together on the path of peace and salvation? Mission cooperation is the effort of the entire church to help over 1,100 dioceses that cannot sustain themselves because they are too poor, young, or actively persecuted. Until 1908, the Church in the United States was a mission territory. We relied on this fund to build our churches and seminaries and support our clergy and religious. Today many foreign missions rely on our generosity to sustain the church, which is an instrument of God's love and mercy, His hope and peace. There will be a second collection taken up on the weekend of Oct.21-22 at all Masses. Please be generous!

My Dear Parishioners,

Over the past few weeks, the scriptures have provided us with a feast of images of God's abundant mercy. The mountain of the Lord described in today's first reading is a place where there is no more hunger, no more weeping, and no more division of any kind. We need to pause and ponder such images every now and then, especially given the fact that we live in such a fractured world.

The responsorial psalm continues to paint a picture of a place where only goodness and kindness flourish. Today's image of the heavenly banquet both completes the picture of God's generosity and shifts our attention to our response to God's generous invitation.

As Catholics we are invited to "come to the feast" at significant moments in our lives. Baptisms, First Communions, marriages, ordinations, and funeral rites are all commonly celebrated within the feast of the Eucharist. The clothes we wear—from the baptismal garment to the funeral pall, from fancy wedding garb to simple white albs—reflect our baptismal commitment to be faithful to Christ until we come to the eternal heavenly feast that our eucharistic celebrations anticipate. All are invited to come to the feast. All are invited to dress in the garment of Christ. However, not all respond to the invitation.

It has often been asked what would happen if, some Sunday morning—praying as we always do for Christ to come again—Christ actually did return. Would we come to his feast? Would we prefer our small private gathering to the huge mass of people we don't really want to know? Would we be found wearing the garment of faithfulness we were given in baptism?

Where would we be "on that day"?
