

Sacrament of initiation

In the Catholic Church, baptism is a sacrament of initiation that cleanses a person from original sin and incorporates them into the Body of Christ. It is considered the first sacrament, where the recipient receives justifying and sanctifying grace, and the Holy Spirit begins to dwell within

them. Baptism is also referred to as the "sacrament of regeneration," symbolizing a spiritual rebirth through the washing with water and the invocation of the Holy Trinity. It is viewed as the means by which one receives the Holy Spirit and is often described as the "gateway to life in the Spirit".

"The Only Cure for Violence"

Hardly a day goes by that we don't hear or read about violence in some form. It seems that many people resort to violence when they don't get what they want. Many even break laws to secure whatever objectives they have.

Peaceful demonstrations often become violent confrontations. The freedom of speech is not respected and is abused – Disrupters shout insults, obscenities, and challenges – Some hurl dangerous objects – Others force their way into areas that have been closed off. When officers try to enforce the law, they are often met with violence. And then they must resort to strong-arm tactics to defend others – or to protect themselves. Sad to say, violence of any kind usually perpetrates a returned violence. Hatred, ill-will, revenge, and retaliation are some of the examples of this!

The scriptures for today reveal what is the only lasting solution to the violence – in our world – and in our lives. Isaiah spoke of a non-violent servant of God who would bring peace and justice to the world. He would be led by the Spirit of God – He would not yell out or shout – He would not be a rabble-rouser – He would be kind and gentle with people who were bruised or damaged in soul and spirit. He would be patient with those who lost the fire of love in their hearts – And he would give them a chance to reignite that flame once again. He would touch others with his words – He would enable them to be freed from the darkness in their minds – And he would deliver others from the dungeon of their hopelessness, darkness, and despair! Furthermore, God would be pleased with him,

because he would bring a new justice into the world. It would be righteousness – the goodness – that does the will of the Lord God.

St. Matthew teaches us that Jesus is the one who fits this description – and fulfills this prophecy. People went to the Jordan River as a sign of repentance for their sinful lives. John the Baptist did not think that Jesus should be there at all! Because Jesus had no need for repentance. But Jesus came for another reason. He came to show his solidarity with the rest of the human race – He came to express his willingness to be led by the Holy Spirit – and to do the will of God in all things. Consequently, the Holy Spirit filled his human heart and soul – And the Father was more than pleased with His beloved Son!

In the Acts of the Apostles, Peter teaches us that anyone who fears God – and acts uprightly – is acceptable to God. This is a holy fear – It is a sense of awe and reverence for the majesty of God. It includes a humble awareness of our own finiteness and limitations.

We can do so little, on our own, to heal the violence in our world. Nevertheless, we are called to imitate the heart, soul, and life of our Savior himself. Jesus called his Apostles to carry on his work of peace and justice. Through their successors, that work has been handed down to us for the last 20 centuries.

Brothers and Sisters, satan is behind all the violence that exists in our world today. He is behind the violence within us: whenever we lose control – whenever we lash out – whenever we want to retaliate or get even. We are no match for satan's power and influence by ourselves – But with God's power, we can resist and overcome whatever he tries to bring into our lives.

Furthermore, we can be a counter-sign. We can be an example to others – and to the world at large. That sign is that there is no peace without justice – and there is no justice, without peace! We must never forget that justice is the righteousness and the goodness that is God's will for us and for the world!

So, let us pray that we can each bring these Godly objectives wherever our life journey takes us. Amen.
