“Jesus and His Cross Our Light and Life”

Even though the sun might be shining, there is still a lot of gloom in our world today. This gloom and darkness is in the minds and hearts of most people. Because our world is divided – and at odds – politically, economically, socially, morally, and even religiously. People want support for their lives and personal beliefs. They also need validation for their lives and beliefs. Therefore, they attach themselves to a special group or to a particular person. However, all this does is lead to more divisiveness!

Fortunately, the scriptures for today reveal a way through any darkness and gloom that we might have. Isaiah speaks to the lands of Zebulun and Naphtali. He tells them that their degradation – their affliction, really – is over. Those places were part of Galilee. They were border locations and were battlegrounds for nearby warring nations. The leadership, there, never drove out the pagan Canaanites – Thus, it became a territory of mixed people and races.

As a result, the people of Israel and Judea considered them to be inferior in every way. The Galileans were second-class citizens. This was even though the Hebrews there were faithful in all their beliefs and practices. Isaiah prophesied that their inherent darkness and gloom would be dispelled. It would be dispelled by a great and shining light someday. And that light was the Son of God, who, eventually, came in the person of Jesus of Nazareth!

In the Gospel of Matthew, John had been baptizing at the Jordan river. This was in the wilderness of Judea. Consequently, when Jesus began his mission, he moved farther west to be out of the reach of King Herod. This move took Jesus deeper into the Galilee of the Gentiles. It was the Galilee – the collection – of unbelieving people and groups. Yet, it was there that Jesus called others to follow him and assist him in his ministry.

Peter, Andrew, James, and John were fishermen. They worked hard just to get by economically. Nevertheless, they left everything behind to follow Jesus. Somehow, Jesus became a light for them in their personal and collective darkness and gloom. Matthew also tells us that Jesus went to the synagogues – and the surrounding countryside – preaching the Gospel. That “Good News” was that salvation being possible for everyone.

God would forgive the sins of anyone who truly repented! Moreover, there was another life

possible beyond the darkness and gloom of suffering and evil that we have here!


St. Paul wrote his Letter to the Corinthian Christians who were becoming religiously divided. As it usually happens, most large groups eventually become divided. The Corinthian Christians thought that some of them were better than the others. What they forgot was that Paul, Apollos, and Cephas each pointed to Jesus himself who was the Risen Christ of God.

Furthermore, Jesus Christ could not be divided. He was one with God – and one with everyone who believed in him and followed him. God does not discriminate – and neither does His Son, Jesus. Jesus died on the cross to bring salvation to the world. And that salvation is within the reach of anyone who, sincerely, strives for it!

Brothers and Sisters, Jesus died on the cross for every one of us. His death atoned for all the sins of the world. His crucifixion is a reminder that we, too, must bear and carry our own cross. And that cross brings us both Light and Life. That Life and Light can keep the darkness and gloom of our culture and world at bay. It can keep it from overpowering our hearts and souls with its negativity. The cross is always our way to salvation, both now and in the future – Because on that cross is the Son of God! Jesus – who is that Son of God – became our brother for our journey home.

Let us pray that we never lose the conviction of this belief! Amen.
