Tri-Parish News and Note

A Statement from Bishop Barron

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ, as perhaps you know, April has been designated in our country as child abuse awareness month. The sexual and physical abuse of children is a problem that runs through the whole of our society, but as we all know, it has been a particular curse within our own Catholic community. The scandals associated with clerical sexual misconduct constitute the worst crisis in the history of the church in America. I have referred to the sex abuse of young people by priests and bishops as "the devil's masterpiece," for it has shattered so many lives and has so negatively impacted the evangelical mission of the Church.

I want all of you to know, as your bishop, that I am completely committed to the eradication of sexual abuse within the church and the protection of our children and vulnerable adults. Bishop Quinn was firm in his determination to implement in our diocese the strictest protocols in regard to the screening and monitoring of seminarians, priests, and anyone who works in and for the Church. I pledge to walk that same path.

Some years ago, I wrote a short book on this entire sad subject called Letter to a Suffering Church. This text is available online, free of charge, at sufferingchurchbook.com. I would encourage everyone in our diocese to download and read it. Finally, don't hesitate to come forward if you or a loved one has been abused by a minister associated with the Church. I assure you that your concern will be taken with utter seriousness.

Please, dear friends in Christ, continue to pray for all the victim/survivors of sexual abuse throughout our society. And pray, too, for our Church. Bishop Robert Barron, Bishop of the Diocese of Winona-Rochester.

Elections to the Parish Pastoral and Finance Councils: In the last week of April, we plan to have nominations and elections to the parish Pastoral and Finance Councils in all the three parishes. It has been long since members have been serving on these councils and some have resigned or unable to participate in the meetings. Please see the following info.

PARISH PASTORAL COUNCIL

Scope: The Parish Pastoral Council is a consultative body, over which the pastor presides. Its scope is the parish community as a whole, the total mission of the parish. They establish vision and mission and recommend policies to the pastor, to give direction to the focused goals of the parish.

Members of the parish pastoral council should reflect the diversity: some elected, others appointed, and representatives of various committees or organizations of the parish. Members should have time for regular meetings and be familiar with the pertinent policies of the church (Diocese and Universal Church).

Coordination: The Parish Pastoral Council coordinates the activities of the parish committees and organizations like: Worship and Spiritual life, Evangelization and Catechesis, Social ministry, Administration and Stewardship and works closely with the Parish Finance council.

Nomination: Pray, discern who will best serve the mission of the church in our parish. On the day a nomination paper is given to you, please identify and circle five names for nomination to the Parish Pastoral Council. You may select from existing members or new

members. In doing so please remember youth, women, men, seniors, Altura, Wilson. These will be counted and those who secure the highest number of votes will be named as nominees for election. Candidates will be intimated and if they wish to withdraw may do so.

Election: On the day ballot/election paper is given to you, please identify and circle five names as your vote for election to the Pastoral Council. Top five who score highest number of votes, their names will be announced for the Parish Pastoral council.

PARISH FINANCE COUNCIL

Scope: The Parish Finance Council is an advisory group which aids the pastor in the administration of parish goods and finances. It involves recurring routine matters, annual budget, acts of major importance, acts of extraordinary importance.

Members of the parish finance council should reflect integrity of life, involvement in the parish, knowledge about financial and/or civil law affairs. Members should have time for regular meetings and be familiar with the pertinent policies of the church. Three members are elected and two trustees being appointed by the Bishop's board. Their term is three years and can be reappointed.

Responsibilities: The Parish Finance Council is to communicate and work closely with the Parish Pastoral Council. They are to be familiar with the finances of the parish including income and expenditures, investments and indebtedness, and diocesan obligations; be in compliance with civil laws in parish administration; have long-range financial planning and fund raising; seeing to construction and maintenance of parish buildings and grounds; reviewing cemetery finances; draw up a budget and make periodical report to the parishioners and to the Diocese.

Nomination: Pray, discern who will best serve the work of the Finance Council in our parish. On the day a nomination paper is given to you, please identify and circle three names for nomination to the Parish Finance Council. You may select from existing members or new members. In doing so please remember women, men, seniors. These will be counted and those who secure the highest number of scores will be named as nominees for election. Candidates will be intimated and if they wish to withdraw may do so.

Election: On the day ballot/election paper is given to you, please identify and circle three names as your vote for election to the Parish Finance Council. The top three who score highest number of votes, their names will be announced for the Pastoral council.

My Dear Parishioners,

Only Saint Luke tells the story of two disciples walking to Emmaus, and it is full of puzzling gaps. While all the other disciples and Jesus' mother were in Jerusalem trying to understand the amazing fact of the Resurrection, why were these two hurrying out of town? Only one is named—Cleopas. Who was the other? A friend, a brother, a cousin or, perhaps, Cleopas' wife? The two were going over the terrible events in Jerusalem during the previous days when they were joined by a stranger who asked what they were talking about. He listened intently to their story, and then explained what had happened to Jesus in the larger context of the Jewish scriptures. But these two were too blinded by grief to realize who the stranger was. When they reached the village, it was late, so they persuaded him to come into the house, which we may guess was either this couple's home or a relatives.

The culmination of the story occurs when they sit down for a meal and Jesus breaks bread and gives thanks, at which moment "their eyes were opened" and they knew their guest was the Lord (Luke 24:31). It was not just that they opened their eyes, but they were awakened to a whole new reality.

Perhaps that is just the point. God's grace falls on us in the midst of dinner or as we hurry down the road, trying to get away. God's grace falls on us smack dab in the everyday, ordinary moments, in the plain and simple struggles to understand, through conversations in the checkout line, at the bedside of a sick relative, during phone calls and driving the car to pick up or deposit the kids. The Emmaus story says that God is alive, right now, in every moment. Wake up and see!

Make a promise to yourself to notice the goodness and presence of God in the everyday miracles of your life, however small or great. Keep smiling!
